L. B. HOWARD RESIGNS SUPT. POST AT BAIRD HIGH SCHOOL

L. B. Howard, Baird School Superintendent for the past nine years, has resigned to become effective July 26, and will accept a position with the Haskell School System.

This brought the second resignation in a week from the administrative office of Baird High School. El Cotton resigned May 31 to accept a teaching position with the Abilene High School in advanced Math.

Howard, who has been superintendent for the past nine years, had one year remaining on his contract with the school. Cotton served for the past eight years as principal, math teacher and coach, and also had one year remaining on his contract.

The Baird school board accepted the resignation of head football coach Vernon Townsend earlier this year. This position has been filled by Winford Shipp, from Hawkins.

The school board is accepting applications at this time to fill the vacancies of superintendent and principal to bring the administrative office to full capacity before the fall semester begins.

Cottons Accept Teaching Jobs

Baird High School Principal for the past seven years, Ed Cotton, has resigned and will teach advanced mathematics in Abilene High School this coming fall semester.

Besides his duties as Principal here, he also taught in Baird High School, was assistant football coach and boy's basketball coach.

Cotton received his BS degree from ACC in 1949, and his Master of Education at Hardin-Simmons University in 1952, and did advanced graduate work at West Texas State, University of Texas, Iowa University at Ames, Iowa and University of Houston.

Mrs. Cotton will teach music in the Abilene Public School system. She received a BME degree at North Texas State, and advanced graduate work at Hardin-Simmons.

In Baird, she has done substitute teaching, administrator of SRA in Callahan County Schools, and in the 1967-68 school year was director of the Baird School Band.

A 17 year old bride of two days was killed instantly at 7:15 p. m. Thursday, May 30, in a one car accident on IH 20, six miles east of Baird.

Mrs. Lois Elaine Jackson, formerly of Gulfport, Miss., was pronounced dead at the accident scene by Clyde Justice of the Peace M. E. Jolly.

Her husband, Sp. 5 Shelton R. Jackson of El Paso, who recently returned from Vietnam, was taken to Dyess Hospital in Abilene, but was not seriously injured.

The foreign made auto apparently overturned and skidded nearly 200 feet before crashing into a culvert.

The couple was enroute to El Paso and his parents were traveling two hours behind the Jackson auto and was later notified by the Texas Highway Patrol about the accident.

Godfrey Funeral Home of Baird transferred the body to Dallas for the flight to Gulfport, Miss., where funeral services were held.

Miller, Corn, Curtis Winners Saturday

Grayson Miller, a farmer and rancher of the Eula Community, unhitched a 14-year experienced law enforcement official, Homer Price in the 2nd Democratic Primary held Saturday, for Sheriff of Callahan County. Miller carried all voting boxes except Baird and Putnam, totaling 1,428 votes to Price's 920.

In the May 4 Democratic Primary, Miller led the three-man race with 1,137 votes. Price received 875 and J. W. (Wes) Patton 535.

Irvin Corn of Baird won the hard-fought battle for Commissioner of Precinct 1, drawing 36 more votes than his opponent, C. Lee Smith of Clyde. Both candidates were running for the post which was left open

by the death of Roscoe Shelnut. Mrs. Shelnut was appointed by the commissioner's court to serve out the unexpired term of her husband.

Smith led the seven man race in the May 4 Primary with 598 votes to Corn's 353. In Saturday's 2nd Primary, Corn racked up 861 to Smith's 825.

In the Constable race for Precinct 1, Glen Curtis was re-elected with 402 votes, to Glen Boyd's 303.

In the race for governor, Preston Smith was almost a two to one victor, with 1,553 votes over Don Yarborough with 796. The winning candidates will appear on the General Election ballot on November 5th, official taking office January 1, 1969.

FORT GRIFFIN FANDANGLE BEGINS 6 DAY RUN JUNE 20

The 1968 Thirtieth Anniversary edition of the Fort Griffin Fandangle will be celebrated at the Prairie Theatre in Albany on June 20, 21, 22 - 27, 28, 29. Barbecue, catered by Mack Eppen's of Abilene, will be served each evening of the Fandangle, beginning at 5:00 P. M. A concert will be played on the steam calliope before the performances at the theatre. The parade will be staged June 27 at 6:00 P. M.

Box offices will open on Saturday, June 1, at the Fandangle-Chamber of Commerce office in Albany, the Chamber of Commerce in Breckenridge, and at Brown's Music Store in Abilene. Ticket prices are: Box seats, \$5.00; chair seats, center section and first rows of side sections, \$3.50; chair seats, side sections, \$2.00; bleacher seats, \$1.50.

The Fort Griffin Fandangle is a gentle satire of life at the famous Western Outpost of Fort Griffin, Texas, and the lively and lusty town of Griffin which sprang up in the shadow of the Fort. The Fort was situated on a hilltop for protection from bands of marauding Indians. The town nestled between the bottom of the hill and the Clear Fork of the Brazos River. During the 1870's

and 80's it was the scene of the wildest of westerns. Doc Holliday lived in Griffin before he went to Tombstone. Big Nose Kate spent a night in jail at Griffin for trying to burn down a hotel. Lottie Deno, the gracious lady of the gambling tables, saw her lover shot to death there. Wyatt Earp, who came to visit Doc Holliday, stayed only a few days, remarking that "Griffin is too wild for me."

The Fandangle portrays the different facets of life in pioneer times -- the soldiers, the saloon characters, the buffalo hunters who spent weeks hunting and skinning, the lonely cowboys who drove herds of Longhorn cattle up the Western Trail to Abilene, Kansas, the mother who feared Indians, disease, loneliness, the children, the old folks, the Indians in their kingdom and in their realization that all was lost. The spectator is transported into yesteryear. He is there with history as it happened.

Since 1938 the Fort Griffin Fandangle has been recreating Prairie History through pageantry and comedy and showing-off Western style. During its six night summer run the Fandangle Prairie Theatre's 1,600 seats are filled with people from all over the United States -- peo-ple who find the show enchanting and return again to bring others with them.

"WEEKLY MEDITATIONS"

THE PEACE OF BELIEVING PRAYER

Philippians 4:6-7: "Do not worry about anything; but in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all human thought, will stand sentinel over your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus."

For the Philippians life was bound to be a worrying thing. Even to be a human being, to be involved in the human situation, to be vulnerable to all the chances and the changes of this life, is in itself a worrying thing; and in the early church, to the normal worry of the human situation, there was added the worry of being a Christian, in a situation in which the man who was a Christian took his life in his own hands. As M. B. Vincent puts it: "Peace is the fruit of believing prayer." In this passage is a brief statement of Paul's philosophy of prayer.

Paul stresses that we can take everything to God in prayer. It is in everything that we are to make prayer and supplication with thanksgiving. As it has been so well put: "There is nothing too great for God's power; and nothing too small for His fatherly care." A child can take anything great or small to a parent; so we can

take anything to God. A child is quite sure that whatever happens to him is of interest to his father and mother. His little triumphs and his little disappointments, his passing cuts and bruises, the many things that he would like - he tells them all, never doubting that his parents will be ready and willing to listen to him. We should be exactly so with God.

We can bring our prayers, our supplications and our requests to God. We can pray for ourselves. We can pray for forgiveness for the past, for the things we need in the present, for the help and guidance we need in the future. We can take our own past and present and future, with all our shame, with all our needs, with all our fears, into the presence of God. We can pray for others. We can commend to God's care those near and far who are forever within our memories and within our hearts.

Paul is saying that it is utterly and entirely beyond man's ability to obtain peace by himself. Peace can never be of man's own contriving; it is only of God's giving. The way to peace is to take ourselves and all whom we hold dear, to take all life, and to place them and ourselves and it trustingly in prayer in the hands of God.

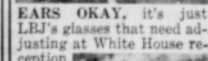

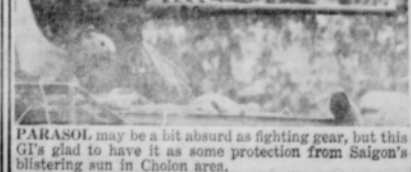
