## About Oor Coaches

All parents that care are apprehensive when it comes to leaving their children in someone else's charge. Whether it's the attendant at the church nursery, a Sunday School teacher, a school teacher, or a baby sitter, we are fearful that they might receive the wrong kind of attention or be neglected. Coaches are no exception.

A fifth grader was heard to say on Wednesday. "He sure is a nice man. I like him for a coach, and I hope he is my teacher next year.

Let's talk about our coaches. If you have a son playing for one of the Seminole coaches, you are indeed fortunate to live in an area where the school system demands nice and decent coaches. We have them here in the Seminole school. One of the nicer things about being on the sideline is hearing the way our coaches talk to their boys. Let me tell you a few of the things.

On a crucial fumble by the Indians recently, the coach told them as they came off the field, "That's all right! We 'll get it back." Two plays later Seminole was hitting with such power that they did get it back, and the coach was heard to say, "I told you! Now get in there and do the job." And they did.

Growing up in a high school where a coach cursed and raved, parents here should be most appreciative of the language used by the coaches. The worst language I've heard was on a call where an overanxious Indian received a personal foul, and the coach yelled, "You sucker". The boy knew he was not talking to him. He was talking to the official.

Another coach put his arm around the boy when he came out of the game and said, "Are you ready to go in or do you need to rest a moment?" And he said, "Yes, Sir". Then the coach told him to rest. About two minutes later the boy rushed up to the coach and said, "I can block him out now." With a pat on the back, he went in and blocked him out.

In 1923 the MacLindsey \#1 was drilled 23 miles east of Seminole. This was the first oil well drilled in Gaines County. They quit 200-300 feet too soon. It was a dry hole. Note the smoke coming from the boiler of the old steam rig. There was a long belt that traveled from the steam engine to the rig itself. Notice the eight cars, all soft tops except two. All cars then had running boards. The two women on the extreme right are standing with their heads in the car and are standing on the running board. (It looked sandy then. - - Thanks Babe Howell.)

There were thirteen dry holes drilled in Gaines County before they found oil. It was complicated drilling as the gates gas gave drilling contractors so much trouble. Upon hitting a pocket of this type of gas, it would blow the tools out of the hole. Finally, when they started using a rotary rig, they could drill successfully.
For several years they produced from the old Seminole field wells making about two hundred barrels a day. A driller that made a mistake on his depth marking and drilled into the pay made Seminole a boom town. These first good wells would produce 4000 to 5000 barrels a day. Many people lost their money before oil paid in this county. We are especially grateful to them for their findings because it built good roads, good schools, and paid the major portion of our taxes.

Adoption of policies to guide the Texas Farm Bureau in 1968 will be the highlight of the organization's 34th annual convention here Nov. 12-15 in the Terrace Motor Hotel Convention Center.

Texas Farm Bureau President, C. H. DeVaney of Waco, will give his annual address Monday morning. The annual report will be given by TFB Secretary - Treasurer, M. F. (Mike) Frost of McAllen. Craig Thomas, executive assistant to the president of TFB, will make an administrative report. A recognition program that morning will honor county Farm Bureaus with outstanding achievements in membership acquisition, public relations and farm safety.

DeVaney is calling on county Farm Bureau to. muster grass roots support for reductions in federal spending on "nonessential" programs.

The TFB leader quoted from Farm Bureau policy on the matter which reads: "Deficit spending by the federal government is a prime cause of inflation. We urge the Congress to take effective means to bring federal spending under control. Now is the opportune time to reevaluate the worth and effectiveness of the many new centralized spending programs.
DeVaney said also that the American Farm
Bureau Federation board of directors, of which he is a member, last month adopted the following policy as a current interpretation of Farm Bureau policies on taxes and spending:
"We oppose any increase in federal taxes that is not matched by a

SOIL CONSERVATION
Management of small grain is important to every farmer who plants small grain as a cover crop or cash crop in the Gaines - Andrews Soil \& Water Conservation District.
Small grain planted in the district does require plant food and water. It can only be obtained by fertilization and irrigation. The best time to fertilize is at or before planting with a base fertilization and top dressing in the spring. This gives quick growth for a good green manure crop or for seed production.

NEW RATE INCREASE PIONEER NATURAL GAS EFFECTIVE NOVEMBER 15, 1967

Gas used for dobmestic and commercial purposes after November 15, 1967, will be billed at a new rate by Pioneer Natural Gas Company. In June, the Company applied for an $11.5 \%$ increase in rates in the West Texas service area, and by late September all of the cities and towns had approved the new rate.
Since it began serving the area in 1928, Pioneer has applied the same rate in the West Texas service area, and this new rate will become effective in all cities and towns simultaneously.
The new tax will be $3 \%$ of the gross receipts, rather than the $2 \%$ which had been paid previously. This tax is in addition to local ad valorem taxes, and sales taxes and the gross receipts tax paid the State.

The Texas Farm Bureau has filed a brief in support of the landowner in a Texas Supreme Court water case involving an oil company's use of underground water for oil recovery.
Hearing on the Sun Oil Co. vs. Earnest Whitaker, et al., water case from Hockley County began October 25. The suit was brought by Sun Oil for an injunction against alleged efforts by Whitaker to prevent the company from using his water, without due compassion, for water flooding purposes. Sun Oil contends it has free use of the water under a mineral lease agreement with L. D. Gann, owner of the mineral rights to the land.
The TFB brief said the organization is vitally interested in the conservation of an adequate water supply for irrigation purposes in the Texas High Plains area.

## MAIL EARLY FOR CHRISTMAS

Postmaster Jewell F. Cobb today issued a reminder list of mailing dates for Christmas gifts and parcels. The Seminole postal official said that these are final deadlines suggested by the Post Office Department to make sure that all mail is delivered on time.
'If the public mails on or before these suggested deadlines," Mrs. Cobb explained, "there will not be a last minute jam up in the mail stream caused by a massive influx of mail which will be more than the already over-burdened postal system can handle."
"We are asking that the public cooperate by shopping early, mailing early and using ZIP Codes to encourage the most efficient Christmas postal operation ever.

The Postmaster noted that special attention will again be placed on the delivery of mail to servicemen in Vietnam and the surrounding area, and encourage the use of APO and FPO numbers on all overseas military mail.

COTTON CLASSING
VOLUME INCREASES
Cotton prices paid South Plains farmers, as reported by the Consumer and Marketing Service of the U S D A, remained steady and ranged from $\$ 2.50$ per bale over the loan for high grade, short staple cotton to $\$ 65.00$ per bale over the loan for high grade cotton having staple length of $1-3 / 32^{\prime \prime}$ and longer.
