CITY SALES TAX

At a special meeting last Thursday night, the City council voted to call a special election for a one cent sales tax for Seminole. The tax was deemed necessary because of added operational expenses due to inflation and a need in the near future for additional expenses for street repairs and additional water field working expenditures. At present, some city equipment is in need of repair or replacement. It was pointed out at the meeting that there are sizable expenditures in these three areas and that there has been no tax increase since 1960.

The ordinance to call an election on a one per cent sales tax was in accordance with House Bill No. 207, Local Sales and Use Tax.

December 12 was selected as the date to vote on the city sales tax. There are a number of Texas cities planning to vote on the new city sales tax before the end of the year. The tax went into effect on August 28 of this year and thus far, 24 out of 25 cities have voted in favor of the tax. In Electra, voters defeated the issue. Lubbock citizens will cast their votes on November 9. The new sales tax will be applicable to all items that are taxed at the present time and it would be in addition to the present taxes. It was also pointed out at the meeting that the city is still operating within their budget but that added operational expenses in the foreseeable future deem this election necessary.

SEMINOLE FIRE



On Sunday afternoon everything was quiet, the Dallas Cowboys were winning, and a fire broke out at Wickson Texaco Station, 501 Lamesa Highway. This was Seminole's largest fire loss in a number of years.

From several reports, the fire broke out in the inside front of the station. Some young men had been painting a car and left it in the wash room. There was some kind of explosion, whether from paint or something else it is not known, that caused the fire to spread rapidly. Mr. Wickson stated, "Our loss may reach \$25,000."

Seminole men injured in accident

Three men, Doyle Lee Goss, 566 Avenue G, SW; Gary Poston, 607 SW 8th; and H. O. (Hoss) Crutcher were badly burned about the face and hands when the 1965 Chevrolet in which they were riding caught on fire Monday morning. See P. 2

That time of the year has arrived. The leaves have begun to fall from the trees, tumbleweeds have begun to loosen and roll across the Plains, and wood has been put up for the fireplace. The second cold spell is here. We will kill hogs in the morning!

Hog killing time is a delightful time - - fresh meat in the house, neighbors over to help.

There are so many interesting things to note about a hog killing site. First of all it takes a heavy pipe to hold up four hogs. In the late twenties, it would have been an insult for a man to have killed a hog weighing only 200 pounds. These must have weighed 400 to 500 pounds. The pipe was placed between two trees or into the windmill stand. They also had to be near water. The barrel in the foreground was used to scald the hog. It took quite an expert to tell exactly the temperature of the water; it had to be hot enough to slip the hair but not too hot to set the hair and cook the outer part of the skin. In those days a hog had shoulders and hams (no picnic hams). When the hog was dipped in the barrel, it was difficult to find a partner that could slide him out, stand him exactly in the right place on his head, and slip the other end back in the barrel.


From hog killing time came not only the ham and the shoulder, but the sausages, pig's feet, fresh backbone, and many gallons of lard. The hog that is being gutted is still hanging on a single-tree. Others are hanging on a sharpened stick. The hooks on the single-tree were hooked in a leader behind the back feet. He could either be pulled up by a block and tackle after he was scraped or pulled up with a rope over the top of the pipe with others lifting up on the front quarters. Most everything about the hog was saved. The pig's tail was sent to a girl that had jilted her boy friend or an old maid aunt. Some people preferred to shoot their hogs with a rifle and stick them. Others knocked them in the head with a single bladed ax and cut their throat. Some preferred simply to cut their throat, or combinations.

The car was on butane and had been filled up and driven 80 miles when the fire occurred.




AREA LIBRARIANS ATTEND EL PASO MEETING



Jr. Study Club

The Seminole Junior Study Club met at the home of Mrs. Charles Stephenson at 2114 West Avenue B for its meeting on November 2 at 4:00 P. M. Mrs. Frank Karvas was co-hostess. During the social, members were served mystic pie with coffee and cokes.

After the meeting was called to order, Mrs. Glynn Chandler, program chairman, introduced Mrs. Kent Denson, who gave a report on the bilingual kindergarten held this past summer at the Denson farm west of Seminole.

Mrs. Denson, who was assisted in the work by Mrs. Paul Condit, said that classes were held three days a week for four weeks. The object of the kindergarten was to teach English to young Spanish-speaking children to prepare them for entrance into public school. The school day began for the eleven children who attended with a time during which they were free to get acquainted and explore their surroundings. After that a short les son in English was given. The children then played a game or took part in some type of physical exercise.

The kindergarten covered other areas of normal child development. Small muscle co-ordination was developed through art activities which involved the use of crayons, scissors, and paste.

Mrs. Denson said the kindergarten was a success and that she believed the children who attended would be better prepared for classwork in the public schools.

After the report, Mrs. Paul Condit lead a discussion on the problems of the bilinguals in our schools.

Many times they are fearful of new places or of trying new things. Their lives have been very much the same thing day after day until the time they enter public school. Curiosity about the world outside their home or family has never been encouraged.

Most of the bilinguals are class conscious; they feel deeply that they are different. The language barrier is the root of this, but it often produces extreme shyness or hostility and resentment towards teachers and other classmates.

Mrs. Condit mentioned some things you might not expect to find among the bilinguals. She said they were eager students and that once they had confidence in their teacher and themselves, they were very co-operative and appreciative. She said also that the parents of these children seemed to understand the importance of education and insisted that their children respect and obey the teachers.

Most of these children are secure in their home life and also independent in their care of themselves. Many come from large families and have learned personal responsibility as well as how to share

The language barrier is the basic problem, and it must be broken early if these children are to develop normally in their educational growth.

After the discussion, it was reported that four of the club members had given a Halloween party for the children in the Special Education Department of the Seminole schools. Mesdames Hilbern Briscoe, Paul Condit, Kent Denson, and Mike Jenkins entertained the children with games and refreshments at school after the Halloween parade.





A Story About Your School

ARTS AND CRAFTS WITH MRS. ANDERSON

One of the oldest crafts known to man-kind is ceramics which is being taught in Junior High Arts and Crafts classes.

There are many Biblical references to this activity, which remains one of the outstanding industrial enterprises in the modern technological world.

Junior High pupils in arts and crafts not only learn to create an article from raw clay, but fire their clay to bisque at 1625 degrees. Later the glazed piece is fired to 1825 degrees making it water and bake proof.

In reference reading in arts and crafts pupils find the importance of ceramics in a scientific world, quoting from Ceramics, by Vincent A. Roy: "Scientists and engineers are on the brink of new ceramic discoveries that were undreamed of a few years ago. New ceramic materials are mass produced to very close tolerances. By standard glassmaking methods, they are drawn into sheets, rods, or tubing, or even blown, cast or pressed. These ceramics are light in weight, yet remarkably strong under severe conditions of temperature and stress. They resist chemicals. Some are so hard that they will cut steel and can be used as special cutting tools in metal working machines.

An interesting project of the art department for second year pupils is internal carving of plastic. One of the first things a beginner at internal carving must do is to learn the "feel" of the high-speed tool as it bites into plastic material. Cutting tools turn at the rate of 12,000 to 18,000 r.p.m. A cutting tool rotating at such high speed can be dangerous, hence safety rules must be observed any time the drills are in use.

At this time of year candle-making has top priority as a project in arts and crafts classes. The students have taken great pride in displaying their work in the art department exhibit window for parents and visitors to enjoy.

The arts and crafts classes are organized in such a way that students rotate in assuming responsibilities in the department. Tools and supplies are checked out to students by the chairman for that week. Everyone has a specific duty to perform each week.

Mrs. Anderson states that all students are not

gifted in working with the various media of arts and crafts, but that all students can learn an appreciation for art and beauty and individual creativity.


Dear Editor:

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

Tommy Harrell looked real good on defense, making several good tackles, as did Charles Donohoe and Ray Hitch.







HISTORY OF THE OLD WEST CAPTURED IN BARB WIRE

The six-shooter, it is said, brought law and order to the West and Barb Wire tamed it. The earliest patent on Barb Wire was registered between 1850 and 1860; the latest in 1893. During these years probably between 250 to 300 kinds were made. These four are shown to give our readers an idea of how collectors identify the kinds of wire they find and trade for.

Wallace Powers, Andrews Highway, is one collector that has shared his story with the NEWS readers. "The best way to get interested in a collection is to find some old wire. I found 300 yards of single strand patented in 1888, in Kerrville, Texas, on my Uncle Charley Rogers' place. I was in business."

A standard collector's length of wire is 18 inches. Gaines County is not a good place to find old wire because of the age of the county. Also, galvanized wire lasts longer because of its protective coat.

Wallace Powers has in his collection now 89 different kinds of wire--everything from Barb, Rowel, Twist, Square, Double Loop, Tack, Ribbon, Bent Staple, Spiral, Buffalo, and on and on.

There has never been a person that has been around Barb Wire for any length of time that could not appreciate it and at the same time hate it.


