Sales Tax AGAINST

FOR

APPROVED AND CONTRIBUTED BY THE CITY COUNCIL

Is the sales tax needed?

The City of Seminole needs substantially increased revenues for improving and strengthening services.

The City has a tremendous investment in paving.

The streets need and have needed seal coating for sometime -- without the needed repairs the Citizens of Seminole could lose many blocks of paving.

The City Water Field needs repairs. Most of the pumps and motors need over-hauling. Water is the City's life line -- without water there would be no Seminole.

The Sanitation or Trash Hauling Department is spending money on old, worn-out equipment that should have been replaced long before now. This is needed to enable the City to best serve the needs of the people.

The cost of materials and labor for extensions have increased and is continuing to increase; therefore the over-all increases in prices of material and labor for all departments have forced the cost of the City's operations to go up.

The City tax rate has not been changed since 1964. The cost of water meters have increased from approximately \$22.40 to \$36.20. Brass and copper goods have increased almost 40% since 1960.

What items are subject to the 1% Municipal sales tax?

The 1% sales tax is applicable only to those sales now taxed under the State Sales and Use Tax Act.

Q. Who can vote on the 1% local sales tax?

A. Any registered voter in the City.

Q. Why should a resident property owner favor this kind of tax?

A. Proper police and fire protection will protect the property owner's investment in his home, and high quality streets, parks and other Municipal facilities provide a suitable environment in which to live. The money to support these services must be derived from some source, which has, to this time, been primarily property taxes. Con't Page 12

COTTON TRAILER WRECK



Note the cotton in the foreground - See Picture-Sec II At 6:40 p.m. Sunday, nine-tenths of a mile west of the city limits of Seminole a 1961 Chevrolet pick-up was hit from the rear by a 1965 Chevrolet car, owned by Flavio R. Coronado, Graybull, Wyoming.

Both vehicles were traveling west. The pick-up driven by Freddie Joe Vogler, 34, Route 4, Lamesa, Texas, was pulling two loaded cotton trailers to the Co-op Gin. The car was being driven by 21 year old Juan Soto Coronado, Mathis, Texas. The passenger in the car was 25 year old Frank M. Gonzales, S. W. 4th Street, Seminole, Texas.

The pick-up and trailers had their right wheels on the shoulder or the north side of the highway traveling west, when the car ran under the back trailer on the left hand side.

The car after coming up over the hill, traveling west skidded 194 feet to the point of impact. All vehicles stayed in the right hand lane.

Vogler did not sustain any injuries. The driver, Coronado, is in the local hospital reported to be in serious but not critical condition. The passenger in the car, Gonzales, is in critical condition. (The harvest season is here. Everyone be careful)



Dave Scott, riding the black horse, Colie, roped the calves and brought them to the roping crew. He was world champion bulldogger. Cecil (Slats) Stanley probably opened the gate for them to bring the calves through or put them up. Lee Wyatt is holding the back legs of the calf in the foreground. "He was the best cowboy of the bunch, "James Stanley said. A'bert O'Neil is sitting on the forequarter of a calf with his boot on the neck. Notice the spur still on the boots. They are waiting for the brand-

The calf in the foreground is being held on the head by Maugie Turner. James Stanley is holding the rear legs, Barnie Elam is running the knife, and P. J. Stanley, Sr., who was the manager of the ranch, is running one of the branding irons. On the far right is Frank Brittain running one iron and Scott Doss sitting atop another calf.

The Bar S Ranch was organized in 1920. It was owned by the Kings and was managed by P. J. Stanley, Sr., with James Stanley as foreman. This was their first branding.

Notice the shinnery (shinoak) in the foreground, also the bear grass. The corrals were new, materials being hauled from Lamesa, Texas. Headquarters was $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles southeast of Seminole, made up of thirty-five sections owned and ten lease sections. The ranch came up to the edge of Seminole. The horse pasture was three sections.

There is a used spool of barbed wire hanging on the corral fence just this side of the windmill. That is a pigeon on top of the barn and to the left of the windmill. (We ate them in those days when they were young, and they were sure good.)

"All our cattle were white-faced. We picked these 600 cows out of a 1300 cow herd along with 75 bulls. Our first calf drop was 575."

The wooden windmill was an eight-feet eclipse. The tower was thirty-three feet high, and the little building just to the left of the mill was the milk house. The water from the mill ran through the milk house cooling milk, butter, and other things, then into a concrete storage tank running over into an earthen

There were two brands - - one with a Bar and the other with an S. Look at the calf in the foreground that has had the Bar put on it and is waiting for the letter. Nearly all the grass in that day was sage grass except on the hard ground or tideland.

"I rode Cotton, a white horse, for sixteen years. Every year I would rope eight to ten half grown antelope on him. I was lucky enough to rope two grown antelope off him in that span of time when I would catch him in a circle. One day I rode into where they were branding about ten o'clock in the morning. (I had been sick.) There was a bunch of antelope in with the cattle, and they were scared. We rode in and roped one and carried it to the cook wagon. It might have been half grown. We ate it in lone meal."

Scott Doss was the owner of the car.

If anyone has ever followed a chuck wagon, smell-. ed the burning of the hair, flanked a calf, or eaten with a bunch of hungry cowboys, it is not soon forgotten. The work was hard but most enjoyable. Thanks to Mrs. Raymond Golden and Mr. James Stanley.)

If the city votes to accept the city tax, then I will no longer feel obligated to buy in Seminole. I will feel justified in going elsewhere to buy the things I need.



SALES TAX - FOR - con't from P.1

- Q. Is the local tax regressive -- that is, will it cause a particular hard-ship for lower income families?
- A. A sales tax has more elements of equity than any other type of tax, and this is particularly true in Texas, since so many essential items are exempt from the sales tax.
- Q. What are the advantages of the penny sales tax over increased property taxes?
- A. Everyone who benefits from City services help pay for them. The penny sales tax has been called the fairest, best and most equitable because people pay only when they buy non-essential items.
- Q. Are city sales tax payments deductible on Federal Income Tax Reports?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. How will the tax be collected?
- A. It will be collected by the State of Texas right along with the present State Sales Tax and the City's one per cent will be paid to the City by the State Comptroller's Office.

The sales tax is the only tax that all the people, who are qualified voters, can vote on themselves and if the time comes that it proves to be too great a burden the people can vote it off.

The cost of government is steadily rising. Popular demand is pressing for more and better City works and services and these must be provided if this City is to grow and prosper and be a safe, healthy and pleasant place in which to live.

The choice is not whether City taxes should be increased or not. The choice is how the people want the increase. It can be property taxes, water and sewer charges, trash hauling or one per cent sales tax.

Seminole voters will decide December 12th whether this City should levy a 1% sales tax or not. It is important for everyone to understand what choice they are being offered.





Dr. Selby gave a very impressive talk regarding the three chest diseases, tuberculosis, pulmonary enphyzema and lung cancer. Lung cancer has increased 900% in the last decade, and is the most frequent cancer today. Smoking is one of the major causes of lung cancer. Dr. Selby stressed that a person over 35 years of age should have a chest X-Ray every year and heavy smokers should have one made every six months.

We, as local citizens, have a responsibility to help carry out this tuberculosis program. Many of our local civic groups are standing behind it and helping support it.

The Tuberculosis Mobil Unit will be in Seminole, Wednesday, Nov. 29, to take X-Rays. The public is urged to have these X-Rays made. See other article on the Mobil Unit.

EDITORIAL

In "March of the News", a headline column in U.S. News & World Report, October 23, 1967, page 14, they quote from a Federal Government report some suggestions for embattling alcoholism:

" MORE FAMILY DRINKING TO REDUCE ALCOHOL-ISM

★Serve beer in college cafeterias.

★Permit liquor advertisements to show alcohol being consumed by the whole family, including children, in a family setting.

★Urge that alcoholic beverages be made available to young persons at church gatherings supervised by adults.

These and other ideas added up to a policy of permitting youth easier access to alcohol in carefully controlled settings. The suggestions were presented in a report by a commission established under a 1million-dollar grant from the National Institute of Mental Health.

Recommended in the report is 'increased emphasis on gregarious social drinking' to replace drinking in bars.

The report added: 'The personal anonymity, darkness and generally furtive quality of many bars permits and even encourages behavior usually not socially acceptable.'

The study recommended a legal drinking age of 18 throughout the country. Its findings were endorsed by the National Council of Churches."

This writer = seeing that the findings were endorsed by the National Council of Churches wondered about such things as "...flee from the very appearance of evil."

SALES TAX - AGAINST

to the Editor

Dear Editor:

In regards to the city sales tax election of December 12, 1967.

This is not a letter to offend any person, but only a few things of interest to the people of Gaines County.

In the days before the Great Society, our forefathers did not like Taxation without Representation. In this election only the Seminole citizens get to vote on tax bills that affect everyone shopping in Seminole.

Those living outside of Seminole help pay the school tax. City tax does not go toward the upkeep of our school system.

If you live outside the city limits and use city water, you pay a premium on it. The farmer or stockman pays for the upkeep of his own wells, not out of taxes, but out of his own pocket.

For years we have all insisted that the people of the surrounding area shop at home. As long as other nearby towns do not have this tax, can we still expect them to do so.

The merchants in Seminole have a hard time meeting competition of the surrounding towns. Milk for instance retails in Hobbs for 39 to 45ϕ for $\frac{1}{2}$ gallon and from 63 to 65ϕ a $\frac{1}{2}$ gallon in Seminole. Even at that price he does not make enough for operating expenses.

If this tax is passed, a bar of soap will cost you an additional $l\phi$, a student's 25ϕ package of theme paper will cost an extra $l\phi$. I believe it will cost the average shopper at least \$25 a year.

This county depends on the farmer and his employees to a great extent. Besides what he is out on his water, he pays over 50% higher for his insurance outside of the city limits. He will be required to pay the 1% tax on all tractor and car parts and yet not allowed to vote.

In many of our towns close by (Seagraves and others) the alderman and the mayor serve for no salary, even a larger town of our area, the mayor draws \$60 a year. We know that it is hard for one to suggest a cutting of his own salary but this would save about \$9,000 per year for the city.

Even in Washington the members of the cabinet are beginning to rebel at so much spending.

If this tax will only take in twenty to thirty thousand a year, is it worth it? But if it does pass and you go to your merchant to buy a television set or the other taxable items, please do not gripe when he tells you your city tax is three to five dollars.

Study Club

BILL WALDROP, INTERIOR
DECORATOR - GUEST SPEAKER

The Seminole Junior Study Club met Wednesday, November 15, at 4:00 p.m. in the home of Mrs. Charles Cope on the Hobbs Highway. Mrs. Kenneth Bass was co-hostess. Individual pumpkin pies were served with tea and coffee during the social preceding the meeting. The serving table was covered with a white organdy cloth with linen appliques and a linen border. An arrangement of white silver-tipped mums complimented the silver and cut glass serving pieces.

Speaker for the afternoon was Mr. Bill Waldrop, Interior Decorator for Miller-Waldrop Furniture Company. He had several decorating tips to offer, beginning with one on color. He said color was very important because of its psychological value. He cited some examples such as yellow, which is a "happy" color and is often used in kitchens. Green and blue are the "peaceful" colors and are most often used in bedrooms. Mr. Waldrop advocated the use of a color wheel to pick your color schemes. With this you can determine which colors harmonize and compliment each other best.

Mr. Waldrop prefers to furnish a room in one particular line or style of furniture, such as Early American, French Provincial, Italian, or Spanish. He said one should not cross colors on early and modern, nor textures on different lines.

Where you could not change the size of a room, you could make it appear different by the use of color and lines. Cool, light colors and horizontal lines make a room seem larger, while the warm colors and vertical lines pull a room in to you.

Mr. Waldrop said pictures were made to be seen as the artist who painted them saw them. They should therefore be hung only six to eight inches above a sofa or console, so that a person might enjoy them while sitting down. Groups of pictures should be balanced with smaller pictures beneath larger ones. His concluding tip was an easy way to hang pictures. He said to place a piece of newspaper on the floor and place your pictures on it the way you want them to hang. Trim the paper to the size of your group of pictures, then punch holes in the paper where nails must go. Remove pictures and hold paper in place on wall where you will hang pictures. Mark the holes and picture hanging is much simplified.


