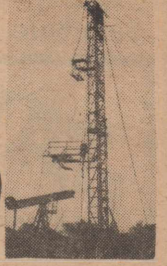

May we add our thanks to you for having overlooked so many mistakes that we have made. We still look forward to each publication.

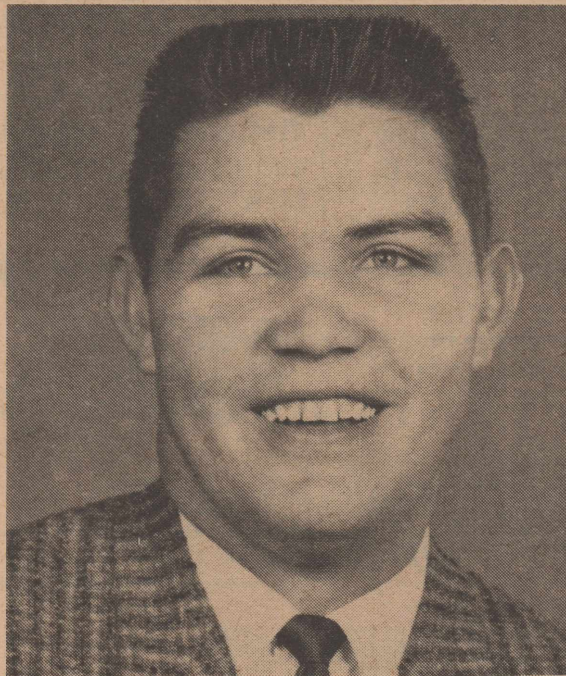

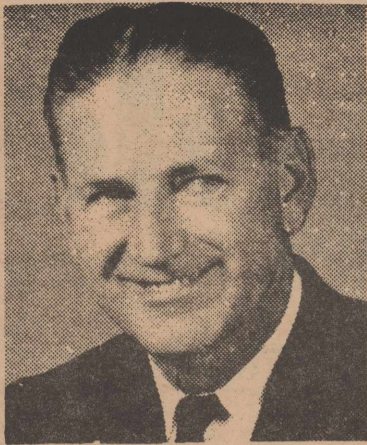

Damage May Hit \$20,000

In one of the wind-
storms last week, the
Co-Op Gin lost forty-
eight bales of cotton and
ten remnants and a por-
tion of a gin wall with a
total value of \$6500.

Gary Weaver, local
manager of Seminole
Co-Op Gin, further
stated, "The Fire Depart-
ment was at the Pay-
master Gin at the time
our fire broke out."

It is nearly impossible
to keep down gin fires
when the wind changes
suddenly and it is any
sort of a fire in a burr
pit.

The Paymaster Gin
twelve miles west on
the Hobbs Road lost 47
bales of cotton and a
truck and trailer belong-
ing to Melvin Brown.
It took firemen a total
of about four hours
fighting both fires.
The Jack Bonner Lease
Service came to the aid
of the firemen again by
using tank trucks to
furnish more water.
These are the second and
third major gin fires of
the year after the one
at Loop Co-op Gin.

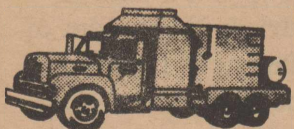

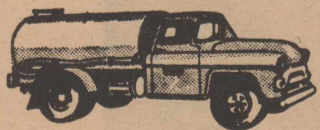

Kendrick did not announce for re-election to the Board of Directors of the Water District. He was recently elected to the position of State Representative, thus being ineligible under Texas law to hold two elective positions. Mr. Howard Hurd of Brownfield, Texas, is seeking the position on the Board of Directors being vacated by Kendrick.

Candidates in the forthcoming election that are seeking re-election are: Bob Loe of Plains, Texas, District Directors Precinct 1; Doyle Moss of Route Five, Brownfield, Texas, District Directors Precinct 3; Claude Hearne of Seagraves, Texas, District Directors Precinct 4; and Joe Anderson of Seminole, Texas, District Directors Precinct 5.

Mr. Anderson is opposed by Mr. O. B. Smith, also of Seminole, for the position of District Director, Precinct 5.

Kendrick announced that absentee voting for the Water District election is being conducted at the County Clerk's Office in the Terry County Courthouse in Brownfield, Texas. Absentee voting will continue until the end of the business day on January 5, 1968. Mrs. R. M. Lowe is the presiding Judge for the absentee box.

District Directors Precinct Number 4 - That portion of Gaines County that lies East of Highway 385 and including all lands within the City Limits of the City of Seagraves, Texas, and that is within the bounds of the South Plains Underground Water Conservation District. Vote at Community Building.

District Directors Precinct Number 5 - That portion of Gaines County that lies West of Highway 385, excluding all lands within the City Limits of the City of Seagraves, Texas, and that is within the boundaries of the South Plains Underground Water Conservation District. Vote at Christian Grain eight miles west on the Hobbs Highway.

Postage Rate Increase Becomes Effective Jan. 7th

Increased rates for all classes of mail except parcel post and international mail will go into effect January 7.

Even with the new rates of six cents for first-class mail and ten cents for air mail, postal service is still a real bargain. For six cents you can send a letter to any of the 50 states, to any United States territory or possession, to Canada or Mexico, or to an American serviceman stationed anywhere in the world.

The new rate for post cards will be five cents and for air mail post cards eight cents.

The added cent in the letter rate is a 20 per cent increase compared to a twenty-four per cent boost in the rates for mailing newspapers and magazines and a thirty-four per cent hike for advertising circulars, 'occupant' mail, and other material in the third-class category.

The new rate of six cents per ounce for first-class mail applies up to thirteen ounces and the new rate of 10 cents per ounce for air mail applies up to seven ounces. Under the new rate structure all first-class mail over thirteen ounces and all air mail over seven ounces will be merged into a single category.

These heavier pieces of first-class and air mail subject to the single rate schedule will be delivered by the fastest available means of transportation.

A flat rate of eighty cents will be charged for all mail in this category up to one pound. For all mail weighing more than one pound, the present air parcel post rates will continue to apply, except that the postage on matter weighing between one and five pounds will change at half-pound intervals rather than one pound intervals.

The new rate structure will mean a reduction of postage on some parcels.

Another rate change that will affect the general public is the increase from four to six cents for the first two ounces of individual pieces of third-class mail. Unsealed greeting cards may be sent at this rate.

The new rate on unsealed greeting cards will not go into effect until January 7 and until then they can be mailed at the old rate of four cents.

Effective January 7 special handling will be available on third-class parcels weighing between eight and sixteen ounces. Special handling has not been available on these parcels since 1958, when packages weighing between eight and sixteen ounces were transferred from fourth to third-class mail.

There will be no changes in the charges for special delivery, special handling, registered mail, certified mail, cash on delivery or insurance.

Higher rates also will go into effect January 7 for all categories of second-class mail, bulk-rate third-class mail, controlled circulation mail, and the educational materials category of fourth-class mail. Mailers using these classes who need information on the new rates should contact the local Post Office.

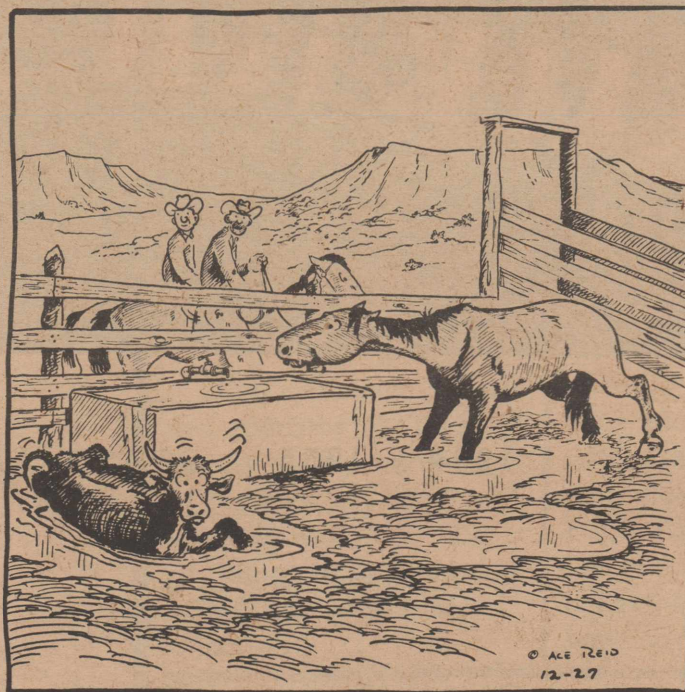
The military has called two or three times wanting to know where their man is, and if he has been released, etc. How naive and stupid can they be!
