# CANCER

On Monday of this week a continuing effort was made to establish a Gaines County Unit of the American Cancer Society. The unit is rapidly developing under the directorship of a board of responsible and concerned citizens dedicated to the control and eradication of

The Board of Directors adopted as its long range objective their assistance in the elimination of cancer entirely as a disease of mankind This objective will be accomplished through

The primary activity of the local unit will be to encourage, foster, and conduct programs for the continuing education of the public concern-The NEWS adds their ing cancer, its symptoms and detection so as to further detection, diagnosis, treatment and prevention of cancer.

The second activity, as outlined by the Board will be to encourage, foster, and conduct programs of service to cancer patients, and provide programs of education and research for the Medical profession.

Thirdly, the Unit will conduct a fund-raising campaign.

The Board of Directors stated that in order to accomplish the educational and service activities of the American Cancer Society, funds will be needed. They revealed that of funds given last year by Texans to the Society, each dollar was spent in the following ways: 31¢ for cancer research, 14¢ for professional education, fellowships, and services, 28¢ for public education, 13¢ for service to patients, 7¢ for development of program and administration, and 7¢ for campaign.

The main order of business at last Monday's meeting was the establishment of organizational committees. The campaign committee will have Mrs. Roscoe Treadway as the chairman with board members, Mrs. W. E. Cox, Roger Pool, and Mrs. Alton Freeman as co-ordinators. Publicity will be headed by Charles Ray with Mrs. D. C. Chesnut, Harold Jones, and George Cristy providing board assistance.

The Educational Committee Chairman has not been selected but, board members Jake Harrell, Mrs. Bill Oswalt, and Kyle Adams parade of talent this year were appointed as co-ordinators. Also, the Chair of the Service Committee is vacant but, Mrs. R. L. Basham, Mrs. Fred Farrar, and Stan Basham will assist the person appointed.

Mrs George began her remarks with a reminder that when the first immigrants came to America it was a land of plenty and a place like none other in opportunities. But over the years, as man progresses, we find that machines are taking on more and more work formerly done by man. However, life still goes on, and man still has his family and family responsibilities. People flock to our larger cities armed only with skills left over from jobs that no longer exist. Lack of formal education can be disastrous in the cities. Many people can't use what little information they receive, because they can't read enough to follow them. Thus begins the vicious circle of dependency on welfare. Children raised in a home supported by welfare have no incentive to work when they could make only a little more by doing so than their father makes by sitting home watching television. These children usually do not get sufficient education to inspire them to go on to better jobs. They are often without proper clothing to attend school, and so fall behind, get discouraged and

Also contributing heavily to the problems of poverty is the overpopulation, as Mrs. Bailey pointed out. She said that the population of the United States would increase by 22% by 1985 at our present rate of growth. Like poverty, the problem of overpopulation is worldwide. Mrs. Bailey said that in Central Africa 50% of the children being born now will die before school age for lack of protein. In the United States, though we do not have this kind of actual famine, the increase of population is leading to extreme congestion, air pollution, and social ills such as crime and violence. The inhibitions of old cultures and outdated religious and economic doctrines have retarded the development of wise priorities for world-wide population planning. Except for nuclear war, the greatest challenge facing mankind is the prevention of overpopulation of the world.


With the whistle sounding 58 times in the course of the game with Fort Stockton, there was little time to play basketball.


