The \$10 million Texas exhibit at HemisFair '68 will feature films constantly shifting on 52 screens all around the overhead walls.



RED CROSS CHAIRMAN NAMED

Mrs. Charles Shelton has been appointed Red Cross Fund Chairman of the Gaines County Chapter of the American Red Cross.

The annual month-long campaign for members and funds of the Gaines County Chapter of the American Red Cross will open Friday -- one of the most important of its drive since World War II, Chester D. Browne, Chapter Chairman said today.

"Because of the greatly increased cost of serving U.S. servicemen in Viet-Nam and because of a series of major disasters, the Red Cross has been forced to ask the American people for the largest sum of money since World War II-\$121, 624.00", Mr. Browne said.

"In the Gaines County Chapter we are seeking to raise \$1500.00. We therefore urge that our supporters increase their 1968 donations.

The funds contributed here, he explained, will be used locally to support Chapter services such as Home service help to the Service Men and their families, reporting both to the servicemen and their families difficulties and to provide the local Chapter's share of financing national programs.

President Lyndon B. Johnson has proclaimed March as Red Cross Month.

The nationwide drive for funds of the Red Cross will be geared to the theme of "SOS-SUPPORT our Servicemen, " and the slogan "Help us Help".

Services to members of the armed forces, at military installations and medical facilities, totaled more than 1, 400, 700 during the year. Over 209, 800 of these services were provided to U.S. fighting men in Viet-Nam where, in addition, a monthly average of 275, 800 servicemen participated in programs given by center-clubmobile girls. Volumes of services to military families in ARC Chapters was comparable to that given their sons, husbands, and brothers.

A total of \$44, 663, 045 was expended by the American Red Cross on Services to the Armed Forces and Veterans this past fiscal year.
