Larry Don Sampoon, 23, was killed Tuesday morning at 5:30 a. m . when the 1969 Ford he was driving was involved in a single car accident. The body was thrown 75 feet beyond the point of the final resting place of the automobile. Kenneth Whitaker, 22, a passenger and owner of the car, was in serious condition with cuts, abrasions, and broken bones. It was reported that there was another passenger but her whereabouts were never fully established.
The accident occurred approximately 7 miles west of Seminole on the Hobbs Highway. The car was travelling east at a high rate of speed, travelling 810 feet after it left the highway. The car turned over at least two times, bouncing every 30 to 40 feet, after going into a broad-side skid. Cont. Page 12

TIME NEARS FOR NO GRAZING ON DIVERTED FARM PROGRAM ACRES Farmers were reminded today that the "no-grazing" period for land diverted from production under the 1969 feed grain and wheat programs will start May 1. It will continue for the following five months until September 30. Troy Martin, Chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee explained that producers who are diverting land under the programs have agreed not to graze the land being diverted during a specific 5 month period of the growing season and not to harvest a crop from the land at any time during the year
Farmers who are taking part in the Conservation Reserve and Cropland Adjustment programs have agreed not to graze or harvest crops from land diverted un der these programs during the life of the agreements. These provisions are important to producers because any violation of them may result in reduction or total loss of payments otherwise earned under the programs.
County producers signed up to participate in the 1969 feed grain and wheat programs number about 800 .

EASTER SEAL SOCIETY ASKS
FOR SUPPORT
A last minute appeal for support of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults and its program of services to the handicapped was is sued today by Mr. C. V. Shelton, who is the Easter Seal Representative in Gaines County.

The Easter Seal Society is providing treatment and services for 17,622 physically handicapped children and adults in Texas, Mr. Shelton said, and this program needs to be expanded. Many people are going without services that would increase the productiveness of their lives and make them happier. With increased growth of the Easter Seal Society, more and more of these people will be reached, he added.

The Society is carrying on a continuing program to seek out the disabled who are going without services to see that they receive the services they need As Easter Seal Representative, Mr. Shelton is the person to contact for services from the Easter Seal Society.
The Texas Easter Seal Society helps support 21 treatment facilities in Texas where crippled children and adults are treated regardless of their ability to pay. Physical, occupational, and speech ther apy are offered to help the handicapped overcome their disabilities. A complete referral program to ensure equal rehabilitation services to every person in Texas is included in Easter Seal Society services, he added.

Mr. Shelton asked that anyone in need of services contact him at the Seminole State Bank, Drawer 727, Seminole, Texas 79360. He added that the Easter Seal Appeal will close Sunday, April 6, and full. support should be given the Easter Seal Society by every citizen of Gaines County.
Lieutenant Governor Ben Barnes is State Chairman of the Appeal.

My name is anonymous, and I'm definitely an alcoholic. In 1968 God allowed me to quit drinking. Why He waited so long I don't know, because I prayed many times to overcome my addiction and I was sincere in my prayers. I understand that alcoholics have 36 different drinking patterns, and that they fall into 2 catagories, Periodic and chronic. I am a chronic alcoholic, in other words, I drank every day. Like most drunks I started drinking as a teenager and that's when I should have quit, but I didn't.
I did slack up in the middle 50 's and at that time I was a pretty nice fellow, but John Barleycorn and I really fixed that. By 1965 I was drinking at least a fifth of Vodka a day and a whole bunch of beer. I crave alcohol, if you know what craving means. As my disease progressed, my scruples diminished, I became a notorious liar and cheat, and I lost my decency, and my sanity. There were at least 6 or 7 bars in Hobbs where I could drink on credit and one where I could drink free (which incidentally turned out to be the most expensive place I was ever in, ) I've come back from Hobbs at least a thousand times when I dreaded going home and my wife dreaded to see me come in.
If there was a $25 \$$ toll everytime someone like myself went to Hobbs for something to drink, we could have built that 4 lane highway a long time ago and paid cash for it. If you earth people had seen me drinking, you probably would have thought I was having a good time. Only God and another alcholic could understand what kind of Hell I've been through. Mast of my faults are directly related to alcoholic. A while back I was a pallbearer for an old friend of mine, I showed up for the funeral drunk and I could hardly wait for them to put him in the ground, so I could get back to my car and take another drink, that's how bad I wanted the stuff.
My wife mentioned a couple of years ago that I might be an alcoholic and I resented this very much, then some things happened to me mentally that I couldn't cope with or understand, so I decided I was crazy. Ready to admit that I was insane but not ready to admit that I was an alcoholic, so I continued to drink, and things got worse, in every respect. I was desperate, I wanted a way out. Finally my wife demanded that I go tall to a friend that was an A. A. member, or else. Now, I think that I was waiting for her to make me do this. My friend introduced me to A. A. and I've been sober ever since. For this I am eternally grateful.

It's a God given program and a wonderful way of life. It has taught me to live one day at a time, yesterday is gone, tomorrow may not get here, today is important. I'm not perfect by any means, but I'm a lot better than I used to be. I know A. A. will not get you to Heaven, but it will keep you sane and sober so that you can find the way. There are many mental problems a person can have, alcohol is my main one, and thank God I can do something about it. So can you. It is so free and so simple, why suffer any longer. If you have a problem, we will be glad to help you, our names will be given to you by Walter.
