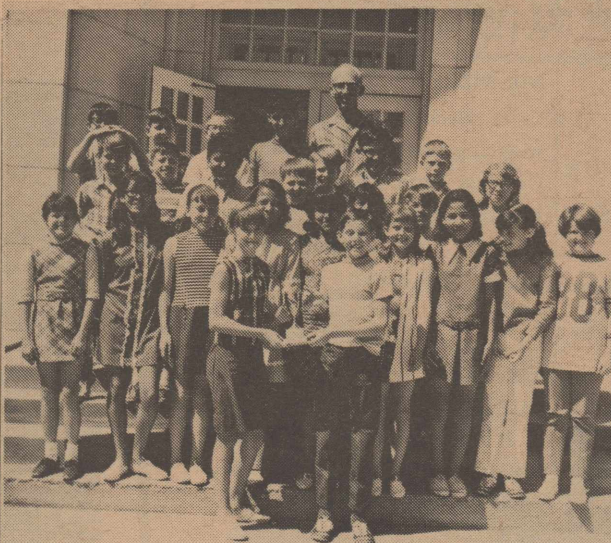
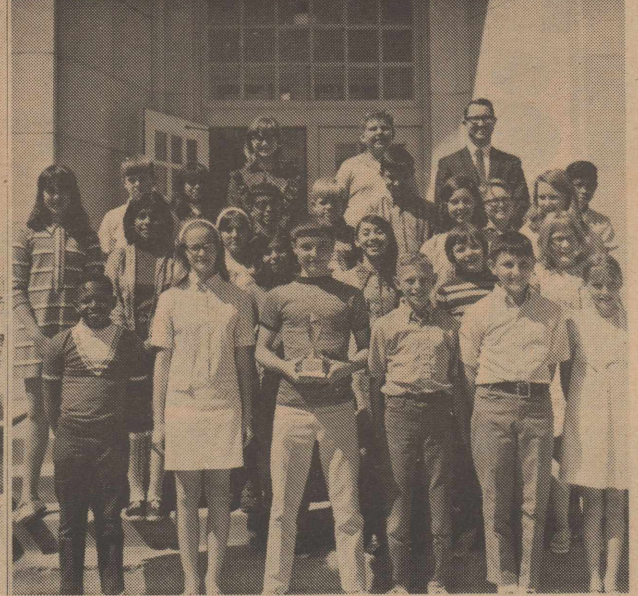




Mrs. Alene George's 4th grade room won first in the track meet against all other 4th grade sections.

Death Scene



The death scene of last Sunday morning. In the foreground can be seen the Chevrolet and on the left the Plymouth. The traffic light pole can be seen immediately in front of the car with the lights themselves on the far left.

Last Sunday morning at 8:50 a. m. Melissa Goodman, 3 year old daughter of Jo Anne Goodman, was killed at the intersection of the two major highways in downtown Seminole. The child's father was killed a year ago in an automobile accident. The 21 year old mother, Linda Jones, was traveling east in a Chevrolet Camero, when they were struck on the left-hand side, midway back, by a Plymouth Fury, driven by James Floyd Everett, age 60, and his wife, Marie, going south. The Chevrolet changed directions after shearing off

a traffic light pole with the driver and her daughter being thrown from the car.

Miss Jones and Mrs. Goodman are both students at Abilene Christian College. Both suffered lacerations and fractured skulls. Mrs. Everett, a passenger in the other car, sustained a broken collarbone and back injuries. Mr. Everett was released from the hospital. The Everetts are from Brownfield and were on their way to visit a son in Odessa.

The weather was clear. There were no eye witnesses.

Tornados Sited



Last Saturday afternoon between 5:30 and 6:00 small tornadoes formed approximately 8 miles east of Seminole and north. They moved in a northwesterly direction striking an unoccupied farm house owned by Paul Turner of Brownfield, midway between the Lamesa Highway and the Seagraves Highway, exactly 4 miles north of Seminole and 3 miles east.

The above picture was made from the Seagraves Highway by the Sheriff's Department. The larger funnel can be seen on the left and the smaller funnel on the right directly behind a utility pole. After hitting the farm house the funnels dissipated much to the joy of area residents.

Eye Witnesses said, "It was turning counter-clockwise. It would move forward; it would back up and move forward again. It was moving in a northwesterly direction. After it hit the farm house, it kind of played out."

SEMINOLE CO-OP GIN HOLDS ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING

At the annual membership meeting of the Seminole Co-op Gin last Saturday night at the school cafeteria, Otis Johnson and N. F. McCullough were returned to the Board of Directors with Doyle Fincher, Gail McCullough and Bob Malone being placed on the nominating committee for another year.

It was pointed out that in total assets the gin was worth \$367,743.92 with a net equity of \$239,217.96. The gin had a gross income of \$240,955.50 with a net margin for allocation of \$62,470.14. It was pointed out by Roy Davis, representing the Regional Cooperatives, that a total of \$21,611.34 was received in cash and \$29,517.72 in stocks.

Mr. Davis went on to say, very emphatically, that there's trouble ahead for the cotton industry. There's very, very trying times ahead in the cotton business. He added that Gaines County was probably in better shape to weather the storm than some other areas because they were further south and that they did not have the competition from milo that areas to the north have.

Cotton farmers in Gaines County will vote next month to decide whether in 1970, they want to be able to sell or lease their cotton allotments outside the county, Troy Martin, Chairman, ASCS County Committee, has announced. The referendum applies only to 1970 and will be conducted by mail during the period May 5 through May 9. Ballots may also be delivered by hand to the ASCS County Office.

The only question to be decided by the balloting is whether upland cotton allotments may be transferred during the next year to other farms by sale or lease. Such transfers may be made by sale or lease for a period of time agreed on by the parties involved. In no case may transfers be made outside the state. An affirmative vote by at least two thirds of the county's cotton farmers who vote will permit such transfers for the upland cotton crop during 1970.

Cotton allotment transfers were provided by the 1965 Food and Agriculture Act, and past referenda on this question have applied to growing seasons through 1969. The Congress voted to extend the Act to cover the 1970 crop year, and the current referendum will decide the question of transfers for the single year 1970.

Mr. Martin said, "We hope all producers will vote. The vote should be fully representative of the wishes of cotton farmers in our county."

The Chairman said that copies of the ballot are being sent to all cotton producers of record in the county, together with information describing the program's purpose and operation. Any cotton producer who has a question about the referendum or about who is eligible to vote, is urged to get in touch with the ASCS county office.

Then came school, hog killing time and shoes.

"Blessings on thee, little man, Barefoot boy with cheeks of tan."

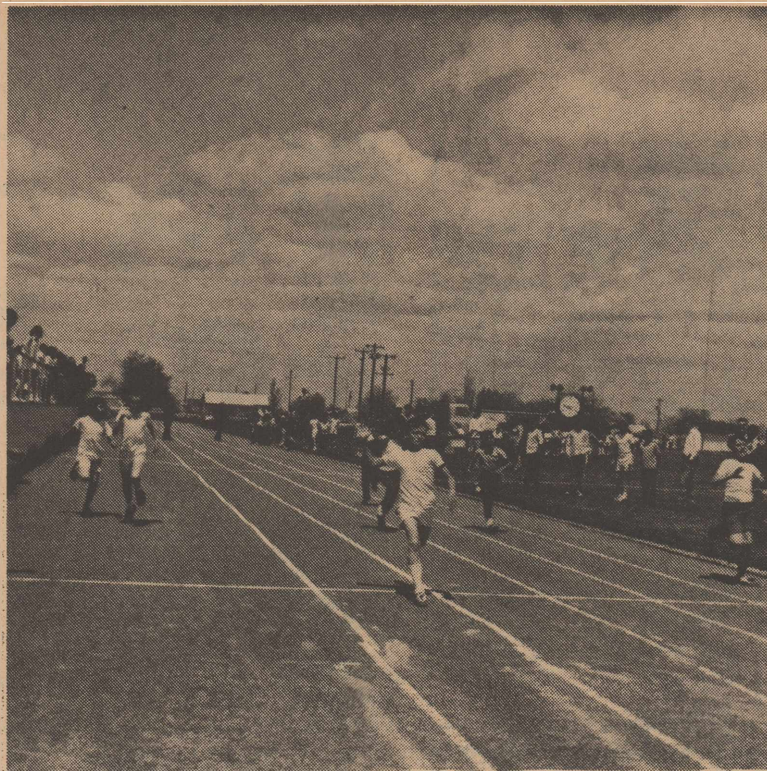

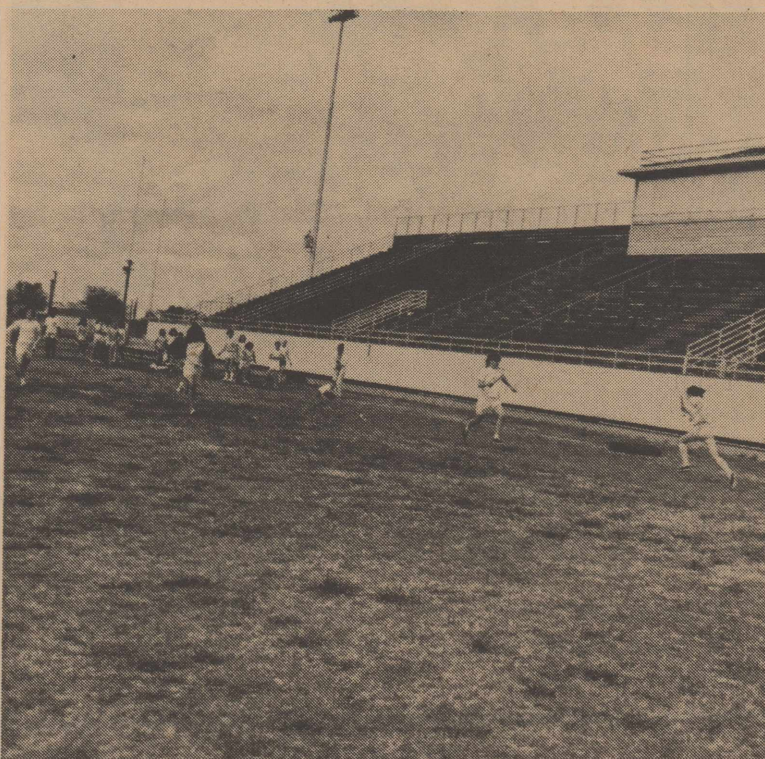

School Budget

The School Board met last Monday night and considered a budget in excess of 1-3/4 million dollars. The proposed budget as set forth by the administration is for \$1,786,390.00 compared to a budget of \$1,689,886.00 for the present year. The big item in the increase for the new year was the addition of money to pay teachers which amounted to almost half of the \$96,500 increase.

Mr. Bramlett, School Superintendent, pointed out that the school district had a valuation of \$63,440,060 that the census takers show 2194 students; that the state pays budget balanced schools \$102 per student.

Mr. Thompson pointed out that only one out of thirteen schools is budget balanced. He further added 600 students ride the 15 daily bus routes; that the school owns 23 buses; that 5 of them have 101,000 to 140,000 miles each on them.

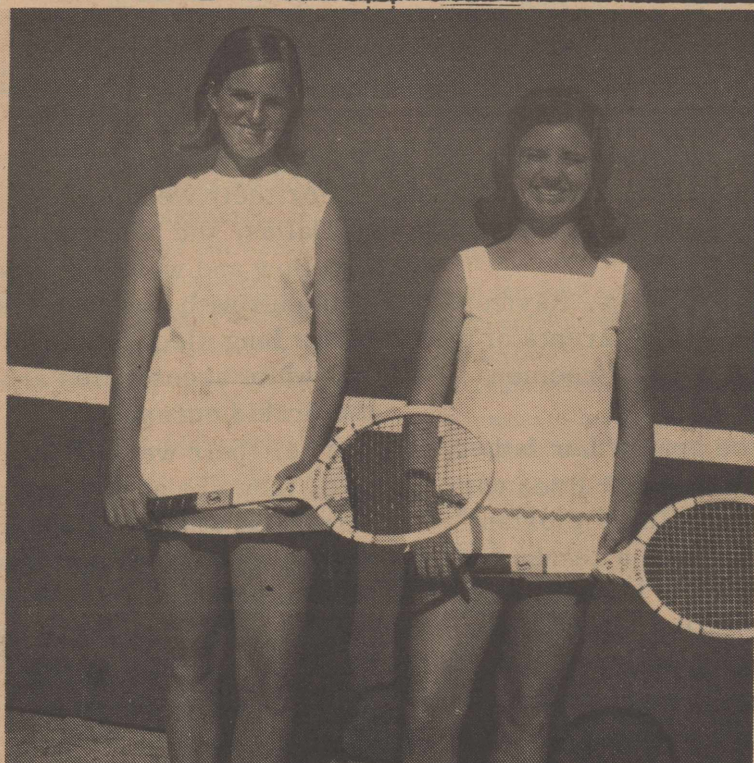
Being considered by the school board in the new budget are new school buses, a library for the elementary school, new custodians for the field house, food services and the million other things it takes to run a school system spending that much money.

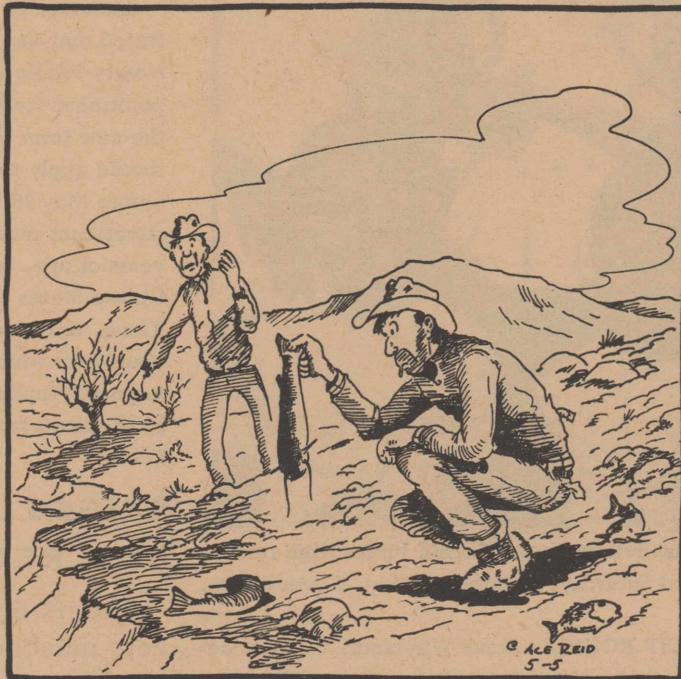

Notaries Public Informed About Reappointment

Secretary of State Martin Dies, Jr. announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term which begins June 1, 1969 and ends June 1, 1971, must pay the required fee and file a new oath and bond with the County Clerk between May 1, 1969 and May 15, 1969, inclusive.

Mr. Dies emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State inasmuch as the law specifically requires that the County Clerk approve Notary Bonds and forward copies of the Application to the Secretary of State.

Secretary of State Dies further stated that any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment for the beginning of the new term on June 1, 1969, should apply to his County Clerk before May 16, 1969. The applicant must be at least 21 years of age, a citizen of the United States of America and Texas, and a resident of the county for which appointed. The required Application Forms may be obtained from the County Clerk.
