Disappointments are forgotten, pressures are released, and tension is gone when simple rules are followed.

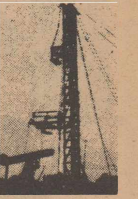

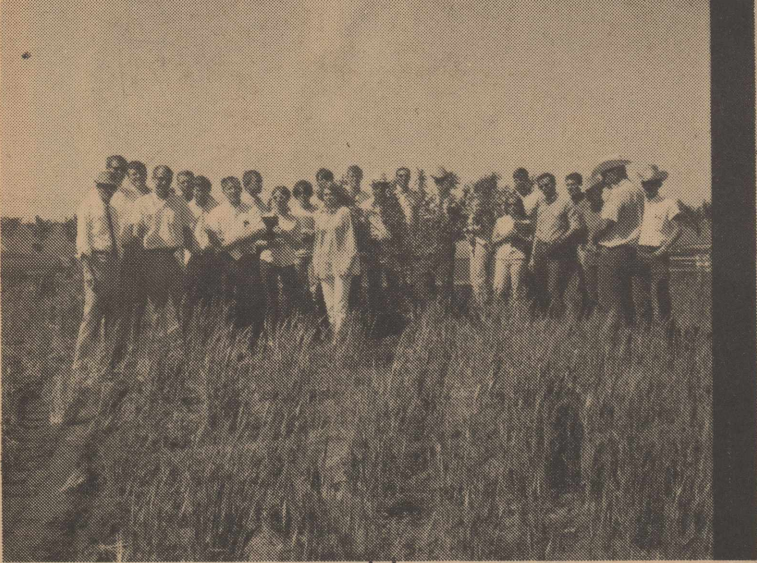

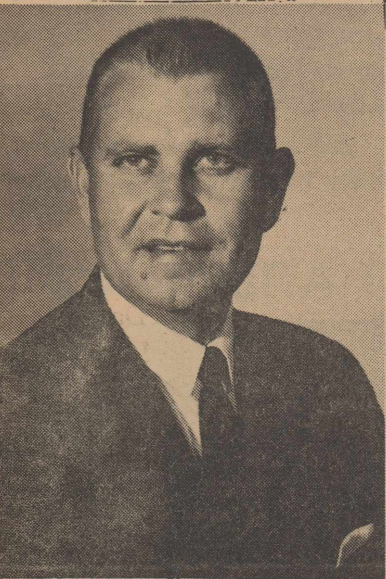

Cotton growers were reminded today that the period May 5 through May 9 is the time for voting on whether a cotton farmer may sell or lease his farm's cotton allotment for 1970 and so transfer it for use on another farm outside the county (but within the State). A "yes" vote by at least two-thirds of the county's cotton farmers who vote in the referendum will permit such transfers to be made in 1970 for a period of time agreed on by the parties involved.

LOOP'S GINS GINNED 9666 BALES OF COTTON

Last Thursday night Bert Davis, manager of the Loop Cooperative Gin, Loop, Texas, stated that the gins had ginned 9666 bales of cotton last ginning season.

Auditors, Edwin E. Merriman and Company, gave only \$111,174.40 of liabilities with a capitol stock in equity owned by farmers in the area of \$493,841.62. Income for the year was \$345,020.39 with total expenses being \$216,380.87 and a net margin for allocation of \$128,639.52.

H. L. Hill will continue as president, A. R. Faulkenberry as vice president and Bryan Jones as secretary.

The regional cooperatives returned \$52,697.42 and \$48,049.84 in stock.

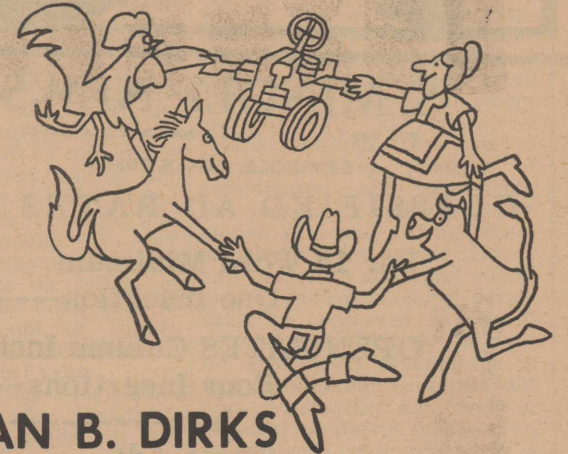
He was a nephew of Mrs. Marvin Lewis. (This story is run to remind people that there is a war on and generally it is so far away until it touches us or a relation of a friend.)

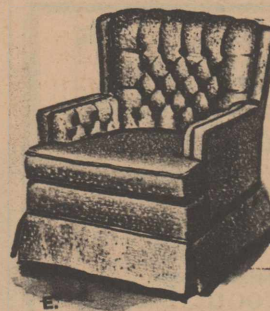

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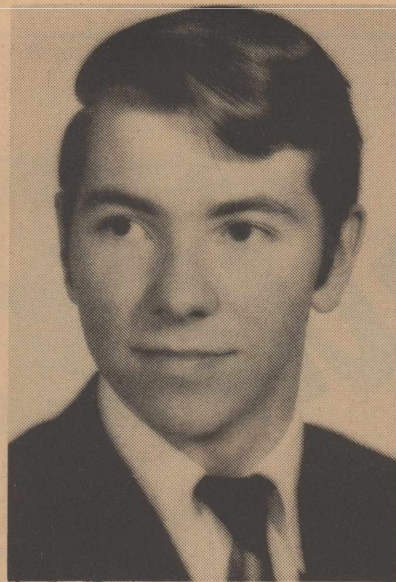

John Buford Johnson, now a senior in the high school at Glenallen, Alaska, is a winner again this year.

John, age 17½ years, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Johnson (nee Delores Buhman) and former residents of Seminole and Andrews, Texas.

Last year, John was constantly on the honor roll in the Glenallen High School. His project in physical science won second place award in the regional contests at Copper Basin Science Fair (this is equal to the Regional U. I. L. contests). His project last year was in hydrogenation with a display of bottles, tubes, Bunsen burners, etc. He was also selected, last year, to go overseas as a Foreign Language Student.

John has won again this year. He has been on the honor roll constantly, his physical science project this year was in "The Hydrogenation of Fats and Oils by Improved Laboratory Apparatus". With this he won first place in the senior division of physical science in the Glenallen High School (equal to the regional U. I. L. contest). Seven schools participated in this contest. He received the first place trophy with his name, etc., a first place certificate, and a pin on which was recorded statistics and facts of the contest.

In addition to this first place award, John has made the highest overall points - 94 out of a possible 100, and an opportunity to enter the Greater Anchorage Science Fair at Anchorage, Alaska.

In the Anchorage Fair March 28 to 30th, 1969, the competition John met was the "hottest" it has been for several years. His project, described above, was awarded third place in this contest (equal to the U. I. L. State contests). There were 11 contestants from the Glenallen High School entering the Anchorage contest, with 9 of them receiving awards. There is a possibility that these winners may also enter their projects in the larger Science Fair at Fairbanks, Alaska at a later date.

John will graduate from the Glenallen High School this spring. Like many other senior high school classes, these students received their class rings some time ago and have had the joy of wearing them to school.

John is the grandson of Mrs. Elizabeth Johnson, and has many other relatives here in Seminole.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR8)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
 Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:
 "Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of:
 "(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or non-citizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years;
 "(2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;
 "(3) Needy blind persons;
 "(4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.
 "The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation in these programs as it deems appropriate.
 "The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws

making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of such assistance payments only out of state funds on behalf of such individuals shall not exceed the amount of Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) during any fiscal year.
 "Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this Section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning September 1, 1969 and ending August 31, 1971: Three Million, Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$3,600,000) for Old Age Assistance, Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) for Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, and Twenty-Three Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$23,900,000) for Aid to Families with Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and otherwise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes.
 "Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to

the state for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enacts such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons.
 "Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state."
 Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in August, 1969. At the election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting "FOR" or "AGAINST" the proposition:
 "The Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of the needy aged, the needy blind, the needy disabled, and the needy dependent children and their caretakers; establishing Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) as the maximum amount that may be paid per year from state funds for assistance only; allocating and appropriating additional sums supplementing current legislative appropriations for assistance grants; and authorizing the Legislature to enact such laws as may be necessary in order that federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (HJR8)

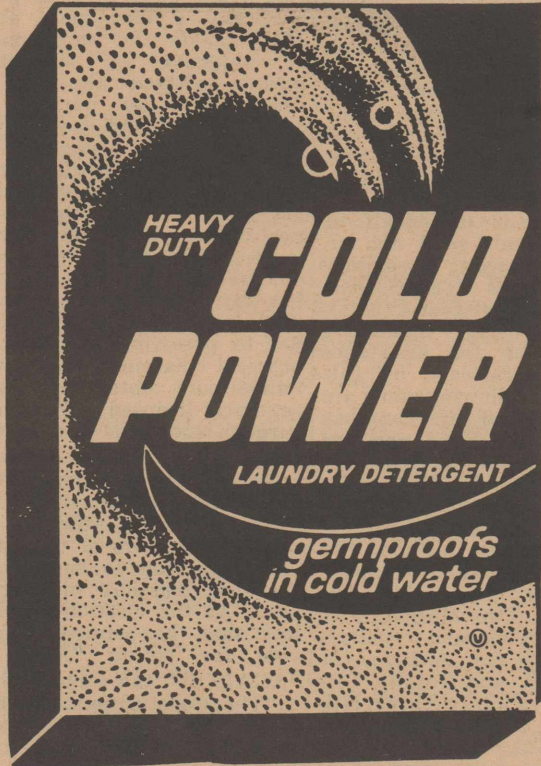
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
 Section 1. That Section 5, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended, be amended to read as follows:
 "Section 5. The Legislature shall meet in regular session each year at such time as may be provided by law and at other times as convened by the Governor. When convened in odd-numbered years in regular session, the Legislature shall devote the first thirty days to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty days of such session the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters then pending; and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as

may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business during this session by an affirmative vote of four-fifths of its membership.
 "Regular sessions in even-numbered years, commencing in 1972, shall not exceed sixty days and shall be limited to legislation on the subjects of providing funds for the support of functions and activities of the state government and emergency matters submitted by the Governor in messages to the Legislature. At each regular session, commencing in 1971, appropriations shall be made for the support of functions and activities of the state government for the next fiscal year."
 Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide for annual legislative sessions."

**Information From
Social Security Office**

Lillie Belle Baker was disabled at birth. Her father, Eugene S. Baker, died in 1944 at Wink, Texas and her mother died a few years later. Based on the Social Security Law in effect at the time of Mr. Baker's death, nothing was payable by social security as he had not worked and paid in social security tax for a long enough time.

Time passed and brought about many changes in the Social Security Law making it a possibility that Lillie Belle might be eligible to receive some help from social security.

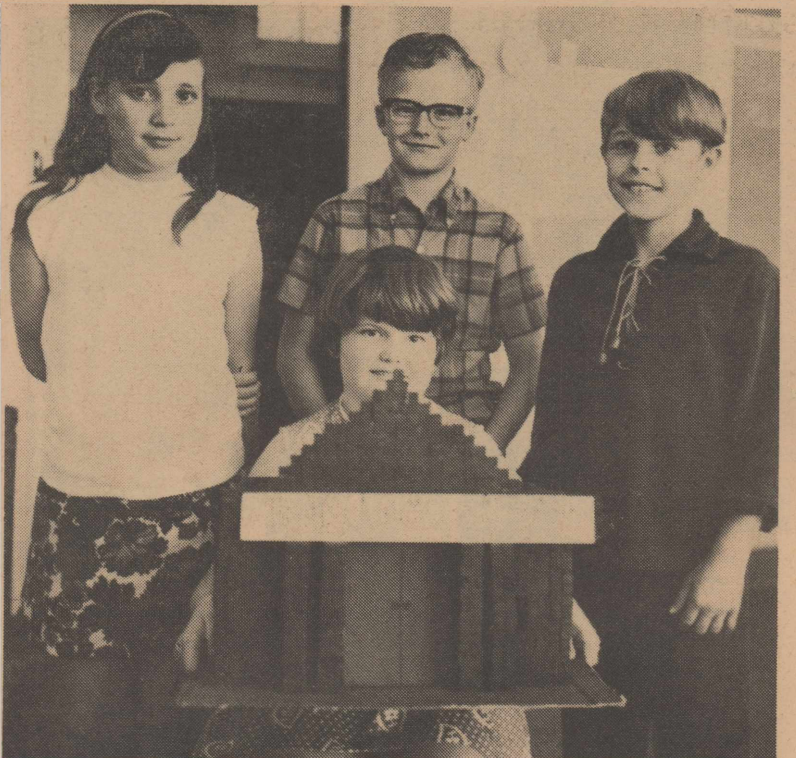
The inquiry of a concerned and interested relative living in a distant town recently brought to light this most unusual case in the Winkler County area.

When the inquiry was made it was promptly forwarded to the Odessa, Texas Social Security office and brought to the attention of Dorothy Feazell, Field Representative, who services Winkler County. Miss Feazell, called on Miss Baker and her brother, Jack Baker, who has been sharing his home with her and looking after her since the deaths of their parents. An application was taken, necessary proofs and medical statements were secured and sent to our office in Baltimore, Maryland for a decision. The medical evidence indicated that she had been disabled before age 18 and her application was approved.

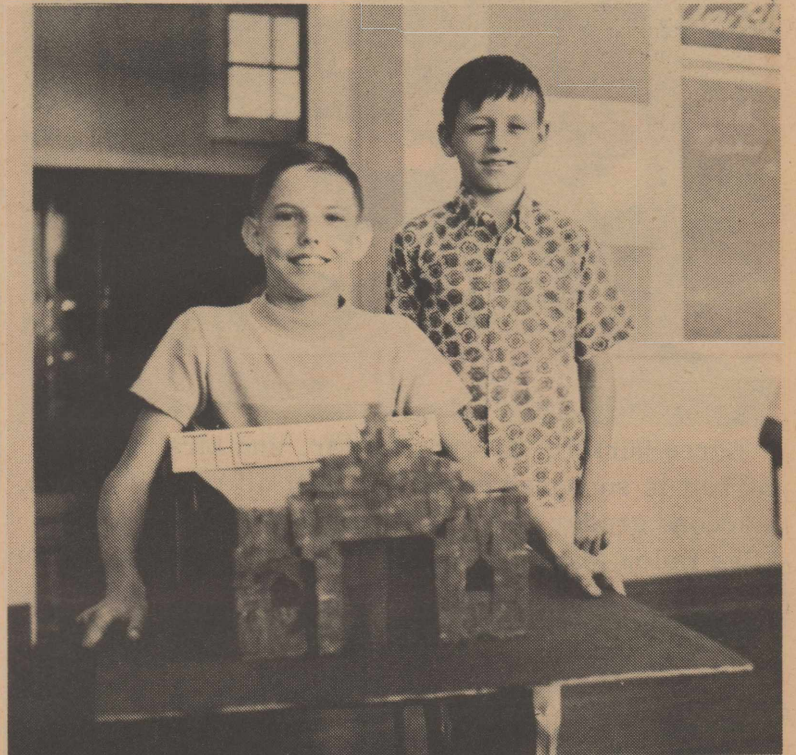
A short time ago the mailman delivered a check for Lillie Belle representing her retroactive monthly benefits and a regular check will now be delivered each month.

There is also another outstanding feature to our story of Lillie Belle Baker for during the processing of her claim it was found that she was also age 65 thus meeting the requirements for Medicare. This is a "First" in the history of the Odessa social security office--a disabled adult child who also qualified for Medicare!

The social security administration records are strictly confidential. Permission was secured from Lillie Belle and her

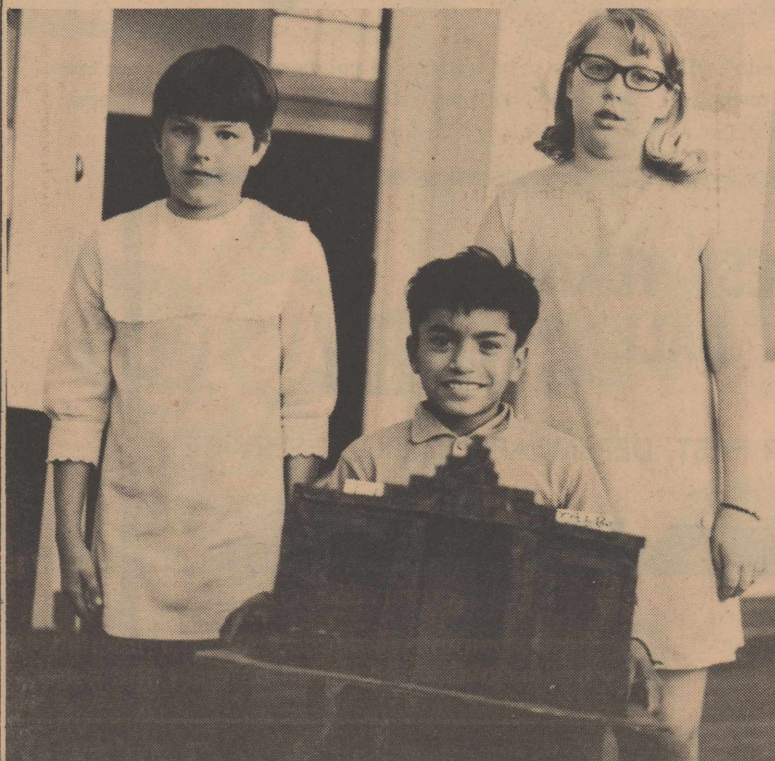

When stories like the one about Lillie Belle Baker are published, it serves to inform other persons who might be entitled to social security benefits, and to reduce the number of persons who might lose benefits because they are not aware that they are eligible for them.

SUMMER SCHOOL TO OPEN JUNE 2

A summer school will again be operated for Seminole school pupils, Supt. James Bramlett announced today. Courses will be offered for pupils in grades 3-12 on a voluntary basis with tuition set at \$15.00 per student per class.

The summer session for pupils presently in grades 3-8 will begin on June 2 and end July 14 with July 4th as a holiday. Each course will meet daily for two hours and any course will be taught for which as many as ten pupils enroll. Last year two courses in reading and one in mathematics were taught for pupils in these grades. No credit is given for work in these grades and promotion will not depend on summer school attendance, as the main purposes of this work are remedial or enrichment.

Parents of pupils in grades 3-8 will be sent a notice and enrollment form and they should return the enrollment form with the tuition to their child's principal no later than May 9.

Pupils in high school will be offered work on a credit basis and here too any course will be taught if ten pupils enroll with tuition also \$15.00 per half-credit. Dates of the secondary summer school will be June 2 through July 21 with the 4th as a holiday.

To repair this sort of leaks it is necessary for certain main water lines to be turned off temporarily. Please be patient while they're being repaired.

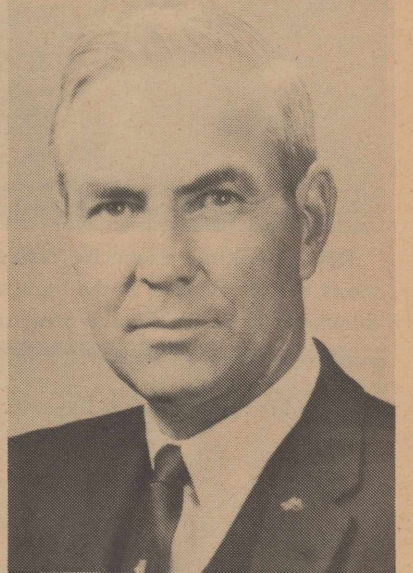

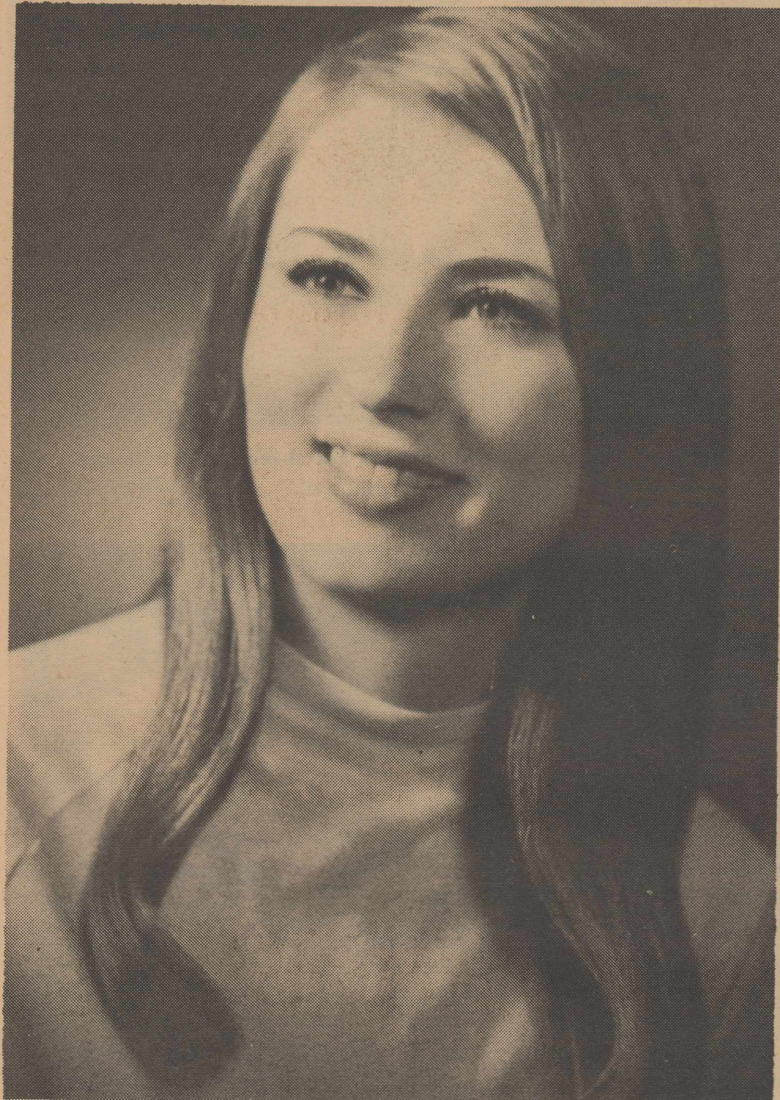

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USE 1040X TO FILE AN AMENDED RETURN

This is error correction time down at the old Internal Revenue Service. Of course many taxpayers get a nice little letter from the computer asking them to correct some little error such as wrong social security number, no W-2's or not enough W-2's, or missing signatures. In most cases you simply fill out the form that the computer folks send to you and send it back and the computer does the rest. However, communication is a two-way process--Internal Revenue also hears from thousands of taxpayers who forgot to include some item of income or who forgot to take a very important deduction or tax credit that is worth money to the taxpayer.

The good tax folks are always happy to have taxpayers correct their errors, but they insist that "X marks the spot." If you are going to amend your return, please send in a 1040X. This raises the red flag to the tax folks who feed the information to the computer, that you have already filed a return that is incorrect, but here is the correct information. When the computer gets the 1040X information it usually takes a few thousandths of a second to realign all the wrong information, send you a refund check, give you credit for the extra tax, or even send you a bill. The thing to remember--put it on a 1040X, when you amend or correct your tax return.

It was one of those "kind" of marriages. The kind the preacher does not like to perform. Obviously the couple had waited too long. No, that is not the right way to say it - obviously the couple hadn't waited at all! Now they were in trouble and trying to do the honorable thing. . . trying to make the best of a situation that was unfortunate, embarrassing and SINFUL. Now they had to have a service that they hoped would make an honest man and woman of a couple of frightened kids.

My involvement started when the telephone rang at 1:15 in the morning. I sleepily took the receiver from Carrol and mumbled, "Hello". The voice on the other end of the line said in subdued tones, "This is Larry Logan. We have come over from Artesia to get married. Can you marry us now?" It took me a few moments to shake the sleep out of my mind. Then I asked the question I always ask, "Have either of you been married before?" Larry answered respectfully, "No, Sir." Next I asked if they were members of the church and again received a, "No". I told them to come down and I would talk to them. They were looking for a preacher, just any preacher. Since they were from across the state line and not familiar with the city, I had to give them directions for finding the house.

I dressed hurriedly, turned on the porch light and waited with a dozen questions rushing through my mind.

Was it a joker playing a rather bizarre prank? Frankly, I hoped it was.

Why didn't they get their own preacher to perform the ceremony? Perhaps they didn't know one. After all, I can still remember the funeral I conducted where not a single one of the relatives was acquainted with a preacher of any kind.

Was it a couple of kids who had run away from their parents? Maybe I would be able to talk them out of it. If so, I might have to call their parents for them and try to explain why they were so late getting back home. Just maybe this might wake the parents up and they could begin building a good relationship with these youngsters.

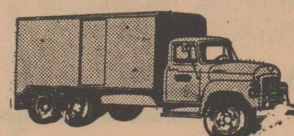
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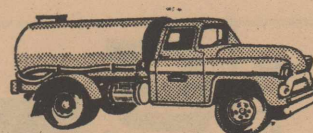


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AROUND TOWN *By Jackie Squires*
