




WIFE SHOOTS HUBBY From time to time, the Police Beat happens to receive a story where the wife shoots her hubby. This happened again this week and it went like this:





"Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this Section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus to or on behalf of: "(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or non-citizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a com-bination of physical and men-tal handicaps; "(3) Needy blind persons; "(4) Needy dependent chil-dren and the caretakers of Tax Clearance Fund and are Children. Such allocations and dren and the caretakers of such children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and otherwise shall be subject to these programs as it deems "The Legislature shall have "The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate

"Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitu-tion; provided further, how-ever, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condi-tion of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state.'

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in August, 1969. At the election the bal-lots shall be printed to pro-vide for voting "FOR" or 'AGAINST" the proposition:




Sixteen boys participated in the over night camp and competitive events that lasted about four hours Saturday morn ing.



Homeowners across the United States and Canada were urged by the American Insurance Association today to join in Spring Clean-Up activities by sprucing up their homes and throwing out trash and clutter which may have accumulated during the Winter.

Old newspapers, oily rags, and other rubble are a fire hazard and create fuel upon which fires feed, the Association cautioned.

Spring Clean-Up Week serves as an annual reminder to make homes fire-safe and protect both lives and property by disposing of such trash.

In most communities, provisions are made to put trash on the curb at designated times. to be picked up and carted away in sanitation trucks.



This picture in 1919 or 1920 has 3 outstanding features, (1) the girls in their high top shoes, (2) the 3 door model-T Ford, and (3) the railroad track in the background. The girls were Lou Mattie Stork, Chrystal Ansley, and Ethyl Stork. Some of you young ladies think that long hair stacked on top of the head is a new fashion; you might observe the girl in the middle. (Skirts might come down too!)

The 1918-1919 model-T Ford had several outstanding features. It was a 3 door, but the door on the drivers side did not open. This car also had air conditioning if the air from the side was not enough. The windshield could be set at any angle you wanted it. This car would run on mag (not nag), and it was a two seater with running broads. Women in those days could get in and out of these high riding cars much more decent than women of today. The front tires on the spoke wheels were 30" by 3", the back tires were 30" by $3\frac{1}{2}$ " - they were the big ones.

Its doubtfull that the car ever had to backup many hills in this country. No doubt low gear went out in some sand beds and the car had to back out.

The railroad dump in the background must have been raised at least a foot. The tracks for the old Midland and Northwestern were removed in 1925. The last train ran to Seminole in the later part of 1920 or the early part of 1921. (If you have definite information please call.) The picture was made near the present site of the Scott Doss home in the South East portion of Seminole.



"Don't underrate the importance of this annual clean-up program," urged T. Lawrence Jones, president of the Association. "In fact, let us hope it will serve the purpose for which it was designed, to remind Americans that homes should be kept clean and firesafe every day of the year."

To underline his remarks, Mr. Jones added:

"Every 49 seconds, fire breaks out in some home. In 1967, fires in the United States took 12,200 lives and caused property losses aggregating more than \$1.7 billion. With normal care, many, many, many fires could be avoided.

Spring Clean-Up Week is observed at different times in various parts of the nation, most often in April or May.

The American Insurance Association recommends that during the special period set aside for the campaign locally, householders go through their homes, room by room, and throw out any combustibles which might help feed a fire.

A check of the attic, as an example, will turn up old newspapers, discarded clothing, old radio sets, unwanted furniture, worn-out mattresses, old shoes, lamps and appliances in need of repair, old letters and magazines. One incipient spark, and the householder may have a costly fire.


Bedrooms, too, can create potential fire hazards. Old clothing stored in closets, which will never be worn, should be donated to some charitable organization or thrown away.

In the kitchen, cooking is done daily over open flames or electric stove cooking units with temperatures capable of starting fires if they come in contact with dish towels or other combustibles. "Be vigilant, not only during Spring Clean-Up Week, but at all times," Mr. Jones stressed. "To protect your family and your property against fire, plan ahead, practice good housekeeping, and develop safe habits. And don't forget that good housekeeping includes a periodic check for - and the elimination of - fire hazards."



How's Your Fire IQ?

Spring Clean-Up Week is a good time to rededicate ourselves to preventing fires and test our knowledge of how to go about it, says the American Insurance Association.

It's important, during Spring Clean-Up Week, to go through the house from top to bottom, seeking out and eliminating accumulations of unneeded things, like old newspapers, which provide fuel upon which fires can feed.

To point up some of the facts about fire, the Association suggests you check yourself on these questions:

QUESTION: In what room is a fire most likely to occur?

ANSWER: The living room. The Occupancy Fire Record on fires in one and two-family dwellings prepared by the National Fire Protection Association discloses that 37.2 per cent of all fires in dwellings start there.

QUESTION: What about other rooms?

ANSWER: The second most dangerous place, with regard to the possibility of fire, is the kitchen, where the cooking is done, and where 21.6 per cent of all dwelling fires start. Third is the bedroom, 12.8 per cent. And 11.6 per cent of home fires start in the basement, where the house heating unit is located in the majority of homes.

But no room is immune. Fires also start frequently in the utility room, in closets, attics, bathrooms, attached garages, hall stairways, dining rooms, and on porches and other outside areas.







Coach Bice said, "This is sweet revenge - getting to beat old Frank. "



Hints for Baby Sitter (COMPLIMENTS OF GAINES COUNTY FARM BUREAU, JOHN LAWSON, MANAGER)

If you are a baby sitter, or about to become one, there are certain things you should know to help you do the job well, says the American Insurance Association.

And Spring Clean-Up Week is a good time to learn or refresh your thinking.

The Association offers these suggestions:

• Your first baby sitting jobs should be for parents you already know, and with children you already know. A good personal relationship with parents and children is essential, and you can develop such a relationship effectively if your first jobs are with people who know you, and know you are responsible, reliable, and like children.

• If the family has a watchdog, make friends with it immediately. You can't do a good job unless the dog is on your side.

• Before you start the baby sitting job, ask the parents to show you all the exits. so you can select the best one if fire occurs. Ask them to provide you with the name and phone number of the family doctor, for use in case of emergency. Know how to call the police.

• Keep the children out of the kitchen, if possible, and make sure that matches are out of the children's reach. Children also should be kept away from electric cords and appliances — these are not playthings.

• Have the parents provide you with a flashlight for use in case the lights should fail.

• Ask the parents to tell you at what hour they expect to return, and to telephone you if they are unavoidably delayed.

• And keep this in mind always: In case of fire, get the children out of the house immediately, and ask a neighbor to call the fire department, in that order. After that, notify the parents about the fire.
