I visited another government office yesterday and the last people in the world who I intend to lose faith in is my government and its authority and its representation of me and for me.
But please, when I come into your offices, make out like I'm welcome. The office was not created so you could have a job; it was created so you could wait on me. The reception clerk said something like this, "what do you want?" There were eight or ten people at or near their desks. I was the only customer there. I was told to wait.

Shortly a man came by, looked on the list, and waved me back to another desk, without introduction. This form was pulled, that form was pulled and still another form was pulled. We filled out forms like mad for a period of fifteen minutes. Ques tions were asked; the interview finished. I was still the only customer in the building.

There were several things that I observed. 1. The man at the desk next to where I was sitting was telling someone over the telephone that he needed an exact birthdate on him; that he had three different ones in his file. 2. Another man had cut a crossword puzzle from a paper and was working it - laying inside a folder of work.
But there were some outstanding features about the office. All the desks matched, all had better chairs than we have in our office, better filing cabinets and better kept floors. All they lacked was attitude.

If you came through the front door of this office and were not received with anymore enthusiasm than a lot of govermment offices it would indeed be sad for the owners. It would make no difference whether you met Bettie Wilson, Madeline Sheltons Pattie Phillips, Jackie Squires, or Rose Arrezola.
No doubt, everyone in the office has their problems. No doubt, some of them are insurmountable. I'm also amazed at how some of the ladies "keep their cool'' under certain circumstances. But they do and I'm glad.
The cost of being pleasant is not only inexpensive, it devel-

Farm hand SOIL STEWARDSHIP WEEK IS A NATIONWIDE OBERVANCE

Soil Stewardship Week, a nationwide observance which places em phasis on man's obligation to God as stewards of the soil, water and other related resources, is being observed locally, May 11-18, accord ing to Roy Wicker, Chairman, Gaines-Andrews Soil and Water Conservation District.

This year's observance with the theme "Confronting the Issues", underscores the responsibility which each citizen has in dealing forth rightly with current issues involving stewardship of renewable natura resources. The local conservation district and some 3000 companion districts throughout the nation along with their State and National Associations are sponsoring the event for the 15th consecutive year.

Confronting today's issues in this complex world is certainly a problem. To begin with, there are more people. More and more people are now living in cities or their suburbs. In the U. S. the attitudes toward natural resources, as toward so many dther values, are changing. People are becoming more particular about resource uses.
With more people in more places imposing steadily greater demands on the limited supply of natural resources, it becomes more and more apparent that action must be taken. Waste and erosion must be avoided along with fouling, disorder and ultimate shortage Three-fourths of the land making up the nation's contiguous 48 states is privately owned. With the land are all the interrelated resources of timber, game, fish, wildlife and much of the water. Clearly, this is where the biggest and most difficult job of conservation and resource development must be performed in the future.
The men and women entrusted with leadership of America's 3000 conservation districts are turning the corner to new areas of broader resource service to entire communities -- in addition to agriculture. The counties, towns and cities of the U.S. are confronting increasingly difficult problems of community service and protection for the environment. These are critical tests for local government. Conservation districts, along with the public and private organizations associated with them, must use their combined resource knowledge to establish a more effective town-country partnership for the common good.

To make the needed continued progress in resource conservation, a combined effort is needed. The issues which confront the people of the nation must be considered to modernize the policies and devise new systems for more effective resource management.

Seminole High School students interested in summer school work for one-half credit should present their name, cours desired and a \(\$ 15.00\) deposit for tuition to the high school principal, V. N. THE LAST TIME A THE LAST TIME A
TRAIN RAN THROUGH SEMINOLE

Last week the news asked readers to give in formation concerning the last time the train ran to Seminole, Mrs. Hugh Castleberry called last Friday and gave the following information: "No there were no bridges on the Northwestern Midland track. They built the dump up through the draws and the last train ran in 1920. Mr. Castleberry had been to El Paso; he rode the trai to Midland and on out to old Florey." She went on to say that they bought the old Florey town site in the 30 's after having moved to Seminole in 1912. Andrews always claimed that Florey was in Andrews county, but when the boundry lines were established it was in Gaines County.

That Florey in those days had a combination post office and store with the living quarters in the back. There was the depot, 4 houses and the school house.
The depot now sits south east of Seminole on the Hughes place on the east side of the road It was rebuilt into a dwelling. At old Florey today, the well is still being used with the windmill tower. About all that is left is the foundation of the school house. "The school house served as the center of community affairs. Beside a school it was used for Sunday school and church, picnics and candidate speaking.

But it was not the clothes they wore that impressed me most. It was the forced front, the strained expressions, the general air . . this is something we must go through with, and the sooner the better. That bold, brave front that couldn't be hidden, even if the bride had worn a Neiman-Marcus gown, the groom a \(\$ 200.00\) tux and they had all arrived in a Cadillac convertible.
Some preachers would not perform ceremonies under these circumstances. While I wouldn't for a moment condemn them for not do ing so . . . I couldn't do anything else.
So I led them through a ceremony. I admit my usual wedding remarks just didn't fit this situation. I'll have to admit I did a little preaching. I tried to prepare them in five minutes for a lifetime of marriage. I spoke of the responsibilities of a husband and father and a wife and mother. So there we stood . . . a couple of frustrated kids, hearts filled with fears and questions . . . a set of heart broken parents . . . and a preacher feeling helpless, knowing perhaps too much about what was ahead for them. I prayed that God would be with them and help them to build a home all could be proud of.
I could not help but wonder if perhaps they were not more sinned against then sinning. What could the parents of both have done to prevent this? Had they taught them that love is the most patient thing in the world? Had they failed to teach Larry that true love doesn't demand the unlawful thing? Why had Louise not been taught that real love resists and controls and restrains. But now it was too late for these lessons had been neglected . . . to teach what live, love and sex is all about, or Larry and Louise had neglected to listen.
Have you ever been to a dry-eyed wedding? This was one. Few are the weddings at which some tears are not shed. Usually the bride sheds a tear of joy. Her parents often shed tears of joy min:gled with a little sadness. Yes, people cry for two reasons, extreme joy or extreme sorrow and occasionally a gentle mixture of the two. BUT THERE WERE NO TEARS AT THIS WEDDING! And I know why. You see, after people cry so much the tears just refuse to come anymore. This message was written in the faces of the wedding "party". The tightness around the eyes, the drawn look of the cheeks, the redness, the set of the jaw, the tense lips, . they told the story . . . I will not cry . . . I must not cry . . . I cannot cry ANYMORE!
They tried so hopefully to make something beautiful of the occasion. Yes, they would like to have it in the preacher's study .. as if it were some holy place that would impart an air of dignity to the proceedings. If they only knew how often bitter regrets poured forth mid uncontrollable sobbing . . . if they only know how often the preacher could only pray for a strengthening of the distressed and utter the words of the Master . . . Go thy way and sin no more. The minister's office is not always a place of refreshment to the righteous . . . so often it is the resort of the downcast.
It, too frequently, is a place where tales are told . . . tales of tragic indiscretions, broken dreams, mutilated aspirations, lost self-respect, scarred lives on parade.
