

Telephone Exhibit

Seminole residents will see the story of telephone service -from Alexander Graham Bell's first telephone to the laser communications of tomorrow--when Telemobile arrives on Monday, June 9.

Telemobile is Southwestern Bell Telephone Company's exhibit trailer. It will be open free to the public on the Seminole square from 8:45 to 4:30 p.m.

The exhibits show the story of progress made by the telephone industry since its beginnings. In the trailer's first section, visitors will see early model telephones and learn how their growth brought about today's vast telephone network.

NORMAL PLANTING PERIOD

Final dates for the normal planting period of cotton and feed grain have been set for Gaines County. The final date for cotton is June 15th and the final date for feed grain is July lst. This means that if you lose your crop ahead of these dates either by hail, sand, wind or water, you must replant in order to be eligible for price support payments. If you lose your crop after these dates and desire to plant the acreage to another crop, you may get acreage credit by filing an application and paying an inspection fee at the County ASCS Office. Be sure to file the application before planting the other crop.



Survivors include one son, Morris Gray of Abilene, one brother and two sisters.




