# Leroy Armistead Shot

Murder charges, with intent to murder, have been filed on Dale Telfer in the shooting of Leroy Armistead in Austin, Texas, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Armistead of SW llth Street, Seminole. Armistead is a 1960 graduate of Seminole.

Word was received of the shooting last Wednesday morning by his parents at 2 a.m.

Lt. Merle Wells, of the Austin Police Department, told the Seminole Police that Leroy Armistead was shot at close range. His parents report that a portion of his stomach had to be removed where the bullet entered and passed on through his body in the lower abdomen.

The News was further told that he was working at the time he was shot for an investment and insurance company.

Word was received in Seminole Wednesday morning at 2:30 A.M. that Leroy had died shortly before. Funeral pending.

## Jeff Hays Dies

Jeff Hays, a 28 year old farmer, 405 SW 14th, was found dead in his pickup 25 miles southeast of Seminole at 12:15 Monday morning, evidently from gunshot wounds. His wife, Ginger Hays, formerly Ginger Luttrell, took their children to the swimming pool Sunday afternoon between 4 and 5 and found a note when she returned saying that he had gone to the farm. When he did not return she became worried and called Raymond Anderson, a friend, to check on him sometime after 9:00.

He and Troy Hays, a brother, travelled to a farm that Jeff was farming 5 miles west and 1 mile south, but failed to locate him. Then they went to a farm on the Gaines - Andrews County line beyond the Bill Cox Gin and found him dead in the cab of the pickup which was sitting at an irrigation well.

They returned to Seminole and reported to the Sheriff's Department.
W. E. Cox, Jr., Justice of the Peace, pronounced him dead at the scene at 1:30 a.m.

Another note was found in the car pocket of the pickup. The radio was on and the key turned on ACC (Accessory position).

Funeral services will be held at 3 p. m. today in the Ave. B. Church of Christ with Bill Allen, Minister, officiating. Bur-Cont'd on P. 3

### GREAT PLAINS CONSERVATION PROGRAM DEVELOPED

In 1966, "The Big Four Farm" consisted of over 3,000 acres of dryland cropland. A Great Plains Conservation Program contract was developed on the farm with the owners, George Norman, R. O. Parker and C. T. Beckham. The owners had previously put the farm into the Cropland Adjustment Program.

After consulting with the Soil Conservation Service and developing The Great Plains contract, they started to work. Since the entire acreage was dryland, the first step was to establish a dead litter cover in which to seed the grass. After one-waying the seedbed twice, about 2900 acres was drilled in a crop of forage sorghum. This crop was shredded during the growing season the first year to keep down seed production until frost killed the sorghum.

In February and March of 1967, the weeping lovegrass was drilled into the forage sorghum stubble. Since that time it has developed into what George Norman describes as a "beautiful stand of grass".

This acreage was, however, the easiest part to get a stand of grass established on. The real problem existed on a 120 acre block which was a very old cropland field. Here, the field had blown down to clay and caliche in many places with sand piled high around the edges. Much of the sandier part was seeded to weeping lovegrass following the dead litter cover and a good stand obtained.


The heavier clay presented a different problem. The first operation on this consisted of using chisels to rip the clay up and roughen the surface of the soil. This made it possible to catch some sand on the roughened surface to mix with the clay. By keeping the surface rough, enough sand was caught to try and seed a dead litter cover. This was done in 1968 but due to the heavy clay soil, sufficient litter was not obtained on all of the old field. Cotton burs were then spread over the barren areas to provide cover in which to seed the grass. The field has now been seeded to weeping lovegrass and Lehmann lovegrass. With this accomplished, the owners have but to sit back and wait for the grass to become established. When this occurs, the entire farm, except for a 152 acre cropland field, will be established to perennial grass.

Anyone wishing to see this 3,000 acre "grass patch" can easily take a self-tour of the farm. This can be done by taking the first county road going east from the Seagraves highway just north of Seminole. The farm starts three miles from the highway with the county road going right through the middle of the farm. Anyone seeing this should agree that conservation work such as this certainly adds beauty to our countryside.



In the local store, Mr. Burks has 23 years experience in the grocery business; Junior Sernil, assistant manager, 10 years; Kenneth Buck, market manager, 30 years; his helpers, Suelma Villalvia, 2 years, and Flossy White, 1 year; Roger Cooper, produce manager, 10 years; checkers, Ruby Johnson, 11 years; Maurine King, 8 years; Eugenia Glass, 6 years; and other employees, Henry Guteriez, stocker and checker, Larry Wicks, stocker and checker, Wallie Arrizola, Larry Upham, Jim Miller, Mrs. Lenora Burns and Steve Nelson with 5 years between them. 





The Texas Highway Patrol reports 5 accidents this week. Those investigated by Highway Patrolman Kenneth Selman were:




Bozo the clown has invaded the library! There are now 68

"Something has happened to us. They're poorer than we are but have a much greater respect for authority."

After thinking on the above statements for days and months, I am of the opinion that it's time the American public gives back to the American law enforcement agencies their proper authority and slaps the hands and maybe the face of politicians in higher courts, that are more interested in the vote of the rabble rowser than Mr. Working

Our Cindy may be right. For, after having lived with the working class of people in Brussels, Belgium, two summers, she loves their sense of decency, their hard working habits, their station in life and their ability to behave themselves. I am of that generation where teenage boys didn't get too big to whip if they misbehaved, that boys didn't dare think about getting married till they were old enough to make a living, that hard work and sweat was honorable and if you were big enough to curse a man, you were big enough to get whipped.

This voter is fast losing patience with the alibis of politicians, explanations of courts and the stupidity of intellectuals who head marches. Maybe, just maybe, recent elections in New York and Los Angeles where voters turned to different leaders who leaned more to conservatism will shake others in higher places.

"It is a measure of the country's sickness that hits particularly hard at the citizen just returned from a fearless stay in Europe. In Amsterdam, Brussels and Paris, this citizen strolled the streets at night without giving it a moment's thought. It goes without saying he would not dare to do so - without an armed bodyguard - in New York, Washington, Chicago, Detroit, Cleveland or Gary, Indiana.

"Yet, the poor in Amsterdam, Brussels and Paris are so much poorer than the poor in America that any comparison would be a joke. In all three cities, the poor exist on what some of the American poor spend on cigarets and booze. In the U.S., the dole is permanent. In Holland, Belgium and France, the welfare recipient is stricken from the rolls after a few weeks if he refuses to accept any kind of a job that is offered him. If poverty is the root cause of crime, then Amsterdam, Brussels and Paris should be off-limits to all but troops

Europe is safer than America because there the cops arrest Dutchmen, or Belgians or Frenchmen - not members of a minority group. Since the criminal in the U.S. is given all his constitutional rightsand then some - it might be refreshing if some day he could be arrested as a plain American. By itself, the label denotes equality."

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
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
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
