

James Walker Kennedy, well-known resident of Gaines County, died Monday morning at 7:10 a.m. in the Permian General Hospital in Andrews, Texas. He had been hospitalized since last Thursday and had undergone recent surgery in Houston. Death was attributed to a heart attack.

Services will be held at 3:00 p.m. today in the West Side Church of Christ in Seminole. Officiating will be Don Fleming. Burial will be in the Seminole Cemetery, directed by Seminole Memorial See Page 2

SEMINOLE, GAINES COUNTY, TEXAS 10¢ July 2, 1969 A gaping hole in the mason building caused by the explosion at Fireball Irrigation, 703 S. Main.

"With malice toward none— With charity to all."



At 9:29 p.m. last night an explosion rocked Seminole and the Seminole Volunteer Fire Department rushed to 703 S. Main. the building occupied by Fireball Irrigation Company. The complete building suffered severe damage when some sort of gas exploded, blowing out a portion of the rear wall and the south wall. Inside partitions were Highway Patrolman Phil Upton moved, causing extensive damage to the complete building.

Upon arrival the fire department found a bottle of acetylene gas on fire. Bill Barrett, fire marshall, pointed out that the bottle on fire had not been in use. However, the neck of the bottle was broken off.

He further estimated \$12,000 to \$15,000 damage.

No one was injured. What caused the fire to ignite is not

On June 18 this paper had a news editorial concerning the Southwestern Appraisal Company and their appraisal of all lands and personal property in the county. The editorial pointed out that the above company had done appraisals in the following counties, Aransas, Castro, Limestone, Ward, Yoakum, Victoria, Tom Green and Jim Hogg; schools, Decatur, Groesbeck, Lamar Consolidated, Mart, Tom Ball, Hill-Daisetta, Lyndale, Kingsville, and Clyde; cities, Decatur, Addison, Lewisville and Kingsville.

Evidently the appraisal company is well equipped and well qualified for the type appraisal they are to do in Gaines County. Because of a law suit that exists today in Tom Green County the commissioners court of Gaines County and the school board are being asked in this editorial to please check on the following things.

1. Have as many classifications as necessary, if it takes 25, to classify every type land; 2. have the spread of land prices with plenty of range; (example: from \$1.00 an acre to \$250 per acre if necessary); 3. have appraisal company provide data to back up every classification; 4. produce in writing classifications, descriptions, and prices so that neighbors will not be unhappy with neighbors, ranchers will not be unhappy with farmers, farmers will not be unhappy with businessmen and all of them will not be mad at the commissioners court and the school board; and, 5. make public classifications, prices and valuations so that every tax payer might

The News has been advised if these steps are taken, placing the burden of proof upon the appraisal company instead of upon the school board or the commissioners court, that our problems in Gaines County and the school district will be cut to a near zero

The ranchers of Wall Independent School District, just south of San Angelo, have entered into a law suit (not against Southwestern Appraisal Company but against the school board) for relief under the new appraisal. Evidently the school board was not furnished with ENOUGH BACK-UP DATA to justify their explanation to ranchers concerning re-evaluation.

The News is of the opinion (1) that a re-evaluation is good, (2) that is was necessary; (3) that it will work out for the good of the school district and the county, if it is done properly and correctly.

Let us insist upon a job well done by the appraisal company then there will be no need of the commissioners court being called to question or an unpaid school board receiving unjust criticism.

FARMERS SHOULD REPORT CHANGES IN HIS FARM PLANS AND OPERATIONS TO ASCS OFFICE

Responsibility often rests with the farmer to notify his county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service county office of changes in his farm plans and operations. This reminder came today from Chairman Troy Martin of the Gaines County ASCS Committee. "The County ASCS office needs to know, for instance, if your allotment crop is destroyed by weather and you plan to plant a different crop, if your practive under the Agricultural Conservation Programs will be delayed beyond the completion time, if you are in any of the programs ad ministered by ASCS and you buy or sell or lease farmlands, "said the ASCS Committee Chairman.

"Most farmers know they should notify the county ASCS office about such matters, "he added, "but sometimes in the midst of a busy time they forget. And sometimes this can cause difficulties which could have been avoided."

He pointed out it is not usually necessary to visit the county ASCS office in person, "Often a phone call or a short letter is all that's necessary. Then, if the county ASCS Office people find more information is needed, they will let the farmer know."

"Of course, visitors to the ASCS Office are always welcome, "he said. "Not only do we find it easier to keep the records straight for the farmer who comes in, but we also keep ourselves better inform ed about the entire agricultural picture."

The local ASCS Office is located at Seminole, Texas, in the County Courthouse, Room B-7.





A LANDMARK GOES

Fifty-seven years ago Sam Malone's father gave his son and daughter-in-law a 5-room house that had just been moved from S. W. Ave. C and 2nd St. There were several outstanding features of the home; the trim on the gables, the window with a window seat, and a kitchen on the front. "Why, people just come from all over to see that bay window", said Mrs. Malone.

"The old Gaines County Hotel had just been bui't. The Boyds owned it. There was no Andrews then, no Hobbs, no Lovington and no Lamesa", so said Mrs. Sam Malone. "The house was a wedding present from Robert Malone. The Joe Dennis home, just south of there was owned by the W.S. Dunns, who were ranchers. I was Georgia Jenkins before I married. The Boyds were kin to the W.B. Austins. They had one girl and five boys."

"We all pitched in and built the first Presbyterian Church and everybody helped. Then, later on we all built the Methodist Church. Sam's brother was the first to be married in that building and Sam and I were the second couple to be married there. Then our oldest daughter was the last to be married in that building."

"In those days we didn't have any doctors, any hospitals or any nurses. The young people just helped take care of all the sick."

"We lived in the house three years and Sam decided to go to Simmons College in Abilene, to study. We moved here the last day of 1905 and drove about 200 head of cows down from near Lockney, Texas. We moved the cattle out near what is now Old Florey."

"A few people lived in town", Mrs. Malone went on to say, "but most of them had homesteaded and had to live on the land. The draw south of town was such a pretty place. The only trees in the county were there. We had the nicest times and nicest picnics there."

Bert Ancell bought the house in 1928. Pauline Ancell said that Howard Deen built onto the house as his first job when he came to Seminole. "We built onto the house twice," she said. The Ancell's bought the house from 'Top' Hurd. He was a cattle buyer and was in business with W.A. Cox, who was an insurance man here. 'Top' Hurd, I think, bought the house from Tom Ross.






MEDICARE PROGRAM CELEBRATES THIRD BIRTHDAY JUNE 29TH

As the nation's Medicare program celebrates its third birthday on June 29th, Medicare has covered 1, 008, 600 hospitals stays of elderly people in Texas. And there were more than 56, 800 admissions for posthospital extended care. Payments under the hospital insurance program in Texas totaled \$485, 033, 000 for the 3-year period, and a total of \$193, 707, 000 has been paid under the medical insurance program. The success of the program can be shown statistically, but the real proof of what is meant to the personal lives of elderly people here in the Seminole area and the country over cannot be measured with statistics. Because of Medicare, many thousands of older people who might have put off or gone without care have been able to afford treatment. Millions have the peace of mind that comes from knowing that an illness will not eat up a lifetime's savings or make it necessary to call upon their children for help in paying medical bills.

Generally speaking, Medicare claims have been filed properly and processed timely. However, we know that an individual may need assistance in filing Medicare claims. 

In 1931 Seminole had the one building that is presently the Junior High School Building, which has been added onto since then. The school was served by four busses which carried between 100 - 125 students. Eighty-five thousand dollars worth of bonds were voted and not nearly all of it was spent to build this building. One trustee said, "Seminole will never need to build another school building."

As the buildings grew, so have the busses and the bus routes. Today the school system owns twenty-five busses and runs fifteen routes. They drive between 1500-1600 miles a day or an average of about 100 miles per route. They travel approximately 275, 000 miles per year. Six hundred and four students make up the passengers on the fifteen routes.

Of the twenty-five busses, two are 1957; three are 1967; the balance were bought in 1958, 1959, and 1960.







IN 1908-1910 THE FIRST IRR-IGATION WELL WAS DRILLED IN GAINES COUNTY, TEXAS . THE WELL WAS LOCATED A-BOUT TWENTY MILES SOUTH-WEST OF SEMINOLE, IT WAS DRILLED BY W.B. EUBANKS AND HIS FOUR SONS THE PIPE OF WATER WAS THREE INCH-ES IN SIZE. THE WELL WAS DRILLED ABOUT 3'X4' WIDE AT THE TOP AND WAS HAND-DUG DOWN ABOUT 10-20 FEET AND MACHINE-DUG SOME DEEPER. THE WELL WAS DRILLED BY HORSE-POWERED DRILL AND THE HORSE WENT ROUND AND ROUND LIKE ON AN OLD HAY-BALER OR A STUMP-PULLER. THE WATER WAS USED TO WATER VEGE-TABLES BUT DID NOT PROVE TOO SUCCESSFUL.

THE BELT-DRIVE FROM THE GASOLINE MOTOR TURNED THE OPEN SHAFT THAT DROVE THE CENTRIFUGAL PUMP, LIFTING THE WATER.

SOME PEOPLE SEEM TO THINK THIS WAS THE OLD WARD WELL BUT IT SAT BE-LOW HACKBERRY GROVE IN THE DRAW SOUTH OF SEMI-

SINCE THE WEATHER TURNED COOL BACK IN NOVEMBER. THIS NEWSPAPER HAS BEEN LOOKING FOR A PICTURE OF HOG KILLING TIME. THIS IS IT AND WHAT A HOG! TOM FINCHER IS SHOWN IN THE PICTURE WITH THE HOG. THE YEAR WAS 1937, IT TOOK A STRONG WINDMILL TO HOLD UP THIS 700 POUND HOG. NOTICE THE BLOCK AND TACKLE THAT HAS BEEN USED TO RAISE THE HOG, ALSO THE SINGLETREE THAT WAS USED TO LIFT HIM WITH, THE HOOKS ON THE SINGLETREE HOOKED INTO THE TENDON RIGHT ABOVE THE HOG'S FEET, CLAUDE FINCHER (TOM'S SON) BOUGHT THE HOG FROM BARNEY ELAM IN 1937.

WHAT DID THEY DO WITH A HOG THIS BIG? NO DOUBT, MANY GALLONS OF LARD WERE RENDERED. (FOR SOME OF YOU PEOPLE WHO CANNOT REMEMBER THE 1930'S, CRISCO AND OTHER COOKING FATS WERE UNAVAILABLE.) THE BIG THING WAS MONEY.

MANY BOYS ON THE FARM WERE TAUGHT JUST HOW HOT TO GET THE WATER IN THE BARREL, HOW MANY ASHES TO PUT IN IT TO MAKE THE HAIR SLIP ON THE HOG. (HOW MANY OF YOU EVER HAD TO SHAVE A HOG?) ON A HUGE HOG SUCH AS THE ONE SHOWN HERE, TOW SACKS OR CROAKER SACKS WERE LAID OVER THEM TO HELP HOLD THE HEAT AND NEARLY BOILING WATER WAS POURED OVER THEM SO THE HAIR WOULD SLIP LOOSE.

THE HAMS PROBABLY WEIGHED 85-100 POUNDS AND THE HEAD A LIKE AMOUNT, THAT WOULD MAKE A LOT OF HOG'S

OTHER FINCHER SONS ARE LLOYD AND ARVIL. NOTICE IN MR. FINCHER'S HAND HE HAS A HUGE BUTCHER KNIFE AND IS GETTING READY TO GUT THE HOG. THIS WAS A GOOD TIME OF THE YEAR AND FRESH MEAT WAS USUALLY A PRE-MIUM, WHICH MADE HOG KILLING TIME A PLEASURE.

IT MUST HAVE BEEN SOME CHORE TO REMOVE THE KNUCKLE-BONES AND PUT THE SALT, PEPPER, SUGAR AND OTHER PRESERVATIVES ON THE HAMS AND SHOULDERS. FRESH BACKBONE AND FRESH SAUSAGES JUST COULD NOT BE BEAT.





THESE TWO PICTURES ARE BEING PRINTED SO ALL OF YOU CAN SEE THE LOCATIONS OF THE TWO WATER WELLS ON THE SQUARE. ONE SUPPLIED THE N.E. CORNER OF THE COURT HOUSE AND THE OTHER THE WATERING TROUGH ON THE SOUTH WEST CORNER PLUS FURNINSHING WATER TO PEOPLE WITHOUT WELLS. MAYBE THIS WILL SETTLE SOME OF THE ARGUMENTS AS TO WHERE THE WATER WELL WAS LOCATED.





Placing in the track meet in Lubbock, Saturday, June 28 were the following girls:


