RAY TRENT
Ray Trent, Denver City businessman, has formally announced his bid for election to the 73rd Legislative District post vacated July 1 by State Representative Randy Pendleton.
Trent, insuranceman and laundry owner, former employee of Phillips, Shell and Skelly Oil Companies in the Permian Basin, is campaigning for election to the Texas House of Representatives in the July 22 special election in Yoakum, Gaines, Andrews, Martin, Lymn and Dawson Counties. The election was called by Gov. Preston Smith following the resignation of Pendleton who was named to Smith's Washington, D. C. , staff.
A conservative, Trent has been a resident of Yoakum County for the past 25 years. He was born and reared in central Texas, the son of a farmer.
The candidate is married and the father of four children. He is a member of the Methodist Church and is a member of the Denver City Chamber of Commerce.
For a period in 1968, he was publisher of the Plains Record, the newspaper at Plains, Texas.

Trent said that he entered the legislative campaign so that the 73rd District may have a conservative voice in the state capital.

Area farmers throughout the county met Monday evening in the meeting room of the court house to hear basic farm program requirements discussed. Preceding the meeting, Claude Hearne of Seagraves was elected as the Businessman Director for the Plains Cotton Growers. D. C. Jeffries serves as the Farmer Director. Hearne replaced Joe Ander son, who chose not to run for a new term.

Mr. Ed Dean, representing Plains Cotton Growers, told the 72 farmers and visitors present that the Cotton Growers had taken in 2 more counties, making a total of 25 . He discussed the promotion the association had and research they were doing. He pointed out that 540 miles of traps for the boll weevil control program are in operation trying to keep the boll weevil off the South Plains.
James C. Hodges, ASC Office Manager, pointed out in the meeting basic farm program requirements, asking area farms to do the following four things:

1) Sign up for the program.
2) Plant within the program.
3) Certify by specific dates within the program
4) Work the crop in a work-like manner.

Golden ripe peaches in an orchard are a beautiful sight to behold and everyone with a fancy for this luscious fruit is invited to take part in the Gaines County Peach Tour on Friday, July 18.

The Annual Tour will get underway at 9 a . m. at the west side of the county courthouse here in Seminole, announces Calvin Holcomb, Gaines County Agricultural Agent. The tour will end at about 1:00 p. m.

Orchards to be visited include the C. B. K. , Oliver, Bel-Air and Freeman and Moore Orchards. Harvesting and packing operations will be observed and a new $\$ 60,000$ packing shed will be visited.
A special attraction during the tour will be a visit with the Gaines County Peach Queen, Vicki Wallace, of Seminole. Miss Wallace was second runner-up in the recent state peach queen contest.

Two horticulturists with Texas A\&M University's Agricultural Extension Service will also be on hand to observe the peach crop and to comment on various phases of the peach industry. They are Dr. Arlie Powell of College Station and Dr. Jody Worthington. of Stephenville.
The Peach Industry is big business in Gaines County and a definite boost to the overall economy, points out Holcomb. At present, there are about 2,200 acres of peach trees in the county with some 1,500 of them in actual production.

 handGAINES COUNTY FARMERS TO PARTICIPATE IN NATIONAL FARMERS UNION FLY - IN PROGRAM
Gaines County farmers, N.B. Fields, L. M. McA doo, Hugh Newton, and Claude Hearne, all of Seagraves, will be in Washington July 13 through 15 to participate in a National Farmers Union Fly-In Program. Several Texas farmers representing various commodities and growing areas will join the Gaines County producers on the Washington trip.
The group will be in Washington when Congressman W. R. Poage of Waco, chairman of the House Agriculture Committee, opens hearings on his farm bill, which will make the present farm legislation permanent.
Farmers Union supports the extension and permanency of the authority provided under present farm legislation. Those participating in the Fly-In Program will present economic data to members of Congress to support the Farmers Union position that the present farm legislation, including price supports and direct payments on cotton, feedgrains and wheat, are essential to the welfare of farmers and the rural communities.

On arriving in Washington on Sunday evening, July 13, the Fly-In group, comprised of farmers from across the nation, will be briefed by the legislative staff of the National Farmers Union. Besides attend ing the farm program hearings, the Fly-In participants will be contacting all members of Congress to discuss farm policy and to explain the economic problems of agriculture in their home states and communities.
In describing the "Fly-In" legislative approach, Jay Naman of Waco, (Texas Farmers Union president), said, "The National Farmers Union sponsored Fly-In Program is an important tool for farmers to use to get their views heard by the Congress and people high in the Administration. As the Congress begins to focus on farm policy, it is important that we have the grass roots viewpoint of working farmers and ranchers in Washington to visit with city as well as rural congressmen. Whether or not we get an extension of the price support and payment programs, may depend upon the effective work of these farmer and rancher citizen lobbyists, "Naman said.

AGRO RESOURCES INC. BUYS BARRETT POTATO FARM
On June 18 the News reported a $\$ 3$ million sale. The other part of the story follows.
A new firm, Agro Resources, Inc., which recently established headquarters in Hobbs, has announced the acquisition of the Barrett Potato farm in adjacent Gaines County, Texas. The sale involved 5,400 acres of farm land as well as potato processing and cold storage facilities at Air Base City, north of Hobbs. President and chief executive officer of Agro Resources is John H. Schultz formerly of Los Angeles, who recently moved to Hobbs.

Schultz said that Fred S. Barrett, former owner of the potato farm and its storage facilities, "with his many years

of experience in farming in this area, and key employees in organization will continue with Agro.'
The Agro president further revealed that the firm earlier this year acquired 10,539 acres of other farm lands in Gaines and Andrews counties, Tex., and in addition to these, the corporation currently is operating approximately 6,400 acres of farm land in the West Texas area under lease.
Schultz said it was believed that these properties constitute the largest farm operation in this part of the country.

Agro Resources also recently acquired and is operating the 320 - acre Bel Air Farms peach orchard and processing facility in Gaines County. The orchard is just now coming into its first year of commercial production, he revealed.

Other principal crops grown this year by Agro, he asserted, will be summer and fall irsh potatoes, grain sorghum, cotton, peanuts, alfalfa and wheat.

The potatoes will be processed at the firm's facility now being completed at A ir Base City. At the peak of harvesting and processing season, Agro will employ a pproximately 250 persons, many of whom will be working in the processing facility at Air Base City.

 ADMINISTRATION REPORTCharles Reed, County Supervisor of Farmers Home Administration, Seminole, Texas, reports that Farmers Home Administration begins a new fiscal year July 1st.

Lee Bailey of Seminole, Texas, is Chairman of the FHA County Committe, Ray Black of Seagraves and Hearne Freeman of Loop, Texas complete the 3-man county committee.
During fiscal year that. ended June 30th, 1969, the county office processed 15 Operating type loans in the amount of $\$ 138,000 ; 4$ Farm Ownership loans in the amount of $\$ 120,000 ; 10$ rural House Loans, \$140, 000; 4 Soil \& Water type loans, $\$ 18,500 ; 51$ Emergency crop loans, $\$ 686,000$; and 2 Economic Opportunity loans loans, $\$ 4,500$.
Total loans made $\$ 1,107$. Collections ending June 30,1969 were $\$ 800,000$.
Mr. Reed reported that only 20 families had delinquent notes as of June 30, 1969 as compared to 170 that were delinquent at the end of the drought December 31, 1957.

Board of Trustees of the Andrews Independent School District and has been a volunteer fireman for Andrews for 15 years.
In making his announcement, Burton emphasized that he would maintain his home in Andrews, retain his job with Pan American: so that he would not be dependent upon the small salary paid by the state, nor the influence of special interest groups and lobbyists in Austin.
Burton pledged that he will visit each county in the 73rd Legislative District on a regular basis in order to keep in close touch with the needs and problems of the entire district, and that his home would always be open to his constituents.

The Bel Air orchard is harvesting a first crop from three year old trees that were planted on a $30^{\prime} \times 30^{\prime}$ ' setting with approximately 15,000 trees.
Rainfall has been light in the area this year and trees have been watered two times with $\frac{1}{4}$ mile skid lines. The $\frac{1}{2}$ section of trees is watered by two irrigation wells.
Mr. Schuler pointed out that they had had customers stop from many states, New York, Kansas, Tennessee, Illinois, Montana, Ohio and New Jersey. "At least", he said, "I remember this many states. "
Bel Air Farms has a storage of approximately 2000 bushels. Mr. Schuler invites Seminole residents and visitors to visit on Friday. (A lot of the high school girls are also working there. If you want to see a real peach queen, visit the orchards next Friday.)

ester Ericson, general man ager for CBK, Inc., said, "The company now has 1200 acres of peaches and will plant 280 acres more next year. "The Dixie Red variety has all been processed. The company on Monday had just begun the running of the freestone peach, the Ranger. Other varieties on the farm are Red Globe, Red Skin, Jefferson, New Jersey \#193, and a small amount of Melbas.
Long trailers, that held five boxes of 18 bushels each, were filled with hand picked peaches from the field. Arriving at the shed, the approximately 5500 pounds of peaches are lifted off, a box at a time, and run first of all through a de-fuzzer. The de-fuzzer is made of rolling nylon brushes that remove the fuzz from the peach.
From this machine the peaches traveled on conveyor belts to the hydro cooler, a machine that could cool 100 tons of water per hour to near freezing. A pproximately 75,000 pounds can go into the cooler and will take about thirty minutes to process same. From the near freezing temperature and the de-fuzzing machine the peaches are graded and boxed in cartons of $70 \mathrm{~s}, 60 \mathrm{~s}$, 50 's, and 40 's, depending on the size of the peaches. Mr. Ericson pointed out that the company had been selling to Furrs, Safeway, M\&M and other quantity buyers.

A U.S. No. 1 peach is sold in three different sizes, $2 \frac{1}{2}$ " and up, $2 \frac{1}{4}{ }^{\prime \prime}$ and up and a $2^{\prime \prime}$ minimum. No. 2 peaches are $17 / 8$ ! How many motors does it take for a packing shed? This packing shed is located at the old George Norman orchards. "We have five control panels with 33 electric motors. If a motor goes out in the middle of the operation, all motors back to the starting point stop. In this way the supply of peaches does not stack up on any one station when one motor becomes overloaded or burns out. ${ }^{\|}$
Helping Mr. Ericson with the operation was Joe Green, who looked after the employees in the packing shed. The cold storage available was about 2500 boxes. It was pointed out that a bushel of peaches weighed 50 pounds and that boxes of peaches weighed 38 pounds.
The Norman orchards were only watered two times this year but the Wolfe orchards, owned by the company, had to be watered a lot more because of the small amount of rain.

## THE OLD TIMER

Mr. Walter Woods and Seminole News Readers:
I sweltered last night and all day yesterday. I was called by my renters wanting air conditioners, so this morning I took off for the cool mountains and I was in Las Vegas, New Mexico at 12 noon Texas time. Now I didn't break the speed limit, only stopped one time for gas and it is 310 miles. We drove out to our cabin to eat lunch and it's now six o'clock Mountain time and we have pulled the heavy curtains back so the sun can shine in on us as we are getting cool and will have to build a fire or go to bed when the sun goes down. It is hard to believe that you can drive in to a land of delight in five hours and look out at the mountains and the beautiful forrest of large trees and get away from the uncomfortable heat. Now I am not trying to advertise my mountain retreat to sell it for I love it too much to part with it, but I want my friends to help enjoy it. lone and I spent three weeks up here in May and went back to Seminole to get ready for a trip to Georgia, my old home state where I grew up, but have been away 60 years at Seminole, Texas. There is 9 of the dozen children still living, my oldest sister will soon be ninety and I am next living oldest, three boys and six girls and four of the girls have out lived their husbands. Most all are prosperous in the mountains of North Georgia and Tennessee, raising cattle and chickens. There are many chicken houses on each little farm, raising fryers and using the fertilizer to enrich their land and many work in bed spread and rug factories. Where that business started when I was a boy by an old maid named Jessie Evans in our community and she went to the cotton mill in Dalton, Georgia and persuaded them to make her the yarns and tufting to make the first spreads and Bates, a farm boy, learned the business from her and the Bates spreads are known everywhere and he is a millionaire. I played baseball with him several times and my brother, Carter Pittman, has been his attorney all these years. He has sold out and retired recently.

I took Griff and Peggy by the Martha Berry School for Mountain boys and after she got Henry Ford interested in her worthy work he spent several million dollars on building for girls also I entered her school in 1903 it was started in 1902. Dr. Bertrand is president. A Texas boy who was raised at White Deer, Texas, I enjoyed visiting with him. Martha Berry, died in 1942 and was buried on the 30,000 acre campus of pine timber and many acres have been planted by the students. Each boy had a job to do, farming, cooking, laundry, dairy, clearing land. My job was keeping lights burning, large Rayo lamps, as we had no electricity in those days. Gordon Cowan, a boy I grew up with, was her business manager and bought most of this land and he was buried on the Berry Campus two miles north of Rome, Georgia. Martha Berry was a wonderful woman and gave her life helping poor boys get an education and later girls.
Walter, you won't believe it, but I am getting cold here by this old worn out typewriter so it's to build a fire or go to bed, so good night.

I just came back from the peach orchards and gathering peaches and it brought pleasant memories of yesteryear and a boy who liked to hunt, fish and eat the first green fruit-of every kind. In the early 1930's most people did without fruit in the winter time so when spring came most boys made themselves sick at least once on green fruit.

Did you ever eat wild grapes and it nearly take all the hide off your tongue? Did you ever find a wild plum thicket and wish for morning because you didn't want to die in the dark? And pecans - why, I've had my fingers green past the second knuckle, trying to get the first one. Or algarita berries-after much pleading my mother would make me an algarita pie, declaring that they had little worms in them. But the pie was so good and the worms ate so little.
The best day of a boy's life could be when he mixed a little salt with some flour, picked up a few eggs and headed for the creek and an outing all by himself, with some sort of frying pan over an open fire. Nothing was better than a couple dozen crawfish tails, $\frac{1}{2}$ dozen boiled eggs, and thorny cactus berries for dessert. (These were a little long fruit about the size of the end of a pencil that came out of a flat cactus on the ground. I don't know the name of them but a big handful would make a dessert for royalty.)
I can tell you how I fix crawfish tails. Break an egg, dip them, then roll them in the salt and flour and fry them.
And again, if you've never eaten an armadillo or fixed a soft shell turtle you've never eaten some of the better things of life. Young Russian thistles (tumble weeds) make fit greens, and are better than turnip greens Did you ever eat a 4 pound catfish all by yourself? Why go to the trouble of frying him? Why don't you just baste him? with a little homemade butter and turn him over the coals? He'll boil good, too. Too much trouble to clean him and cut him up for a frying pan. Use a healthy supply of salt and take him out just before the meat falls off the bones. And if it does, pour some of the water off and add some flour. He'll gumbo.

For greens, sheep sorrell tastes pretty good. That's a grass that'll sharpen your teeth. Then there's rabbits, squabs, no rattlesnake, please (and I know it's good), blackberries and dewberries.
The freestone peaches are ready at Freeman-Moore Orchards. It'll do you good to gather a few and just think.

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CIRCUIT CONTROLS PICTUREPHONE CAMERA--
Nearly 600 electronic components in less than a square inch make up this integrated circuit for the Bell System Picturephone set. Developed by Bell Telephone Laboratories, the module controls opera tion of the set's camera. A Bell Lab Technician uses the close-up lens on the Picturephone set to show the tiny circuit on the screen.
Western Electric, supply unit for the Bell System, is working on several dozen telephone sets that can "see"--after making more than 170 million phones that simply "talk.

While still in the developmental stage, the Picture phone is moving closer to the day when "see-while-you-talk" service will be available throughout the nation, said Harry Sawyer, Southwestern Bell Manager.

Already, early models of the Picturephone are "outmoded, " with Western currently planning pro duction of a more sophisticated Model II Picturephone set, Sawyer noted.

He said Bell Telephone Labs have replaced the conventional camera tube -- used in the first models --with its own development, a silicon target tube.
Sawyer said the pick-up surface of this tube is only a half-inch square, yet it contains 800,000 separate parts, called diodes.
"It is so sensitive that this special tube can trans mit a picture from an almost completely darkened room, " Sawyer said. "At the same time, very bright light in one part of the room will not 'burn in' one part of the tube and shorten its life."
Such features are important, Sawyer noted, be cause Picturephone sets are not designed for use by television engineers in professional-lighted studios, but rather by anyone in home or office.
Sawyer said AT\&T recently began a Picturephone service trial between Westinghouse Company Offices in New York and Pittsburgh. He said the Bell System hopes to offer Picturephone service on a limited basis in the 1970's.

A PIECE OF FRACTIONAL CURRENCY BROUGHT TO NEWS OFFICE LAST WEEK

Last week a piece of fractional currency in the amount of ten cents was brought to the Seminole News. From a book from the Gaines County Library, American Paper Money by Fred Reinfield, published by Hanover House, page 113 ,we find the history of fractional currency...
'The term Fractional Currency derives from the fact that all denominations were fractions of $\$ 1$.
The first issue (August 21, 1862 to May 27, 1863), is also known as 'Postage Currency' because the designs were identical with those of contemporary postage stamps. In fact, the earliest notes had perforated edges; the later ones had straight edges.
There were four denominations: $5 \mathrm{q}, 10 \mathrm{q}, 25 \mathrm{q}$, and 50 q .
The obligation on the obverse reads: 'Exchangeable for United States Notes by any Assistant Treasurer or designated U. S. Depositary in sums not less than five dollars. Receivable in payment of all dues to the U. States less than five Dollars.

The reverse states that the note is 'Receivable for postage stamps at any US post office.' A similar phrase appears on the reverse of all other issues.
The second issue (October 10, 1863 to February 23, 1867) carried a portrait of Washington on all denominations $(5 \phi, 10 \$, 25 \$$, and $50 \Varangle$ ). However, each reverse was in a different color.
The obligation on the obverse of the second issue reads: "Exchangeable for United States Notes by the Assistant Treasurers and designated depositaries of the U. S. in sums not less than three dollars. Receivable in payment of all dues to the United States less than five dollars except customs.
The third issue (December 5, 1864 to August 16, 1869) was made up of these denominations: $3 \phi, 5 \phi, 10 \phi, 25 \phi$, and $50 \$$. All the designs were different. The obligation on the obverse of this and all remaining issues was similar to that of the second issue.
The fourth issue (July 4, 1869 to February 16, 1875) comprised denominations of $10 \mathrm{q}, 15 \mathrm{q}, 25 \mathrm{~d}$, and 50 q . Each of the designs was different. The Treasury Seal appears on some of the notes of this and the following issue.
The fifth issue (February 26, 1874 to February 15, 1876) had denominations of $10 ¢, 25$ ¢, 50 . Each design was different.
A $15 \$$ specimen note intended for the third issue never went into circulation. It is consequently in existence only in proof or essay form."
The ten cent fractional currency that came to our office had a bust picture of Liberty, plate No. 144, and was among the 4th issue printed from July 4, 1869 to February 16, 1875.

REGINA COX SHARES A DEED OF JUNE 25, 1806
Regina Cox of Seminole would like to share a deed of June 25, 1806. The deed was given in the 32nd year of the Independence. The deed called for 100 acres of land --price - 50 Shillings --that would be $\$ 12.00$ in our money today. The deed was signed by Nat Alexander who was Governor, Captain, General and Comman der-in-chief at Raleigh, North Carolina.
Following is a copy of the deed:
STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA
NO. 691
"KNOW YE, that we, for and in consideration of the sum of fifty shillings for every hundred acres hereby granted, paid into our treasury by Starlin Edwards, have given and granted, and by these presents, do give and grant unto the said Starlin Edwards, a tract of land containing one hundred acres lying and being in the County of Ashe.
Lying on the waters of Little River and Glade Creek, Beginning at a red oak in his old line running east one hundred and thirty-two poles to a chestnut oak, then north one hundred and twenty-one poles to a stake, then west one hundred and thirty-two poles to a maple in his line, then to the first station.
Entered 25th June 1806
as by the plat hereunto annexed doth appear, together with all woods, waters, mines, minerals, herediaments, and appurtenances to the said land belonging to appertaining: TO HOLD to the said Starlin Edwards, his heirs and assigns forever: Yielding and paying to us such sums of money, yearly or otherwise, as our General Assembly from time to time may direct: PROVIDED ALWAYS that the said Grantee shall cause this grant to be registered in the Register's office of our said County of Ashe within three months from the date hereof, otherwise the same shall be void. W. In testimony whereof, we have caused these our letters To be made patent, and our great seal to be thereon affixed. Witness Nat Alexander, Esquire, Our Governor, CaptainCeneral and Commander-in-Chief at Raleigh, the 28th day of November, in the thirty second year of our Independence, and in the Year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seven.
