School Board Meets

In a $4\frac{1}{2}$ hour session the School Board okayed a $15 \, \mathrm{c}$ per hour raise for auxiliary employees last Monday night. (4) The gasoline contract was awarded to Gaines County Oil at 18.1¢ per gallon. Five other companies bid.

(5) Bud Norris was employed as a bus driver; H.B. Patterson as a driver for the activity bus.

(6) Disposal bids were rejected on the old band truck. (\$301).

(7) The tennis program was discussed at length with Jerry Franklin, coach, in attendance. In pointing out the things important to a tennis program Coach Franklin mentioned two important phases—those who wanted to play varsity tennis and those who wanted to learn the game to carry into future life activity. He pointed out the tournaments played in during the spring, the fall and the summer.



NOMINATIONS TO GSPA BOARD BEING ACCEPTED

Nominations to the grain sorghum producers board are being accepted by the Grain Sorghum Producers Association, 1212 14th Street, Lubbock, Texas. This twelve man board will be elected in the October grain sorghum referendum. It will have the responsibility of administering the funds collected to promote grain sorghum sales and to initiate and conduct research vital to grain sorghum



It's 320 miles from Seminole to Kerrville, Texas. That's where our kinspeople, the Lennos Nortons, are building their new home. They drew us a map and we were on our way, arriving at approximately 8 p. m. Wednesday. Even the entrance way was extended. We had just crossed the Guadalupe River on a low water bridge and were greatly surprised when a guard stepped out from his housing post and informed us that it would cost \$1 to get in to see them. How many of you-'ve got kinfolks that after making a six hour drive, it cost you one buck to see? (The Nortons are staying in the Kerrville State Park while their new house is being built in Kerrville, South.)

The hill country is booming in Kerr County and it's not all brought on by sheep and goats. The 65 miles distance between Houston, San Antonio and the area has encouraged weekend visitors and summer homes up and down the Guadalupe. It seems that every hill top either has a new house, a new foundation, or a for sale sign with restrictions on it. The drive up Highway 27 to Ingram, then to Hunt and on up the river would make any West Texan dream of water front property.

Thirteen deer were in one front yard, including a Christmas tree buck and another with extended spike horns. Kids were swimming, sliding down mossy dams and yelling like Tarzan as they tried out the vines over the water and going down flumes in inner tubes.

Elbert Harp, GSPA executive director, said, "any grain sorghum farmer in the referendum area may have his name on the ballot by submitting his nomination signed by himself and ten other grain farmers to the association office by September 4, 1969. " The election of this board will be held on the same ballot which the grain farmers decide whether or not they want to expand their market development and research program. Members of this board will not receive pay for their services.

Upon approval of the referendum and election of this commodity board, five cents per ton will be collected at the point of first sale of grain sorghum within a 29 county area of the high plains and panhandle. It is a voluntary program and anyone not wanting to support it may request his money back and it will be refunded promptly without any questions asked.

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Grain Sorghum Producers Association of 1212 14th Street, Lubbock, Texas 79401 proposes a referendum election on grain sorghum under provisions of House Bill 764, 61st Legislature on the proposition of whether or not grain sorghum producers in the counties of Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Hale, Hansford, Hartley, Hutchinson, Moore, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Sherman, Swisher Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dawson, Gaines, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Terry, and Yoakum shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 5 cents per ton to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members for a 12 man commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of grain sorghum.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at 1212 14th Street, Lubbock, Texas 79401 before midnight on the date of the election.

Any person within the above counties engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced grain sorghum for commercial purposes is eligible to vote including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to September 25, 1969 may obtain one at his local County Agent's office.

ELECTION TO BE SEPTEMBER 24

Texas peanut producers will decide in a September 24 referendum election whether or not to establish a self-assessment program, reports County Agent Calvin Holcomb.

Southwestern Peanut Growers Association of Gorman, Texas, has been certified by the Texas Commissioner of Agriculture to conduct the referendum vote which will include all 117 counties having pea-

The proposal would allow peanut producers to assess themselves a maximum of \$1.00 per net ton (farmers' stock basis) of production and permit them to elect a nine-man commodity producers board to administer the proceeds, Holcomb says.

Assessments would be collected at the first point of processing or sale and would be used for research, disease and insect control, education and promotion for production, marketing, and use of

Any person in the state engaged in producing, or causing to be produced, peanuts for commercial purposes is eligible to vote. This includes farm owners and their tenants or sharecroppers, if such persons would be required to pay the proposed assessment.

Ballots, with a self-addressed envelope for return, will be mailed by SWPGA September 6 to all eligible voters. Producers who have not received a ballot prior to September 9 may obtain one upon request from his office, Holcomb explained.

Deadline for return of ballots is September 24. Votes postmarked after that date will not be counted, Holcomb says.

Voters will have to certify their 1968 total peanut production on the ballots. Estimates can be in pounds or bushels: Growers are urged to check their production records at the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office prior to voting. If porduction is overestimated by more than 10 percent, the ballot will be declared void, Holcomb advises.

Qualified voters may place their names in nomination for positions on commodity producers board by filing an application with SWPGA by no later than August 24. Applications must be signed by the individual and 10 other eligible voters.

For the referendum to pass, two-thirds of the votes cast must favor the self-assessment program or votes favoring the referendum must represent at least 50 percent of the total 1968 peanut production. If the referendum fails to carry by either of these ways, it will be defeated, Holcomb explained.

Other states having similar programs to the proposed self-assessment include: Georgia, Alabama, North Carolina, Virginia, Oklahoma, New Mexico, and Florida. Holcomb urges peanut producers to consider the pros and cons of the referendum and to cast their votes during the election.

Information From Social Security Office

BY DOROTHY FEAZELL

Mr. Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue in Northern Texas has released important information concerning Federal occupational tax stamp requirements.

Persons who manufacture, maintain for use, or deal in or with the businesses or products requiring a Federal occupation tax stamp must, on or before July 1, 1969, register and pay for occupational tax stamps for the new fiscal year ending June 30, 1970.

The kinds of business or products requiring a stamp involve gaming devices, wagering, narcotics, marijuana, distilled spirits, wines, beers, and firearms.

Those planning to start a business which requires a stamp should register and pay the tax before commencing business, Mr. Campbell said.

Publication 510, "Information on Excise Taxes for 1969", which furnishes detailed information on this subject, may be obtained by dropping a post card to Supply, Internal Revenue Service, P. O. Box 1738, Dallas, Texas 75221



The YMCA camp will host 400 freshmen students, about one-fifth of the freshman enrollment, and 97 of the university's top undergraduates were selected as counselors.


YMCA coordinator Logan Weston said the purpose of the camp is to orient students on college life, A&M cus toms and traditions and leadership.




Plans were made for further mission work along the Rio Grande River and Ruidoso, Mexico. A tractor has been donated and will be taken to the mission field at a later date.







Visiting the Cokers is kind of like visiting a museum, only better. They know the history of most all the pieces and there's nothing better than a personal tour. The picture this week features 'mattas', or grinders, little ones, big ones and middle sized ones. These were used by the Indians to grind their corn and grain. A round rock was used for the beater or roller against a sandstone with a worn out place or an indentation in it. About thirty such grinders are in the collection.

"No, we've never found a cache of spearheads, arrowheads, pottery or grinders. Two or three items is the most we've ever found in one place." Cedar Lake in northeast Gaines County has proved to be the best hunting grounds for the Cokers.





PRE-REGISTRATION COMPLETED

With pre-registration completed, the staff of the Seminole school system is squared away and ready for an expected 2000 more-or-less eager pupil influx Tuesday, September 2. Last year's opening day enrollment showed 2001 in attendance.

Superintendent James Bramlett stated that all positions, both professional and auxiliary, are filled. Professional staff this year numbers 126, up three from last year. Twenty teachers new to the system will be in classrooms, either as additions or replacements, when the opening bell sounds Tuesday. There are 74 auxiliary employees, the same number as last year. This figure includes part-time cafeteria workers and bus drivers.

Tuesday will be a full day of school for all students except first graders, who attend only in the morning during the first week. The cafeteria will be open and all buses will make complete routes, both morning and afternoon. Any parent who is uncertain which bus his child will ride should contact John D. Thompson, director of curriculum and special services, at the school administration building.

Formal activities for teachers began Wednesday with an orientation session at 9:00 a.m. in the high school library for all new teachers. A general faculty meeting will get underway at 9:00 a.m. Thursday in the high school auditorium. Following this, teachers will report to their respective buildings for building meetings. Friday will also be spent in building workshops and room preparation.



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


