A three day trip to Kerrville was outstanding in many ways, but especially in seeing all the animals. It not only cost \$1 to get in the Kerrville State Park, but it cost \$1 to spend the night. But the \$2 was well spent when we immediately began to see one doe and her fawn - there's another one on his toothpick legs, and there's some more and some more and more. There were wild turkeys by the dozens. There's a mother hen with her 18 little poults. At least 15 mother hens with their half grown broods from 15 to 25 were seen. One, two or three turkey hens would cross the road, look back and their young would scamper across. I've never seen this many wild turkeys before.

Besides the abundance of turkey and deer, there were armadillos, squirrels, bob white, quails by the jillion, rabbits (both cotton tails and jack rabbits), birds (scrub jays, humming birds, bats, doves, and geese). Of course, being in the hill country, there was the ever present graceful buzzard. They are so much prettier sailing around in the sky than they are when seen at their work.

Since they've upped the price of entering the state park and spending the night a lot of Texas travelers are by-passing them. In the portion of the park we stayed in - the first night there was only one other camper. The second night there were possibly two. This includes the tenting area - the trailer area - the shelter area - and the group area. In each of these there were "his" and "hers" facilities with three units each with tile showers, hot and cold water and very clean.

On the other side of the highway were 8 or 10 campers. The shelters were screened in rooms, about 16x14 (extra cost), hook up for trailer (extra cost), electric outlets, and sewage disposal. The nice thing about Kerrville State Park was that it was not crowded? Such service! Besides the four rangers I was told that they'd had 12 auxilliary employees during the summer. The garbage crew was outstanding. They drove up to a garbage can, lifted the lid while still sitting in the truck and replaced the lid. 



Mr. Short went on to say that the house is looking more for a consumer tax while the senate is looking more for franchise taxes and/or business taxes. Where will the new taxes come from in looking for the \$335 million? In all probability from (1) cigarettes - from $3\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ to 5¢ increase per pack, (2) increase franchise tax \$1.00 ranging on up to \$1.50, (3) tax all vending machines except newspapers and under 5¢ machines, (4) increase sales tax to 3.25 which would include repairs, maintenance and other service, (5) amusement tax - probably 10%, (6) alcoholic beverages - 10¢ per serving in private clubs and on airplanes.

DRIVING WHILE INTOXICATED -CHEMICAL TESTS - CONSENT

Senate Bill #74 also passed by the House with a vote of 144-0 says "any person who operates a motor vehicle upon public highways SHALL BE DEEMED TO HAVE GIVEN CONSENT for tests to be made to determine alcoholic content of blood." Section #2 of the same act says that an operator who refuses tests CAN GET OPERATING PRIVILEGES SUSPENDED FOR ONE YEAR. "Section #3 states that a chemical analysis of blood, breath, or urine shall be admissable.

"Breath specimens must be taken and analysis made under such conditions as may be prescribed by the Texas Department of Public Safety, and by such persons as the Texas Department of Public Safety has certified to be qualified. The person tested may, upon request and within a reasonable time not to exceed two hours after the arrest have a physician, qualified technician, chemist, or registered professional nurse of his own choosing administer a chemical test, or tests, in addition to any administered at the direction of a law enforcement officer. The failure or inability to obtain an additional test by a person shall not preclude the admission of evidence relating to the test, or tests, taken at the direction of the law enforcement officer."

September 1, 1969 will be the effective date of what Texans will probably call the "Chemical Test Consent Law".

There are other new laws going into effect and one that's been needed a long time - a tail gating law. A safe distance is required between the car you're following and your own automobile. Another law states that slow moving vehicles keep to the extreme right.

The inspection fee is up 25¢ also - from \$1.75 to \$2.00. Inspection stations over the state are getting a real break - stickers will expire one year from inspection date and not all at the same time. Stickers issued during the year will have from 1 to 12 on them, indicating your inspection date.



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


