## County Tax

## Evaluation

Mary Baldwin, County Tax Assessor-Collector, released the following figures for the county-wide tax roll. The surface for the county for this year is $\$ 5,961,670.00$, oil properties $\$ 67,443,180.00$ making a total of $\$ 73,404,850.00$. This is an increase over last year of approximately one quarter million dollars or $\$ 227,800.00$.
Loop School District got the big raise in the Adair Fiel 1 and the Cedar Lake Field or units. The Seminole School District suffered a loss of $\$ 1,607,430.00$ in valuation. A comparison of these figures is shown below. 19691968 Surface $\$ 4,180,620 \$ 4,103,170$ Oil $\quad 57,656,010559,340,890$ 61, 836, 630 63, 444, 060 The surface evaluations were raised in the school district but oil properties lost the big amount. This means that for the current school year the Seminole system could lose between $\$ 35,000$ and $\$ 40,000$ in taxes.

## NOTICE TO PARENTS

This article is being written in the interest and well being of unlicensed drivers. Numbers of parents, school teachers and law enforcement officers have expressed their concern about boys and girls driving in our town without a license or with a restricted license (with a licensed driver in the front seat. The licensed driver must be 21 years of age or older and have at least one year's experience driving with a license. ) Thirteen, fourteen and fifteen year old boys and girls are asking parents, "If So \& So is driving why can't I?" "Look," they say as they're driving down the street with their parents, "there's Johnny driving and I'm six months older than he is. Why can't I drive?"
"There's Mary driving. She takes others driving with her. Why can't I drive?"
No doubt, to a teenager, one of the marks of growing up is driving a car. To any person who can remember their early driving days it was a thrill that only driving could attain. The first time out in the family car represents a giant's leap into the world of travel, power and control over speed and power.
The sheriff of Gaines County, Ed Welch, said, "I always tell them if parents are riding in the car and an unlicensed driver is driving parents are responsible.
The main thing that's wrong with an unlicensed driver - IT IS AGAINST THE LAW! If it is against the law for a 9 year old to drive a car it is just as much against the law for a 15 year old unlicensed driver to drive. Parents are urged to show their respect of the law. L. M. "Shorty" Blackmon stated "The city police are not out to harrass any young drivers. If we catch them or if they have an accident we will have to give them a ticket. Police will be doing some checking. If teenagers are found without a license and have been granted permission by parents to drive the parents also will be subject to a ticket. "
Phil Upton, Texas Highway Patrolman, said, "We've had a lot of young people lately driving with only a learners permit. They must e accompanied by a licensed driver, 21 years of age or older with one year's driving experience, riding in the front seat. If parents are in the car with an unlicensed driver we simply give a citation to the parents.

# Seminole Slaughters Denver City 

## anNUAL FARM TOUR

Thursday, September 25, will be the annual Farm Tour of Gaines County. The tour will be sponsored by the Gaines-Andrews Soil and Water Conservation District in ocooperation with the extension crop's sub-committee. The tour will leave by private automobiles at 9 a. m . from the west side of the courthouse.

Representatives of the Scil Conservation Service and members of the Extension Service will be present at each stop to answer questions Charles Mickelson, head of the local U. S. Soil Conservation Service Office, pointed out that the Outstanding Conservationist of the Year will be presented on one of the stops. The Noonday Lions Club will furnish the trophy.
2. Another stop will be at the Marion Bowers farm west of Seminole where castor bean variety tests will be shown and explained. The tests were grown in cooperation with the Research Center and County Extension Service. A cotton test also will be seen at the same stop.
3. The Willie Easter farm has a demonstration of broadcast cotton that tourists may see.
4. For another stop at the Higginbotham Cattle Company a brush control of destroyed mesquite will be seen.
Other points of interest (probably not to stop) on the tour will be beans on the Herbert Hicks farm and permanent pasture on the Higginbotham Cattle Company Ranch.
"We hope to have as many as 100 people on the tour, " Mickelson concluded.

The defender, Lavern Bennett, missed on a sure 6 point interception on the play when the ball trickled through his hands
nd fell into the hands of the Denver City halfback. The Mustangs missed their 2 point conversion.
After an exchange of fumbles in the 2nd quarter the Indians leveled out again and scored from 3 yards away with Frank Gady carrying. Quarterback Whisenhunt kicked an extra point again and it was the Indians 14; the Mustangs 6.

From earliest cowboy days cowboys have roped everything from fenceposts to girl friends, dogs, and cattle. Very few people ever had a horse fast enough to rope a deer traveling 40 to 45 miles per hour, much less a horse that was fast enough to catch an antelope, running 50 to 55 miles per hour. Pictured above is Johnnie Sartin, father of Clive Sartin and Claudia Jordan. Mr. Sartin roped the antelope on his ranch near Seagraves, Texas. Please note the size of the horse. You can tell by the length of his legs and the height of the horse that he was built for speed, but also that he was square up in front like a quarterhorse. No doubt this black horse was the fastest of his kind in about 1905 to 1906. "My dad had some good horses."
( "I can remember my dad roping one eagle. He was riding down the fence row when an eagle flew off a post and he roped him. Claudia and I played with the wings till they got to smelling so bad we had to throw them away.")
The antelope was probably grazing with some cattle in a stalk field when the rider rode up among the cattle and had to try his luck at catching an antelope. Just one loop is all you're allowed and he made this one good. At least one herd of antelope still exists in Gaines County.

Mr. Sartin was sherifí of Gaines County from 1936 to 1941.

Subic Bay, Republic of the Phillipines
On the 20th of August, 1969, aboard the USS Kitty Hawk, RM3 Steve Boyer, son of Baldy and Lois Boyer, re-enlisted in the U. S. Navy for six years.
In entering the new enlistment contract with the Navy, Boyer has received orders to Radioman "B" School, a ten month course in advanced communications electronics, and a re-enlistment bonus in excess of nine thousand dollars.
Boyer, serving aboard USS Kitty Hawk (CVA-63) and USS Merrick (AKA-97), has been in the Navy since 1965 and intends to make the Navy a carrer. A recipient of the Presidential Uni Citation, the Naval Unit Commendation, the Good Conduct Medal, the National Defense Medal, the Vietnamese Campaign Ribbon, and the Vietnamese Service Award, Boyer has made four combat cruises to the Republic of South Vietnam.
Steve is home on an emergency leave due to the death of his grandmother, Mrs. Nellie Boyer.
Steve told the News that the Kitty Hawk carries approximately 5,000 men, that its length is three times that of a football field or 1,048 feet. In 1942 a friend, Irvin Dickey, said when we were in Inglewood, California, "Let's go to Yosemite." An hour later, with food, bedrolls, and a load of anticipation, we were off.
Now, I've seen Yellowstone, Carlsbad Caverns, Niagara Falls and the flowers of Hilo, Hawaii but never was I awe struck like I was viewing the great majesty of the forest, the "Redwood Tree". Here was a giant, a growing giant. A tree big enough to build many houses, a tree tall enough and brave enough to withstand the forest fire and carried the battle scars to prove it.
I've seen big ships, tall buildings and the Golden Gate Bridge and apprciate so much their founders and builders. Here stands a prince of the forest that God planted in the order of nature hundreds of years ago and overshadows his peers and helps to humble all who looks toward the heavens.

You can visit the cities, you can visit the seashore, you can go to the desert, but there's nothing to this writer like elevation, cool weather, a mountain, and a redwood tree. The Grand Tetons are outstanding; the Great Divide is a thing of beauty. I love the Smokeys, the Ozarks and Appalachians in our wonderful country but I cast my \#1 vote for the redwood tree and forest of California.
It was a sad day in my life to hear that the 234 foot tree with the highway through it had fallen with the weight of winter's snow and fierce winds. I will always cherish that picture in my geography book and the trip through it.

There are many more redwoods to see. There is the one that Frances' brother built his threestory house around in Mill Valley California. The stairway goes up around it. Trees 300 feet high? There's redwood trees in Sequoia, Yosemite, Mill Valley and other places. Yes, I plan on going to see them again. The biggest trees in the world!

TEXAS HIGHWAY WEEK SEPTEMBER 21 - 27
Though the theme of this year's Highway Week is "Highways Bring Better Living, " the safety features built into Texas highways might vary that theme to "better highways bring longer living." Highway Week is set for September 21-27.

The Texas Good Roads Associa tion, sponsor of Highway Week, has found that the Texas Highway Department's policy of built-in safety has paid off by decreasing highway fatality rates In 1925, there were 17.5 fatalities for every 100 million vehicles miles driven. By 1968, this rate had been lowered to 5.5 per 100 million miles driven.
One of the main reasons Texas highways are safer is that the Texas Highway Department invest more than $\$ 1$ million annually in safety research.
Reduced highway fatality rates can be traced directly to the application of research results to the design of new highways and the modification of older ones built in an age of fewer, less powerful vehicles.
A now-famous illustration of the direct benefit of highway research is the breakaway sign. A rash of vehicle-sing collisions, some fatal, led to development of a sign structure that would yield on impact yet withstand heavy winds and support large signs.

The breakaway sign was introduced by Texas highway engineer more than three years ago and is now standard on new highways throughout the nation. The same is true of breakaway supports for highway lighting.
Each of these life-saving inovations yields when struck by a vehicle, letting the vehicle roll safely to a controlled stop. At the end of last year, Highway Department and university researchers had teamed up to produce another device to make Texas highways safer. This was the "Texas Crash Cushion. "
It consists of a series of steel drums connected to form a kind of honeycomb to be placed in front of a rigid obstruction. Should a vehicle strike the crash cushion, the crushing of the steel drums expends the energy of the fast-moving vehicle, greatly reducing the hazards of impact.
Texas Crash Cushions are now being used to save lives in a number of major Texas cities.

A nother safety feature which appeared in greater numbers along Texas highways during the last year was high-level lighting installations. Highway Department researchers have found that carefully placed lights suspended from high levels give a wider, more uniform level of light for
