Leon Davis, age 59, minister of the Church of Christ in Loop, Texas, died at 12:05 p.m. last Saturday in route to a Lubbock hospital. Davis was involved earlier in a wreck as he crossed over Highway 83, going north, when his car, a 1967 Rambler, was struck by a 1969 Chevrolet pickup driven by 17 -year-old Jimmy Dale McKibben of Lamesa.
The two vehicles slapped sides after the drivers tried to avoid a head-on at $11: 20 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$, at the only intersection in Loop. The driver of the pickup was not injured. He applied his brakes and skidded 156 feet. A spare tire ricocheted off another car and traveled another 828 feet up the highway. The car was hit on the driver's side, the pickup on the opposite side. GSPA TO SPONSOR REFERENDUM

Export sales and local market prices moved up simultaneously during July, reaching peaks for both since February of 1968. Elbert Harp, executive director of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association, reported, "18,167, 000 bushels were sold into the world trade last month which helped to strengthen the overall demand and local prices, with some elevators paying as high as $\$ 1.95$ per hundred this week. "

The major part of the July sales were to Japan, Israel, and India. These sales are equal to the total production of Parmer County Texas, the nation's largest producer of grain sorghum or the combined total production of Sherman, Hansford, and Oldham counties. It would also take the total production of Yoakum, Terry, Gaines, and Dawson counties to fill these shipments.

Harp said, "The more demand that can be developed either locally or over-seas, the better the prices will be to our producers." GSPA is sponsoring a referendum in early October in which the grain farmess of the high plains and panhandle will decide if they want to expan their sales and market prices through an extensive local and overseas sales promotion program Upon passage, farmers will invest $\frac{1}{4}$ cent per 100 pounds to finance this market development and research program.
