The car left the highway on the curve, went to the center median, tearing out a post and coming to its final resting place on its top.



Thanks for your comments and contributions. The information concerning trees in this issue has been taken from the Credit Union Publication.







Would that some of you fast drivers could have seen the grandmother that tenderly picked up the doll of her two year old dead granddaughter.

If it were just you that got maimed or killed, that would be bad - - - but for a few minutes of pleasure enjoyed only by you, it is a great price for someone else to pay.

What is today's education all about? For one honest view of it, I decided to asked people who should know - the kids in class. I questioned pupils in six public elementary schools of Waynesboro, Va. to find out what six key words in our school system mean to them. Their unedited answers convinced me that, despite all the complicated vocabulary used by educators, the pupils really have the most interesting definitions.


