The Gaines County Farm Bureau annual meeting was held Thursday night, October 16, at the Community Building. The meeting was called to order by the local president, Dayton Elam, who introduced the guests, Bill Reed, Lamesa, Farm Bureau State Director of District 6; H. L. "Hub" King, Brownfield, State Director of District 2; Jim Clark, Insurance director, Midland; Ed Cumbie, Farm Bureau Field man; Bill Whitmyer, Director of Research and Education, Waco; Bill Hoover, Waco, Director of Information; Tom Henry, State Farm Bureau Public Accountant, a native of Scotland, State Farm Bureau president Sydney Dean, E. L. Short, Tahoka, State Representative; Donna Noble, Loop; David Childers, Seagraves, and Buddy Bailey, Seminole, the three high school students who attended the citizenship seminar in Waco in August.

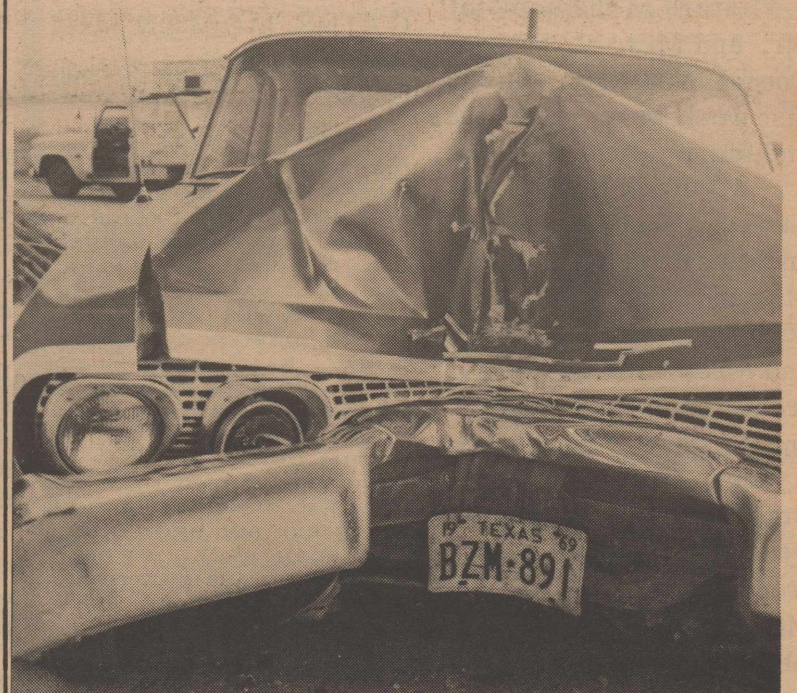
President Dean was the keynote speaker. He stated that the Farm Bureau is the largest farm organization with 1,750,000 farm families in their membership. They are organized in 49 states and Puerto Rico. Texas has a membership of 110,689 farm families and is growing.

Bill Whitmyer spoke on the new farm program. The annual report was given by Vester Smith, secretary-treasurer. It was agreed to raise the dues from \$10 to \$15 per year and to reduce the board from 14 to 9 members.

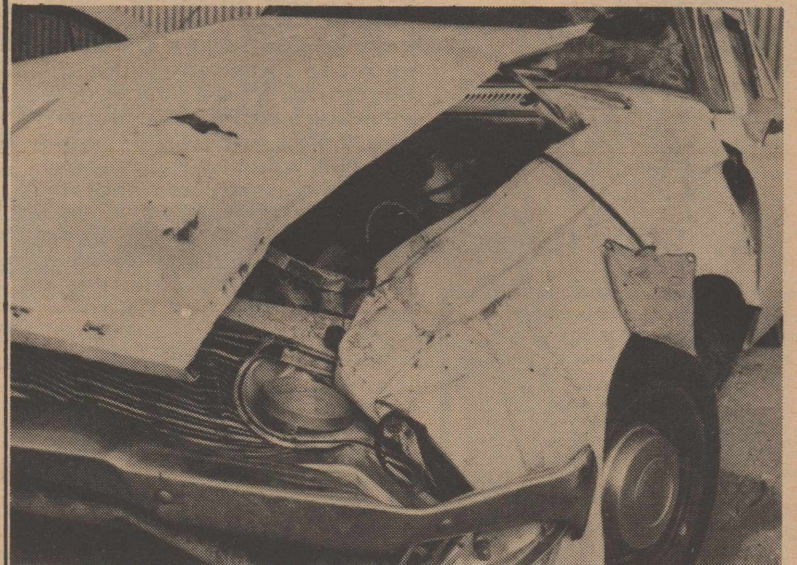

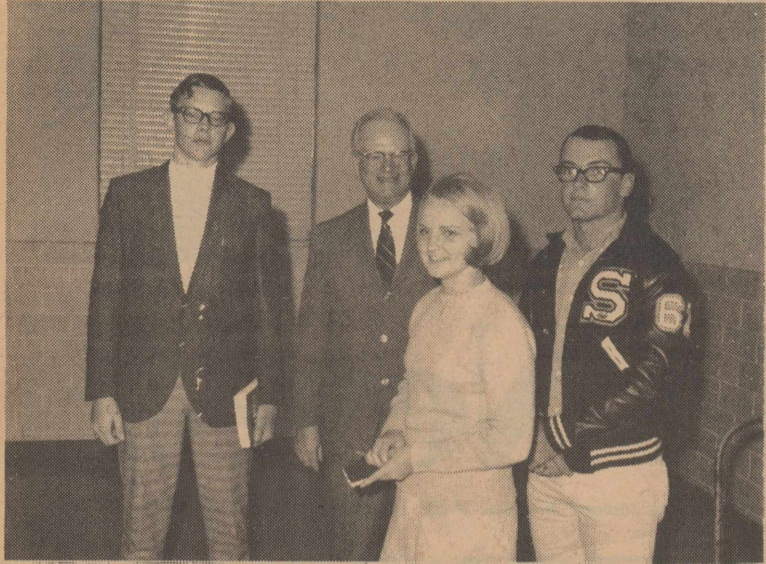

COTTON HARVEST GAINS MOMENTUM

THE SOUTH PLAINS COTTON HARVEST WAS OFF TO A MODEST START IN SEPTEMBER AND EARLY OCTOBER, ACCORDING TO W. K. PALMER, IN CHARGE OF THE LUBBOCK COTTON CLASSING OFFICE OF THE USDA. HOWEVER HARVEST ACTIVITIES ARE INCREASING DAILY AND SAMPLES FROM 1900 BALES WERE RECEIVED AT THE LUBBOCK OFFICE LAST FRIDAY. SAMPLES FROM 5200 BALES HAD BEEN CLASSED AT THE LUBBOCK OFFICE THROUGH FRIDAY, COMPARED TO 15,000 AT THIS DATE LAST YEAR.

PALMER STATED THAT THE SEASONAL CLASSING OFFICES AT LAMESA AND BROWNFIELD WILL BEGIN RECEIVING SAMPLES FOR CLASSIFICATION ON MONDAY, OCTOBER 20TH.

FOR THE WEEK ENDING FRIDAY, OCTOBER 17TH, THE LUBBOCK OFFICE CLASSED 48 PERCENT IN THE WHITE GRADES AND 52 PERCENT IN THE LIGHT SPOTTED AND SPOTTED GRADES. IN THE WHITE GRADES, STRICT LOW MIDDLING WAS THE PREDOMINANT GRADE WITH 27 PERCENT. STRICT LOW MIDDLING LIGHT SPOTTED WAS THE PREDOMINANT GRADE IN THE LIGHT SPOTTED CATEGORY WITH 21 PERCENT. MANY WRECKS

Last Thursday at the intersection of the Denver City Highway, N.W. 11th St. and Ave. F. a 1967 Cadillac Sedan driven by Robert Dale Boulter, Denver City, was in collision with a 1968 English Ford driven by Velma Jackson, Seminole. Damage was estimated at approximately \$2,000 to both vehicles. Velma Jackson was hospitalized.

At 1 p.m. last Monday a 1964 Pontiac driven by Laura Archer Taylor was in collision with a 1969 Chevrolet driven by Sammy Webb. Damage to the Webb vehicle was estimated at \$290.

At 5:30 a.m. Sunday a 1969 Dodge, driven by Joel Sutherlin, Seminole, was traveling east on U. S. 62 when a tire blew out 5.6 miles west of Seminole. He lost control of the vehicle, ran off the south side of the road and over a culvert but did not overturn. Damage was estimated at \$250.

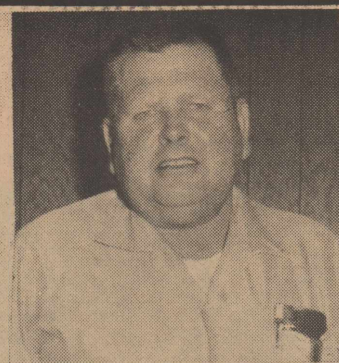

At 7:45 p.m. Monday night 20.6 miles southwest of Seminole on a paved road a pickup and tractor were involved in an accident. The 1969 Ford pickup was driven by Phil Eugene Cole, 20. His permanent address was listed as Sterling City, Texas. A passenger in the pickup was 29-year-old Jose Aguayo.

The pickup overtook the tractor as both vehicles were headed north and failed to pass, striking the tractor from the rear. The tractor was broken in the middle section. At press time the driver of the tractor was unknown. Damage to both vehicles was extensive.

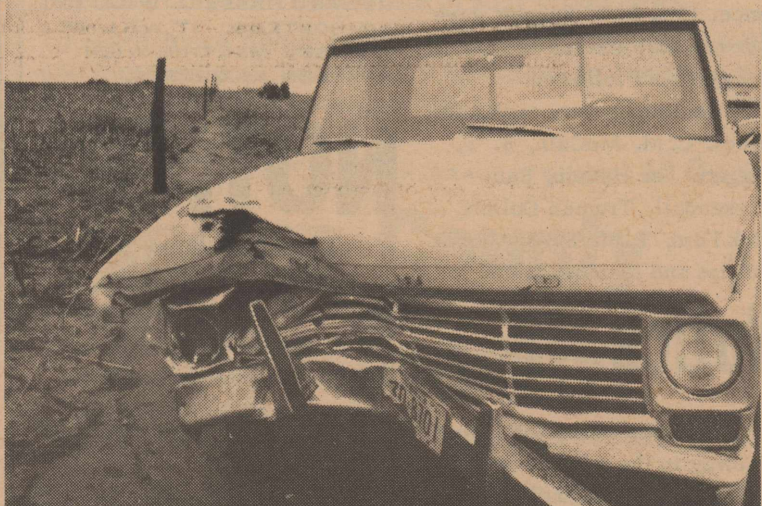

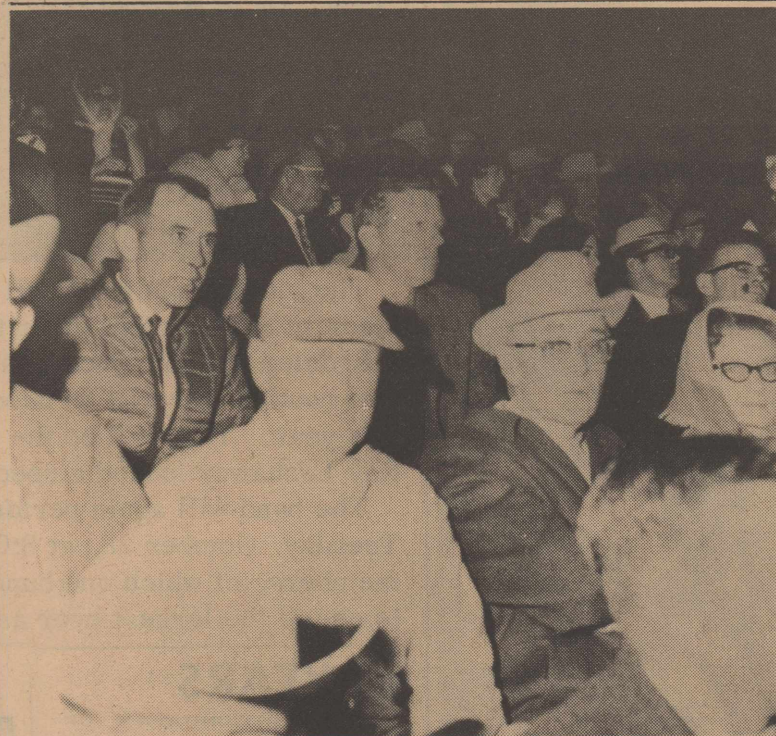

CHILDREN OF TODAY NEED TO BECOME ACQUAINTED WITH CHILDREN OF OTHER NATIONALITIES AND RACES, SO THAT, INHERITING AN ADULT WORLD, THEY FIND A FREE INTERCHANGE OF ACCEPTANCE AND RESPECT AMONG OTHER PEOPLES.

STUDENTS WILL BE INSTRUCTED IN THE USE OF LIBRARY MATERIALS. TYPES OF LITERATURE AS RELATED TO LANGUAGE ARTS, AND OUTSTANDING AUTHORS AND ILLUSTRATORS OF BOOKS FOR YOUNG PEOPLE. 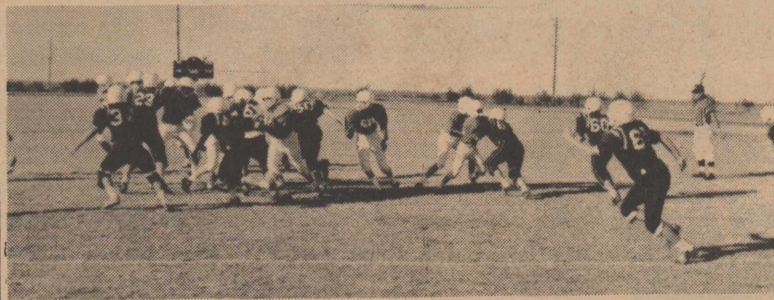
