HUNTING SEASON OPENS NEXT MONTH

Gaines County sets in Zone A in the State of Texas for hunting regulations. Zone A goes to the Rio Grande River south, through Dawson County east, the New Mexico Panhandle on the north, and the State Line on the west.

Quail season will be November 8 through February 15 with a daily bag limit of 12 and a possession limit of 36. Other information will be available later.

The season for Sandhill Cranes (little brown) is November 1 through December 28.

Duck season is November 18 through January 11. This includes Teal but not Merganser Ducks. There is no open season on blackbellied tree ducks and fulvous tree ducks. Daily bag limit is 4; possession limit 8.

REPORT FROM THE ASCS OFFICE

Wool producers were reminded today that they should bring sales documents for shorn wool and unshorn lambs to the Gaines Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Office to earn incentive payments for the 1969 marketings. Sales of both wool and unshorn lambs may be included in a single application for payment, according to Troy Martin, Chairman of the Gaines ASC Committee.

Producers were also reminded that purchases of all unshorn lambs including the lambs in ewe-lamb pairs, must be reported when application is filled for wool incentive payment. Martin said wool producers occasionally overlook reporting purchases of replacement stock, but the ASCS County Office must have an accurate record of purchases as well as sales of unshorn lambs.

Wool delivery expenses not shown in the sales documents should be reported when producers apply for incentive payments.

The ASC Committee Chairman pointed out that under the National wool Act all producers who market wool and mohair in 1969 are eligible for incentive pay-

Shorn wool payments to a producer are equal to a percentage of his returns from sales. The percentage of his returns from sales. The percentage is that required to raise the national average price received for shorn wool by all producers up to 69 cents a pound. Mohair payments are determined in a similar manner, with the national incentive price at 77.4 cents a

'' YOU AND THE BURGLAR''

In the Friendly Flame, a publication sent courtesy of Gaines County Oil Company, is an article on page 12 entitled "You and the Burglar". It points out first of all that burglars are interested more in hitting two or three of Mr. Average Citizen's houses rather than one big job. The article by M. Robert Beasley suggests that (1) the spring lock be replaced by locks that require keys to lock and unlock. (2) Bolt doors and basement windows. (3) A favorite trick of the burglar is to simply knock the pins out of the hinges if hinged on the outside. (4) Do not leave keys accessible in the mailbox, under the matting, or behind shingles. Leave your spare key with a trusted neighbor. (5) It is better not to leave an address in your key case. Your keys may be returned and the burglar enter later with a duplicate key. (6) House keys left on a key chain in a parking lot is a dangerous hazard.

Don't you believe that a burglar does not carry weapons. One burglar said, "What do you expect me to do, go into a place naked (unarmed) and have some joker corner me with a ball bat?"

The experienced burglar at work is tense and alert to prevent detection. You are unprepared for the situation. Even if you have a gun handy, is your hand steady enough to shoot accurately? Are you in sufficient command of yourself to move without a sound? If you start shooting, are you positive the target isn't one of your family moving about? The answer to each question is probably NO.




WHO IS HE?????The HOLLEST MAN in Loop. Come to the Halloween Carnival Saturday night and find out.

Seminole B 23 Pecos 32






