Post 204 of the American Legion played host to the 19th District Saturday and Sunday. Over 100 people attended the Saturday night banquet held at the Community Building. Joe L. Matthews, past departmental commander from Fort Worth, said some very pertinent things concerning our times. "There has always been a generation gap. Let us encourage dissent but let's also encourage it to be a healthy and an orderly dissent, remembering that human rights are nothing without law and order. There's always been the 'bully' and the 'bum' and it's time for decent people to speak out against the seven that attack judges, that destroy, that burn, that deny other students their rights to go to school, and that think it's a shame to work. A lot of my generation was raised in the depression, overcame it, fought two world wars, bailed out Europe, helped equalize the races, provided homes for working people, fed the hungry and went to the moon." He went on to encourage the next generation to improve upon the system and not try to destroy what has been worked for, bled for and prayed for. "The time has come to quit appeasement of the few, strengthen our courts, hold up the hand of the law, step forth and not be fearful, and deal sternly with students who do not want to go to school." (Amen.)

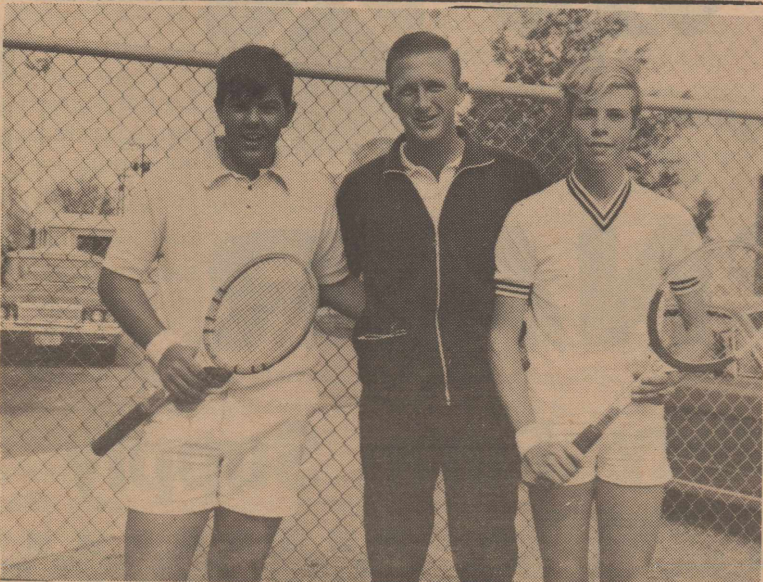
600 - 700 Attend Races

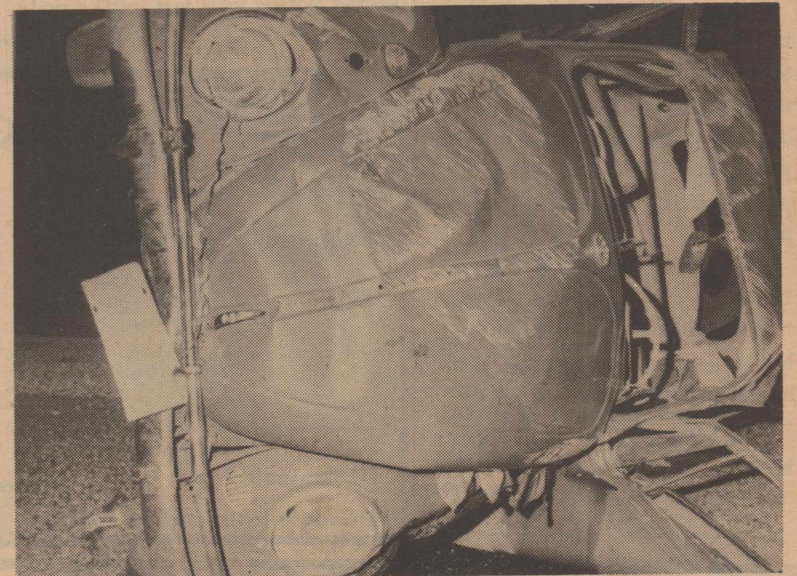

Wrecks, Wrecks, Wrecks

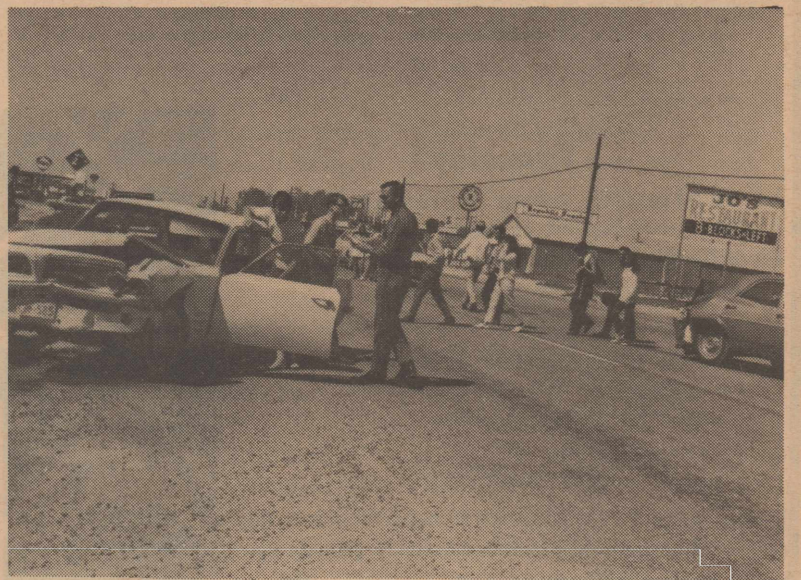


1965 Volkswagen driven by Hayden Coy Bates after hitting a cow.

Last Saturday at 8 p.m. two different drivers hit the same black cow, killing the cow and causing much property damage. Tawana Katherine Taylor, 18, of 500 S.W. 8th St. did not see a black cow and hit her head on 5 miles north of town on the Seagraves Highway.

The cow came to rest in the west lane with the Buick heading east in the other lane of traffic. Approximately 3 minutes later a 1965 Volkswagen coach driven by Hayden Coy Bates, 17, Route 3, hit the same cow, carrying her another fifty feet north before skidding and turning over.

Loretta Ann Roberts, 17, is listed in critical condition in an Odessa hospital after receiving attention at Seminole Memorial Hospital before being transferred to Odessa. She was riding in the front seat and was evidently thrown clear as was Stanley Allen, 14 years old, who was riding in the right rear seat. He suffered cuts and abrasions. Michael Ragsdale, 15, visiting in Seminole from San Marcos, Texas, was not seriously hurt as was the driver. The loss to both cars was extensive.



Last Sunday at 2:45 p.m. Ella Cornwell (Zodie Sparks) lost control of a 1963 Pontiac she was driving, hit a 1970 Maverick on the right hand front, causing \$250 damage, and then rammed the rear end of a 1967 Chevrolet, causing \$900 damage. The damage to her own car \$700.

The accident occurred .2 mile south on the Andrews Highway in front of Kem's Drive-In. Renee Britt, 17, driving the 1970 Maverick, was stopped and waiting behind a 1967 Chevrolet driven by Yolanda Cortez, 17, when the Pontiac came around them on the outside lane and struck the two cars, coming to rest heading southwest. The two cars were waiting for approaching traffic to clear before turning into Kem's. All were headed south.

Glenna Jo Kuykendall and Linda Ann Kuykendall, 14 and 16, were riding in the Pontiac. They were taken to the hospital and later released. The 1970 Chevrolet had four other passengers, none hurt seriously. Renee Britt, the driver, was the only one in the Maverick.

HEBREW CHRISTIAN TO SPEAK

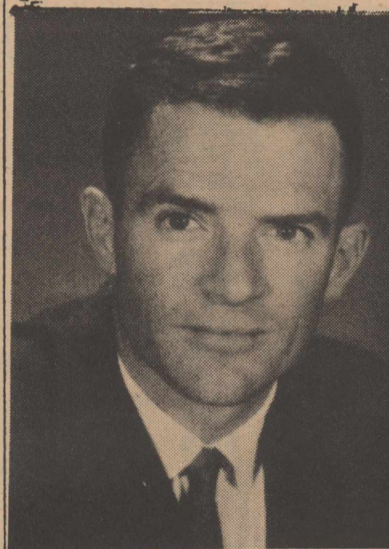
Arnold G. Fruchtenbaum will be the speaker at South Seminole

Jewish training while a young boy and came to New York with his

Cedarville, Ohio, which is a Baptist institution. He studied Hebrew,
archeology, and ancient history at the Hebrew University in Jerusa-
lem, working towards his Master of Arts Degree. It was during this
time that the, now historic, Six-Day War broke out between Israel
and the Arab nations. His first hand observations of this critical per-
iod in Israel's history along with a thorough study of the Bible has
brought him to certain conclusions about the role of the Nation Israel
and God's plan of world redemptions.

While he is still a young man, Mr. Fruchtenbaum's experience
and insight has led to his being considered an expert on interpreting
current events in the light of the Bible. He has often been asked by
the Mission to serve as spokesman on these matters.

He is the author of the pamphlets entitled "Guitar Strums and
Kosher Pickles" and Jewishness and Hebrew Christianity." Recently

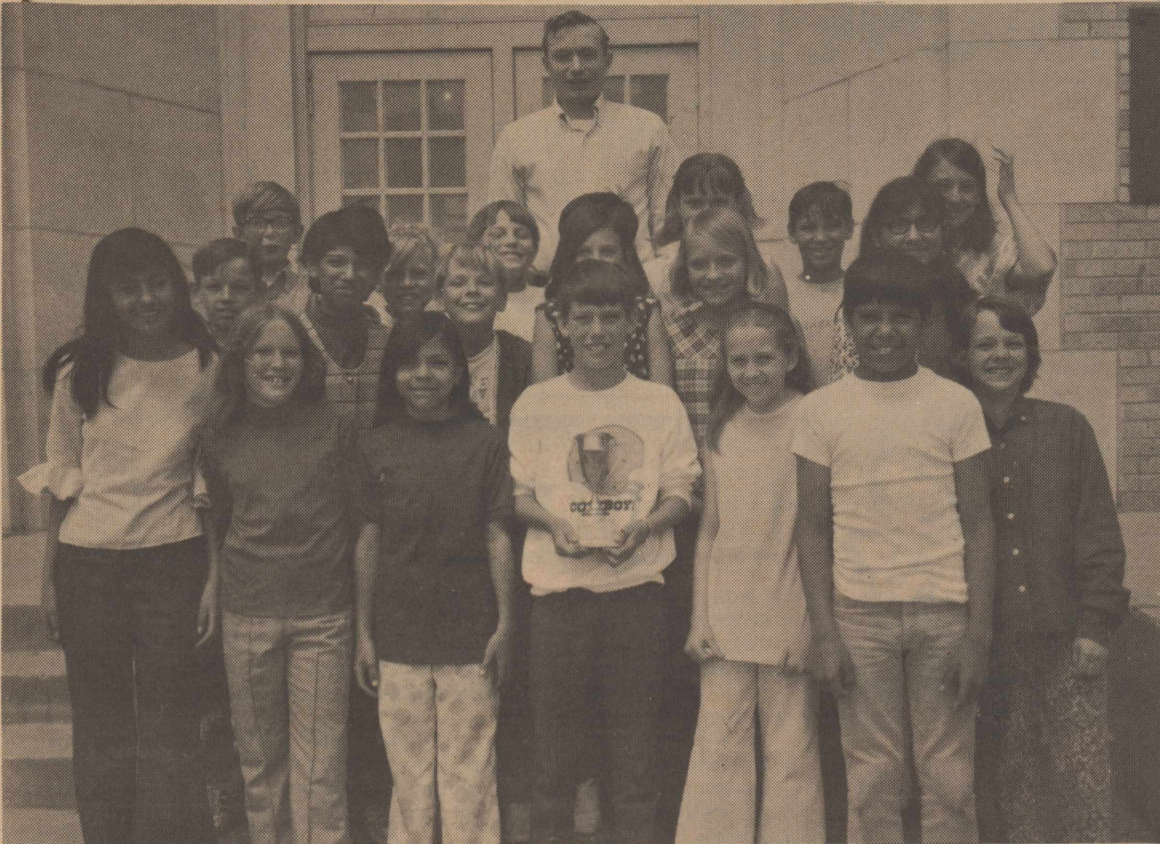

IF THE COMPANY'S RATE REQUEST IS APPROVED, ONE-PARTY RESIDENCE RATES WOULD RISE FROM \$5.50 TO \$6.25, TWO-PARTY RESIDENCE RATES FROM \$4.25 TO \$4.65 AND ONE-PARTY BUSINESS RATES FROM \$10 TO \$13.

SAWYER SAID SOUTHWESTERN BELL WAS ABLE TO OPERATE AT THE SAME RATES FOR MORE THAN 10 YEARS BECAUSE OF LOCAL GROWTH, IMPROVED EFFICIENCY AND TECHNOLOGICAL ADVANCES. HOWEVER, HE SAID THESE ADVANTAGES HAVE NOW BEEN OVERCOME BY INFLATION AND OTHER ECONOMIC PRESSURES.
