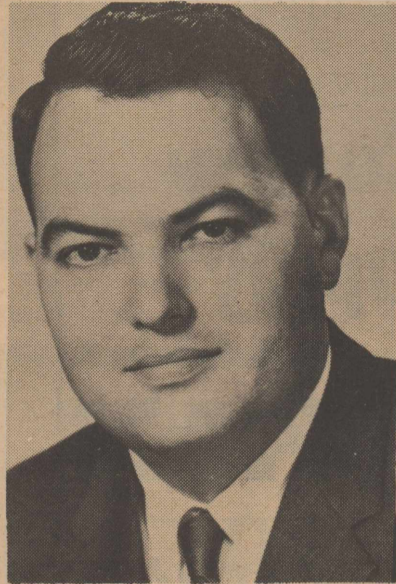

Wildcat Story

One man who preferred not have his name called said "It was no bobcat. I've seen this cat twice and it has a long tail."

This verified the story of Mr. H. L. Brinson who lives in Midland, Texas but ranches in the west part of the county. It was reported on April 4 that the men on the ranch were rounding up and spraying cattle. They noticed this calf that was kinda crippled as they went to the house at noon. Returning about fifteen minutes later the calf had been killed with the inside of its rib cage torn out.

Employees of the Brinson Ranch thought at first that it was a coyote but when old timers observed the tracks they were much larger than a coyote's and the track of a cat. Tim Woods of Nadine verified it was the track of a cat. Bud Pitcox, an employee, also said it was a cat track and not a coyote.

The calf was several days old-not a stillborn.

Dennis Nix reported that he had lost three calves to coyotes but the cat story (larger than a bobcat) is a new one, but verified by tracks by three men and by sight by another man.

Mrs. Melvin Walker, whose husband is the ranch foreman, says, "This has brought on a lot of talk" and evidently, it's not all talk. This story is for real.

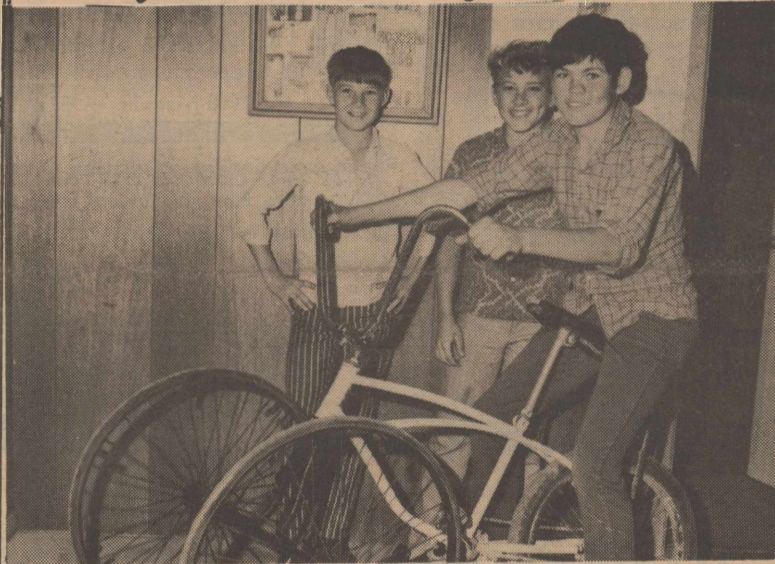

"Well, I needed you; Keith (a son) has gone somewhere, R. L. (Hunt, a son-in-law) is cont. on page 2

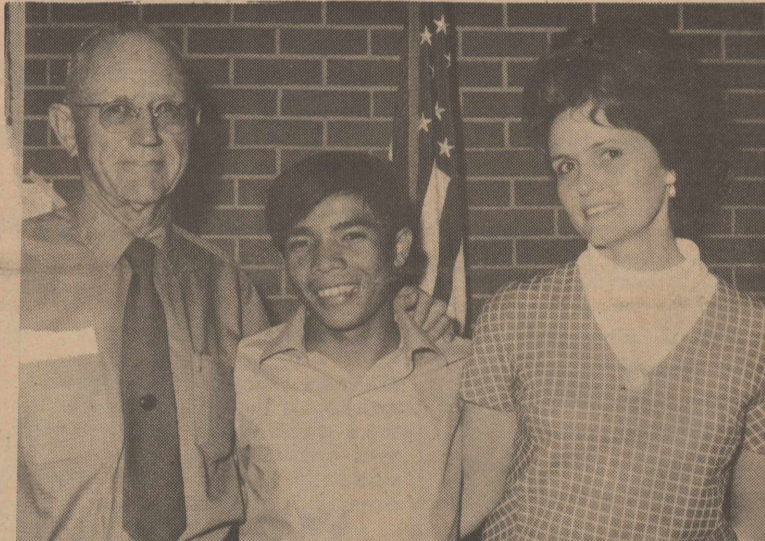

out of pocket and that cow
couldn't have her calf."

Now any new birth to me is a near miracle, whether it's a baby calf, a new chicken, a fish or a new baby, and about the prettiest thing I've seen in my life is a brand new, licked out, Whiteface calf enjoying its first dinner.

Mr. McConal told the following story. You know, Walter, this cow's had calves before, but she just had trouble with this one. I found her when she came in with the other cows to water and drove her into the corral. She's a mean one, all right, and she'd fight you in a minute, and you know how those kind are, they won't let you help them.

Every time she'd lie down and start trying to have that calf and I'd try to help her she'd get up and run me out of the corral. It's amazing how in the world a baby calf can live when 500 pounds of pressure is applied to help the mother have it. How about 1000? 1500? Yes, even 2000 pounds of pull.

When a baby calf is born it's front feet show first. A few inches behind the feet is the nose. Now a small nylon rope is just right to tie onto the front feet and onto a lariat rope, then a cowboy (midwife) can get off far enough on his horse to not disturb the cow. The trick is to wait for help and when the cow has her labor pain, to pull at the same time. It is nothing unusual to drag the cow (weighing 900 to 1200 pounds) when trying to help with the new birth.

But back to Mr. McConal's story. "Well, what did you do?" I asked.

I tried and I tried to get in there with her but she wouldn't let me and I was afraid she was getting far enough along that she might just give up because the pains were getting closer and closer together. I finally hit upon a plan. I ran the cow into the squeeze chute. I took my nylon rope, tied onto the calf's feet and tied the rope onto a post.

I stood ready at the chute gate. She started into labor. I opened the gate quickly, punched the cow and hollered at her, and Walter, she jumped right out from under that calf. I untied the rope from the post and pulled the calf out. The mama got up in a few minutes and licked out that calf. Now, isn't that a pretty sight? Just look at that, and we both watched the calf eating.

Yes new births are near miraculous. Mr. McConal did what had to be done. The calf lived and did well and Mr. McConal had successfully handled a difficult situation.

WHEN IT COMES TO SEEING FOR SAFETY THE EYES HAVE IT!

"I just didn't see the other car." How many times has a motorist stood near an accident scene and offered this rather pitiful excuse for being involved in the crash?

There are five common distractions that can get in the way of that big picture, according to Mr. Paul Graham, President, Texas Motor Transportation Association. They are:

1. Route problems -- confusion over where one is and where one is going.
2. Mental disturbances -- concentrating on the "problems of life" rather than the problems of the road.
3. Distractions inside the vehicle -- children, for example.
4. Scenery.
5. Unfamiliar situations.

"However, offsetting these are five basic steps used and proved out over the years by the professional drivers," Mr. Graham says. "They are easy to learn. With a little practice they will become routine:

- "1. The 'aim high in steering' formula. This calls for repeated glances well ahead at the center of the intended driving lane. The eyes should sweep over the scene -- a full block in the city, a half-mile on rural roads
 - "2. Get the big picture. Keep your eyes sweeping over the scene, while maintaining proper spacing -- more than one car length for each 10 miles per hour in speed.
 - "3. Keep your eyes moving. Shift your eyes every two seconds. Check your rear-view and side-view mirrors at least every five seconds.
 - "4. Leave yourself an 'out'. Think ahead. Strive for a space cushion, adjust speed to visibility and in doubtful situations reduce speed and touch brakes.
 - "5. Always be certain that the other drivers see you. That's what horns, lights, and turn signals are for."
- By practicing these five steps you will improve your driving immeasurably -- and your chances for survival!

CAMP SWEENEY DIABETIC TRAINING CENTER for diabetic boys and girls will open its 21st season May 31st with three, three week, semesters as follows: May 31 to June 20 - June 21 to July 11 - July 12 to August 1st.

Of major importance, through this group association with other young diabetics, they realize they are not alone with their problem and with proper knowledge and care can do anything a normal child can do.

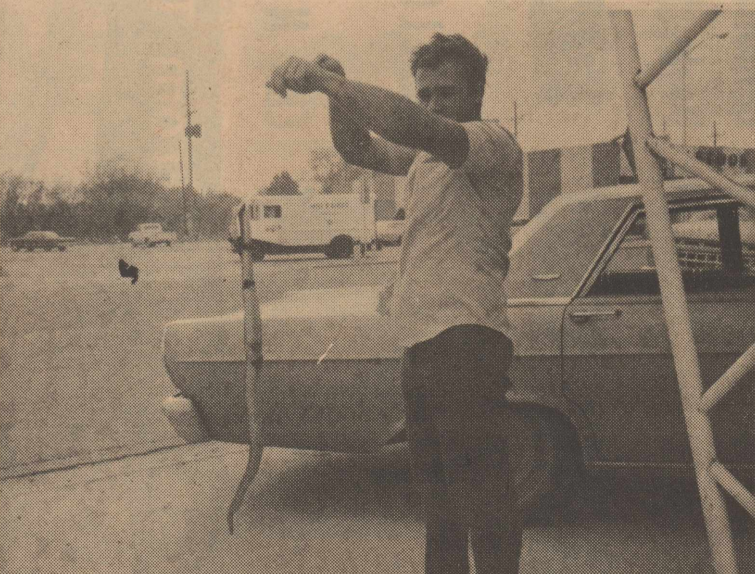

The Seminole Garden Club met Tuesday at 3:00 p.m. in the Gold Room at the Seminole State Bank.

The guest speaker was Ben J. Lednicky, a registered landscape architect for the Texas Highway Department. Mr. Lednicky gave a very interesting resume of the Texas Highway Department and the Landscape Division. He stated that the highway department was founded June 4, 1917. There were no true roads, just a series of little highways, which were all dirt roads. There were 8,865 miles of improved highways in Texas (and not an inch paved) compared to the 68,000 miles of paved state highways of today. In 1918, the first twenty miles of state worked highway was an untreated flexible base, 16' wide, between Falfurrias and Encino - 1921, all highways were under the highway department - 1923, tax of one cent per gallon was put on gas - 1925, all highways were maintained by the department - 1933, the landscaping division was created and in 1934, the first roadside park was built by W. R. Pape, an employee of the highway department, between West Point and Smithville. The first federal money for highway beautification was allotted in 1936 and three million trees and five million shrubs were planted at eleven cents each. In conclusion, Mr. Lednicky said our State can be proud of the advancement made yearly on our highways and the beautification of the right-of-ways. He showed a film of the roadside parks in different parts of our vast state and the progress of them.

PRODUCERS IN THE 1970 FEED GRAIN AND WHEAT PROGRAM MAY CHOOSE TO PUT THEIR DIVERTED ACRES IN ONE OR MORE OF EIGHT NON-SURPLUS CROPS, ACCORDING TO TROY MARTIN, CHAIRMAN OF THE GAINES COUNTY ASCS COMMITTEE. THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE HAS ANNOUNCED THE FOLLOWING ALTERNATE CROPS WILL BE PERMITTED ON ACREAGE DIVERTED FROM PRODUCTION OF WHEAT OR FEED GRAINS: CASTOR BEANS; GUAR; SE-

SAME; PLANTAGO OVATO; MUSTARD SEED; CRAMBE; SUNFLOWER AND SAFFLOWER. MR. MARTIN CAUTIONED THAT SAFFLOWER AND SUNFLOWER MAY BE PLANTED ONLY ON ADDITIONAL ACREAGE DIVERTED UNDER THE FEED GRAIN AND WHEAT PROGRAMS, NOT ON THE ACREAGE REQUIRED TO BE DIVERTED BY PROGRAM PARTICIPANTS. THE SIX OTHER CROPS ARE PERMITTED ON THE DIVERTED ACREAGE REQUIRED AS A CONDITION FOR PARTICIPATION IN THE PROGRAMS.

THE ONE YOU SEE IN THE ABOVE PICTURE WAS ONE THE LATE JULIAN GADY BROUGHT BACK FROM ONE OF HIS TRIPS TO AUSTRALIA. THE EGG MEASURES 6 INCHES LONG, 5 INCHES WIDE, IS 18 INCHES AROUND AT THE LONG WAY AND 14 INCHES AROUND THE SHORT WAY.

THE EGG WEIGHED APPROXIMATELY 3 POUNDS WHEN LAID. IT WOULD BE EQUIVALENT TO 20 TO 24 HEN EGGS IN CAPACITY, TAKES 40 MINUTES TO BOIL AND THE CHICK WEIGHS ABOUT 2 POUNDS WHEN HATCHED.

SOMETIMES THERE ARE AS MANY AS 30 EGGS IN ONE NEST IF THE MALE HAS A HAREM OF SEVERAL FEMALES. THEY LAY THEIR EGGS IN A WALLOWED OUT HOLE IN THE GROUND IN A COMMON NEST. THE MALE SITS ON THE EGGS, BEING RELIEVED OCCASIONALLY BY ONE OF THE WIVES. IN THE HEAT OF THE DAY, HE CAN LEAVE THE NEST, RETURNING AS EVENING COMES ON. IT IS SAID THAT IF THERE ARE UNFERTILIZED EGGS IN THE NEST, THEY ARE PLACED ON THE OUTSIDE OF THE GOOD ONES SO THAT IF AN INTRUDER TRIES TO EAT THE EGGS, HE WILL STRIKE A ROTTEN EGG FIRST. THE EFFECT OF THE ROTTEN EGG WILL ENCOURAGE THE INTRUDER TO PASS UP THE GOOD ONES.

Orville Rogers was ordained as a minister in an impressive license ordination service Sunday, April 19, at 2:00 p. m. in the First Baptist Church, Seminole.

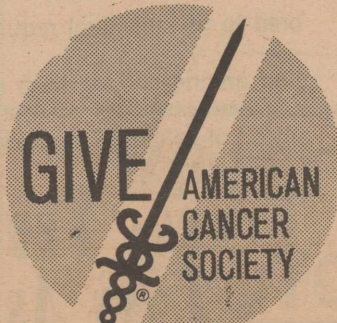
