## TELEPHONE COMPANY GRANTED RAISE

The City Council met Monday night. In attendance was Edd Edwards from Packmore. He explained to the council the great advantage and cost of a different type garbage disposal boxes. These would be placed throughout the town with one for every four houses pointing out the great improvement to the department and fewer man hours. A lo-boy truck with a lift on it would carry a large num ber of these to the dump ground at one time, making fewer trips than the trash haul trucks are making at the present. Three yard or four yard dump boxes would be available. He pointed out that the equipment would cost $\$ 12,955.00 \mathrm{~F}$. O. B. Seminole.
2. The council granted a raise to the telephone company on the basis of $5.16 \%$ of their investment. (Previous $3.68 \%$ or a $1.48 \%$ increase. ) This means a business phone will be raised from $\$ 10$ to $\$ 13$ per month, an extension from $\$ \mathbf{L} 50$ to $\$ 1.75$, residential one party $\$ 5.50$ to $\$ 6.25$, two party line $\$ 4.25$ to $\$ 4$. 65 . The new rate will be effective on the May 15 billing.
3. The council accepted a bid of $\$ 3396.32$ from L M H Truck and Tractor for an International Carryall for the fire department.
4. New residents deposits for water were raised from $\$ 10$ to $\$ 15$. All members of the council were in attendance.
