Railroad Talk ★★★★★ ONE INDICTED FOR MURDER

"Last year was the worst time in history to try to borrow \$8 million," said James Roberts of the Permian Basin Railroad, yesterday in Seminole. He appeared at the Noonday Lions Club meeting along with J. P. Kerr, general manager of the railroad and Connie Mack Hood, a stock broker out of Midland. "We have made a 'two prong attack. First we intend to sell \$3½ million worth of shares at \$10.60 per share so we can start building the 18 miles of track from Seagraves to Seminole. The second part of the attack is the \$8 million loan we are hoping will be ready from a group in West Germany about the time we finish selling the shares."

Hood stated that "We're going to build the railroad and the Permian Basin Railroad will be a good investment. It will be a corporation put together to make a profit. It will be a new link to the outside world from your part of the county." He went on to point out some of the advantages Gaines County has - open space, available land, crops and feed. He said further that a day would be set to issue stock. People buying stock would be billed on that day and have five days to sent in the money along with how many shares, social security number, address and name. People buying common stock will have ownership of the railroad.

Kerr pointed out that Zachary Construction Company would be sending out approximately fifty car loads of rock per day. A cement plant and also a lime plant is interested in locating south and east of town.

The construction date deadline is January 1, 1971. When \$2.6 million worth of stock has been sold contract will be let for the 18 miles and right of way purchased. It will run generally adjacent to the highway.

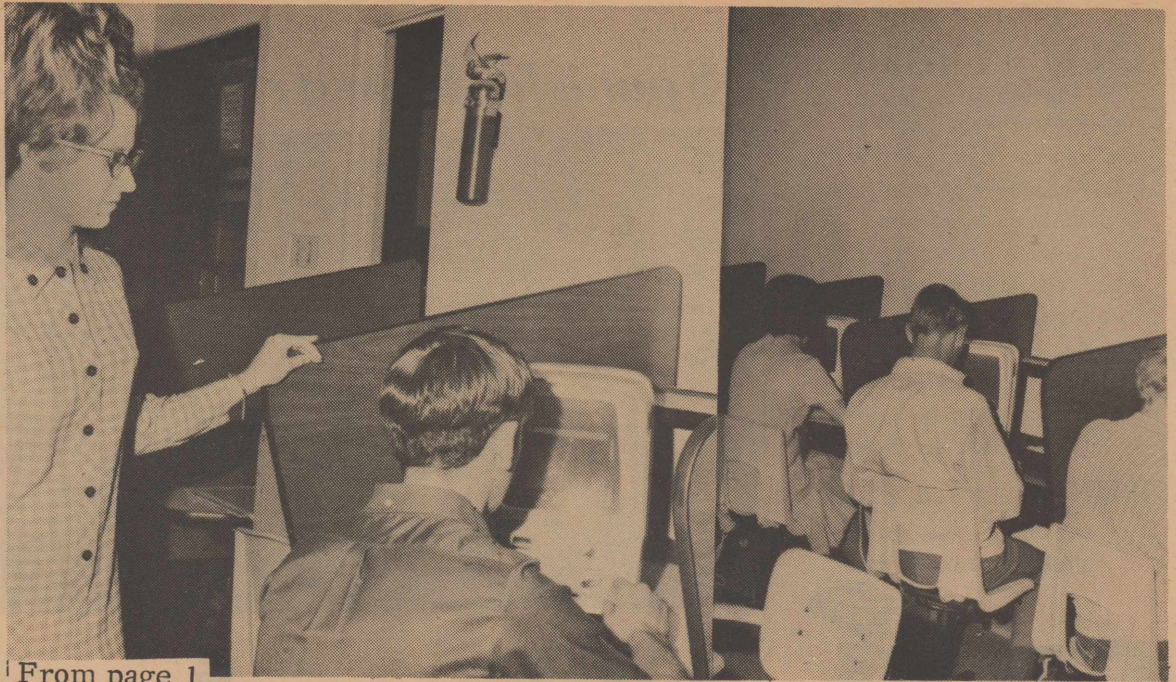

Some of the specific purposes of the reading program are as follows.

1. To diagnose the cause of the reading problems and to provide corrective and preventive techniques for the student.
2. To present an enrichment program that will create an appreciation and a lifelong interest in reading.
3. To present the various reading skills so that the student will develop the correct habits and displace the unsatisfactory ones.
4. To develop reflective and critical thinking.
5. To offer developmental training for those individuals who will benefit from it.
6. To integrate the knowledge and skills learned in this program with all other activities.
7. To help the student have confidence in his ability to apply his reading skills to his daily living.
8. To help the student recognize his problems and to present techniques which will help him overcome his difficulties.

In establishing reading levels for students three are frequently mentioned. These are the free reading, the instructional and the frustration levels.

The Craig reading machine works something like this. A student or teacher places the roll of film that works as an overhead projector. It exposes one frame at a time with a word, a sentence or a line. After some practice the machine is cut off and the student writes down his answers on a student manual from questions asked by the comprehension check book. As a student gets faster in competition the machine is speeded up to 300, 400, 500, 600, 700 or 800 words per minute.

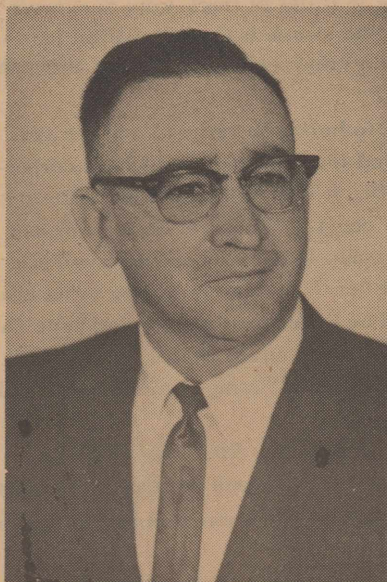
Graphs are kept. Each lesson is diagnostic and the student can recognize his problems and follow his success. Also good patterns are established - cleanliness, good habits and good morals. The smaller machines can be used individually. Several students can participate on the larger ones. The English department has twelve booths with twelve machines operated by individual students.

There's a couple of rocks from Hawaii on it and an asafoetida container. There's the big button that Mrs. Shelton fixed up after the birth of the last grandchild -

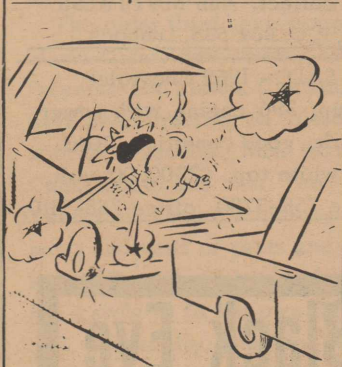
On May 3, 1802 Washington, D.C. incorporated as a city.

Information From Social Security Office BY DOROTHY FEAZELL

Have you, as a social security beneficiary, received your monthly check a few days late? It may be because you did not report a change of address.

There are usually several places to be notified when you change your address so let's just call this a reminder item.

When a beneficiary changes his address he should notify the social security office in writing or in person. Reports should always include the name of the person or persons moving, the social security claim number and both the old and the new address.

Notifying the Post Office alone is not enough. Even if the Post Office has a current address, a delay still occurs because the check must be forwarded from one address to another.

Temporary financial hardships often results when checks are a few days late, particularly when social security benefits are the only source of income for a worker or his family. Beneficiaries can insure timely benefit payments only by keeping their address current.

Changes of address which have not already been reported to the Social Security Administration should be reported without further delay. Beneficiaries may report changes of address to any social security representative.

SEMINOLE HAS MORE TELEPHONES IN TOWN

Seminole residents are helping make the United States the gabbiest nation in the world.

According to Harry Sawyer, manager for Southwestern Bell, the average number of calls made annually per person in Seminole -- about 700 -- out numbers the combined average calls in person in Ireland, France, Argentina and Switzerland.

Sawyer said one reason for all the talking in Seminole is the number of telephones in the town. Based on 1968 statistics, he said, Seminole has more telephones than the entire country of West Irian.

Seminole had more than 3,300 telephones in 1968 as compared with the 3,073 telephones of Niger. Sawyer stated that Texas with 4,480,194 telephones had more phones than the country of Sweden with 4,110,579 telephones.

These figures are based on statistics presented in the American Telephone and Telegraph booklet, "The World's Telephones." They are the most recent statistics available since it takes about a year to collect all the information from all countries of the world.

Sawyer pointed out that nearly half of the world's 237 million telephones are in North America. The world's communications network was increased by some 15 million telephones in 1968 with more than six million of these added in the United States. Texas contributed 325,983 additional telephones to the total.

In the five states Southwestern Bell serves -- Missouri, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Kansas and Texas -- there were more telephones in 1968 than in Mexico and the U. S. S. R. combined.

Mexico had some 1.2 million telephones and Russia some 9.9 million, while there were over 11.4 million telephones in Southwestern Bell territory.

The United States can also boast having more telephones per person than any other country. For every 100 persons in the United States there are 54 telephones.

This compared to 51 for every 100 people in Sweden, the second place country. Volta, Africa, is the least developed telephone country. There are four telephones for each 10,000 persons.

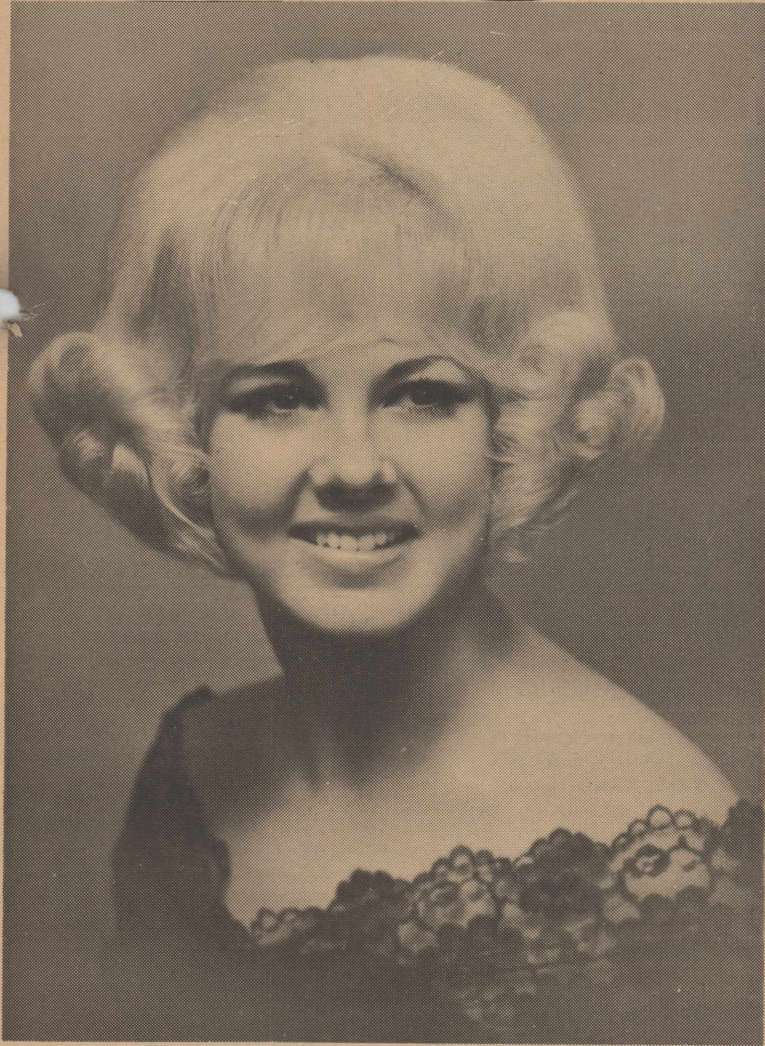

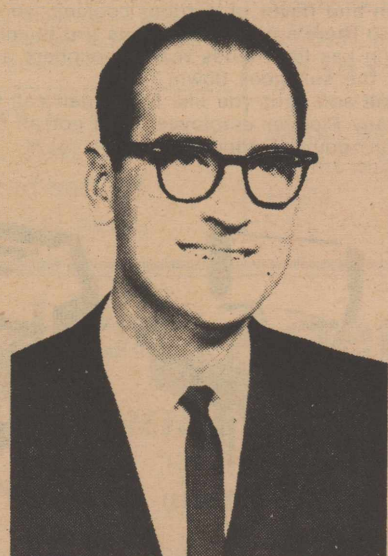

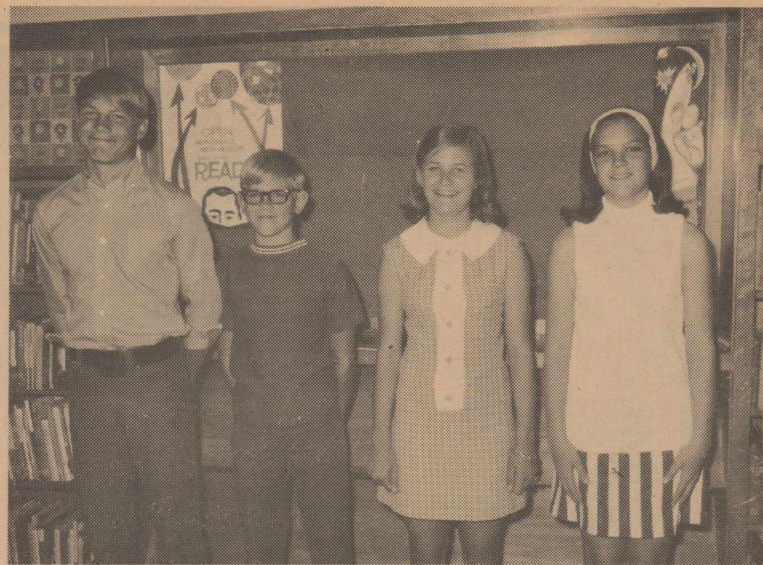
Letter to the Editor

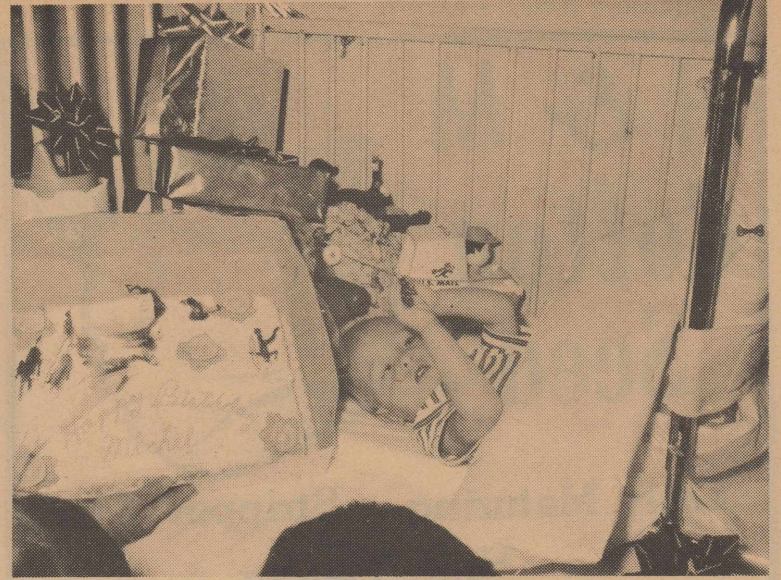
VILLALVA BREAKS SCHOOL RECORD

What would you do if informed a tornado was a mile from you and heading in your direction? Unless you had thought about it beforehand, you probably wouldn't know what to do. And since tornadoes occur most often during April, May and June, now would be a good time to plot your course of action for the "tornado season."

First, listen for weather reports, and be on the lookout yourself. Tornadoes are characterized by the roaring tornado funnels that twist down from thunderclouds.

Next, seek inside shelter, preferably below ground level. If this is not possible, take cover under heavy furniture in the center part of your house. Leave a few windows open, but stay away from them.

If you are caught outdoors, lie flat in the nearest ravine or depression.

THESE STORIES HAVE BEEN CHOSEN TO STRESS AESTHETIC VALUES, TO PROMOTE CULTURAL UNDERSTANDING, TO IMPROVE THE BUILDING OF CHARACTER AND TO ENCOURAGE BETTER HUMAN RELATIONSHIPS. STUDENTS IN GRADES THREE AND FOUR ARE ACQUAINTED WITH THE SAME TYPES OF MATERIALS AND OR LIBRARY INSTRUCTION, AS TIME PERMITS.

THE LIBRARY HAS BEEN OPEN SINCE THE FIRST DAY OF SCHOOL. DURING THE FIRST WEEK OF SCHOOL, STUDENTS WERE INTRODUCED TO THE LIBRARY PROGRAM AND WERE INSTRUCTED IN THE CARE OF MATERIALS. AS BOOKS WERE MADE READY, STUDENTS HAVE BEEN ALLOWED (SINCE THE SECOND WEEK OF SCHOOL) TO CHOOSE AND CHECK OUT BOOKS. THE LIBRARY IS OPEN ON SCHOOL DAYS FROM 8:15 UNTIL 4:00. DAILY CIRCULATION IS AFFECTED BY SPECIAL ACTIVITIES SUCH AS THANKSGIVING, CHRISTMAS AND ACHIEVEMENT TESTS.

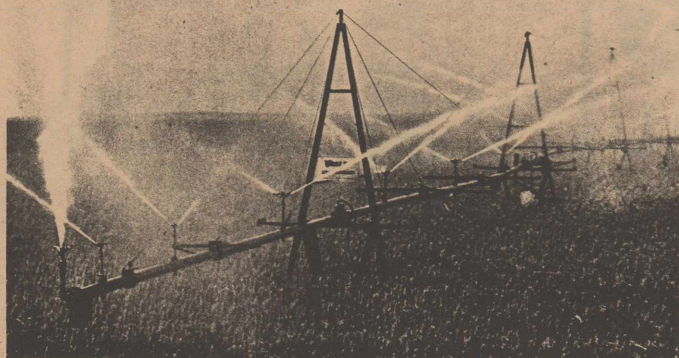

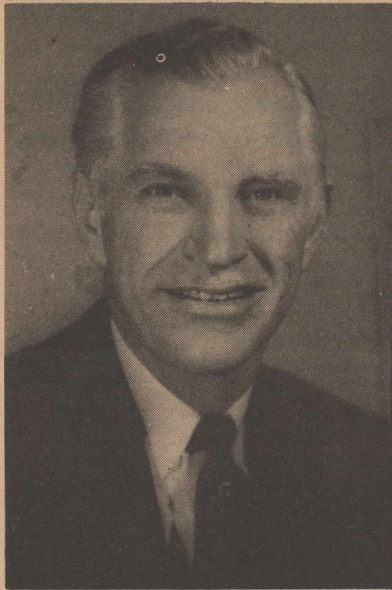
