Some of the best days of my life were spent on Willis Creek. Willis Creek was made up of the north and the south forks that ran together down below our house and then into Pecan Bayou in Brown County. I'm sure that I wasn't the champion of the fishermen in Brown County, but I was the champion of Willis Creek.

South Willis Creek headed out on Club Lake and my good friend, Dallas (Red Horse Minner) Fish, III, kept the wire kicked down on the lower side of the spillway so that when the lake overflowed the catfish would come on down.

Did we look forward to the time the creek started drying up in holes! Um, good fishing. Those fish were trapped and they were ready. You could fish for them with hook and line, but that was too slow and you could get in there and muddy it up real good. When the catfish would come to the top you could hit them with a club. My favorite way to fish was to seine them.

Really to do a good job seining you need two or three partners, but it wasn't necessary. I know my mother was the best in the world, 'cause she let me make a seine out of the net wire around her garden. To make this seine work takes a fence post on top for a float and a few small rocks on the bottom. Those 2, 3, 4, 6 and 8 pound catfish just couldn't get away.

Now a boy who's just by himself figures out a way. You could get forty or fifty feet of that wire, anchor it to the bank and make long sweeps in a half circle and sometimes catch twenty to thirty pounds of fish per drag. (Any boy with any ingenuity could catch 100 pounds or so of fish. If you were lucky twenty to thirty pounds would be good catfish.) I would then throw the shad and the bony fish away and save the catfish.

Now if you've never buried a cleaned three pound catfish under a fire, wrapped in brown paper (salted and buttered), you could take a nap, sleep an hour, go cont. on page 2


GAINES COUNTY 4—H HORSE CLUB MEETS





Help in Hub City Relief

When American people are aroused it seems that no task is too large for them. When the thousands of people were made homeless at Lubbock at 9:45 p.m. last Monday the citizens of Semipole rose to the occasion to help. Sheriff Ed Welch drove an ambulance to Lubbock. Chief of Police, Shorty Blackman, went to help, along with Enoch Bacca, a city policeman. They were joined by sheriff's deputies Tony Simmons, Don Jackson and Hamilton Bell. Roger Pool carried an ambulance from Singleton Funeral Home. They helped to keep peace in Lubbock, direct traffic and to prevent looting. At least two county trucks rushed to Lubbock with food stuffs, mattresses, bedding, clothing and dishes picked up at the Chamber of Commerce. Churches pitched in. Many pickup loads of food stuffs and other needed items were rushed to Lubbock. Curry Motor Freight that serves Seminole with headquarters in Amarillo carried 55 cases of food stuffs and new bedding donated by the Westside Church of Christ and others. Southwestern Public Service employees were on the road at an early hour on Tuesday to help remove the danger of hot wires, fallen poles and a crippled electric system.

Lubbock is the hub city of the South Plains and her smaller neighbors to the north, east, south and west converged to help house her homeless and help feed her hungry. It was a great concern to Gaines County residents as most of the people either had children in school there, some of their family living there or some of their close friends in the city. The city was not spared the big storm but Lubbock can count its blessings because the storm did not hit when the thousands of people could have been in the downtown area or had it struck a residential area in the same proportion.

The people of Seminole are to be commended for their thoughtfulness, their concern and the many items sent to a twister torn area.


