At the Commissioners Court meeting yesterday at 10:00 a.m. Thomas Y. Pickett Co., appraisers for oil properties of Gaines County, set oil evaluations within the county at \$567, 697, 000.00. This includes utilities, plants and oil properties but not pipe line properties of \$3, 051, 000. 00. The Commissioners Court set a tax rate of 16% of taxable value, or a taxable evaluation of \$93,880,000.00. This compares to \$67, 000, 000. 00 of one year ago. The company of Southwestern Appraisal set a value of \$105, 400, 000.00 on real estate (top side) and banks.

A 16% taxable value would amount to \$16, 800, 000. 00. This is compared to \$5, 960, 000. 00 of one year ago or before re-evaluation. The total evaluation of the county amounts to \$673, 097, 000.00, not counting pipe lines. The county tax rate last year was \$1.20. The new rate is thought to be \$1.00. State was 42¢; will now be 37¢.

The school's present taxable evaluation for the past year was \$61, 837, 000. 00. It was pointed out that the county tax needs would need to run \$126, 000, 000. 00 which would well and more than take care of school needs of \$80, 000, 000. 00. The assessment for the past year was 11.75 of taxable property. That figure this year will be 16%. For that reason the county tax rate will be lowered from \$1. 20 to \$1. 00 and the state tax from 42¢ to 37¢. The school board has not set its rate.

"In the near future all property owners will receive from Southwestern Appraisal Company a letter showing 100% value with the county proposing to use 16% of this figure for tax purposes." (After receiving the letter, anyone wishing to discuss the 100% may meet with them on the third floor of the courthouse between now and








In the above photo Leroy Lumpkin of Loop, Texas examines a two year old field of Weeping Lovegrass that he established through the Great Plains Conservation Program. Mr. Lumpkin uses this grassland as diverted acres and runs cattle on it during the time that grazing is allowed on diverted acres. The grass cover protects the land from erosion and grass is an excellent soil improver.

Grass planting time is here and many farmers in the Gaines- Andrews Soil and Water Conservation District have already seeded land to grass this year. Best stands have resulted where seeding is done into a dead litter cover. This cover protects the land from erosion and prevents the young seedlings from being destroyed by blowing sand. If no dead litter cover is present, irrigation water should be available to water the grass to a stand and to allow the grass to make good, rapid growth.

Farmers who are planning to plant grass are encouraged to contact the Soil Conservation Service for assistance.


