### JOE SMITH APPOIN 237,000 Hens? In major action Monday night the School Board unanimously ap-

How long does it take to gather eggs from 237, 000 hens? Ask Kuhl Baugh, manager of the Circle H egg farm, just north of the Gaines County Park on the Seagraves Highway. Workers start gathering eggs at about ll a.m. and try to finish by 4 to 5 p.m. When you buy Mc-Murry eggs, Ideal eggs or Circle H eggs, the eggs are from the operation where from 10,000 to 20,000 dozen are gathered per day.

The home place, or the McMurry operation, houses 180,000 hens in 28 houses. The Martin farm, 3 miles away, 13,000 in 3 houses, and the Seminole Farm, just south and east of Seminole on Telephone Road, 44,000 in 10 houses. The present owner is Anderson Clayton. The feed is hauled from Abilene, Texas and furnished by Paymaster. cont. on page 3

9. The Board set July 13 at 8:00 p.m. as the date and time for the public hearing on the 1970-71 school budget and set the tax rate. The tax rate must be set and the budget approved by July 20.




problems but never quite lo-cates the workable solutions. It was my desire to answer this urgent need that prompted me in January to seek the office of United States Senator.

Ball said, "We inventory feed each week. We have 120,000 pounds capacity here. We give them a record of hens lost to death. Each month we inventory everything, including equipment, feed and supplies."

He went on to say that sanitation was a real problem. The laying houses are cleaned three times each year. One of the crews sprays two times per week, including inside and outside the houses. A sugar fly bath is put out once a week and the company spends approximately \$5,000.00 per year to control flies. The fly control program goes on each season of the year. The troughs are washed daily throughout the houses. Each day birds are pulled out and burned. Pullets replace the old hens at the end of each fourteen month period. They are 23 weeks old when placed in cages and have just begun their egg laying. The Hy-line chicken is a hybrid White Leghorn which only weighs  $2\frac{1}{2}$  pounds when she's laying. Her beak is clipped so she will not peck herself or one of the other four or five hens she's cooped with. Also she does not have the ability to waste food. At the end of approximately fourteen months she is sold for a baking hen or put into chicken soup.

The operation in and around Seminole requires eighteen employees. This does not include washing or grading eggs when they're taken to Lubbock. This does not include the hauling of the feed or the eggs. It costs about 33¢ per dozen to produce a dozen eggs. It's not difficult to see why egg farms suffer during summer seasons when the hen is at her peak production, especially when grocery stores sell three dozen eggs for \$1.00.

The manure is given to area farmers where they pay for the hauling. If the operation has no other place to go with the refuse it is put on their own pastureland with tractor, loader and spreader. If a chicken gets out of its coop it takes several hours for it to learn to walk on the ground. They've never touched the ground.

The company is in the process of putting automatic feeders in the houses at the McMurry place. In other houses electric carts, similar to golf carts, are used to carry the bulk feed for distribution to the feed troughs. When you pass by the Gaines County Park and you notice the bee hive of activity at the hen houses, remember that they're gathering eggs, cooling them, feeding chickens, repairing, spraying and taking care of 237,000 hens so that you can have that egg for breakfast that stands up pretty and fresh in the frying pan. 

Following is an article that appeared in The Japan Times, Friday, June 19. The article was titled "American Baptists Coming for Crusade."

On June 25 the first of two batches of American Baptists arrive in Tokyo for a people-to-people Baptist Evangelical Crusade in Japan this summer.

The Southern Baptist Convention, with 11, 498, 613 members the largest Protestant group in America whose field of faith scythes from California to Virginia, are sending 585 of their number to Japan in two groups to conduct a sister-church program at the invitation of Pastor Shuichi Matsumura of Tokiwadai Baptist Church, Tokyo.

The first party begins its campaign on June 28 and finishes July 5. It flies homes three days later. The second arrives July 16 and will campaign from July 19 through 26 returning to the U. S. July 29.

The visitors from 20 churches mostly in Texas will pair off in 'sibling' arrangements with leading Aptist churches throughout Japan from Asakikawa City in Hokkaido to Kagoshima City in Kyushu. The largest group is from the First Baptist Church, Dallas, which is sending 225 members, 200 of whom make up a massive chapel choir. Its sibling is Pastor Shuichi Matsumura's Tokiwadai Baptist Church in Itabashi Ward, Tokyo. However, although it is not providing the largest group, Seminole First Baptist Church in Texas may well be the best represented with 41 out of its congregation of 400 making the trip.

The detailed preparations for the tour have been made by the Rev. Dub Jackson, director of the World Evangelism Center at the New Orlenas Baptist Theological Seminary, who has flown to Japan five times in the last year to finalize the arrangements. Jackson, a missionary for 18 years in Japan until two years ago, says that the group, more than half of whom are students, are coming to Japan to share their Christy ian convictions, meet people of their own occupations and co-operate in special services. The visitors have been nothing if not methodical in their preparations for their visit to Japan. They have been meeting once a month for orientation and training sessions in which they studied Japanese language and culture and all have learned to sing at least one Japanese song. It has not been easy for some of them to raise the \$850 apiece needed to pay for transportation, hotels and two meals a day. One girl is using the insurance money received from the death of her brother in Vietnam. Another has been mowing lawns for two years. The party leaves with the blessings of Vice President Spiro T. Agnew, Sen. T.

of Texas, and ex-President Lyndon B. Johnson. They are also carrying with them the governor of Texas seal on a citation which commissions Prime Minister Eisaku Sato an honorary Texas citizen.

The Southern Baptist Convention hopes that one result of its visit will be to invite its Japanese counter parts to the U. S. to do a similar Crusade in the near future. Already there are plans for five Kyushu churches to band together to send a team to Korea, Taiwan and Indonesia.

# EDITORIAL

It's that time of the year when people are plowing the earth and there's nothing as refreshing as the fresh turned dirt. The wheat is being called in. Two, four, six, eight, ten and twelve row tractors are planting and replanting. Peanuts are up and looking pretty. Potatoes are 2 feet high in some fields with baseball size fruit. Milo is hand high in some fields and thousands upon thousands of acres in the county. Blue Lake green bean plantings are being made ready, following small grains. Swathers (windrowers) are laying down fresh mowed alfalfa everyday. Farmers have planted their gardens, their little beans and peas that will be ready soon. Cantaloups and watermellons are up. (One farmer has already told me I'm welcomed and showed me where the stealing patch is.) It's a good time of the year. Hay balers are baling hay. There's a jillion bugs flying at night--always in evidence in irrigated coutry. The mockingbirds are singing in the early morning and the sparrow is pulling at another string trying to rebuild that nest that someone tore down. The grapes are about the size of mall peas. Peaches are about half grown ( and it's difficult for me to wait--my mouth waters and I can just dream and remember how the juice runs off your chin.) It's a good time of the year. About twenty-five cubing machines are running in the county making alfalfa cubes that measure 1 1/8 X 1 1/2 inches long to feed many feed lots full of cattle. It's a good time of the year. Young men (and older men) are seen with that red stained dirt up to their knees--irrigation wells are being started. It's a good time of the year. Cotton gins have trailers standing ready row after row by the hundreds. Rework to the gins is going on making ready for the fall crop. Castor beans are surviving some of the wind damage caused to the other crops. Hurray for this time of the year. Little league baseball program is in full swing. There's a new baby calf enjoying his first dinner, the rhythmic swing of his tail tells you so. Crops are growing. We live in a great country. We're filled with anticipation of growing children and growing crops. God is in the heavens, so let us all be prayerful of a bountiful harvest.

Browder, a lawyer, was the spokesman for the Amerada Hess and Atlantic - Richfield Companies. The companies and their spoksman claimed that only about fifty percent of the actual evaluation was claimed in the county, whereas the oil companies themselves claimed to have reported 100% evaluation.

Most of the land sales that were pointed out by them to back up their claim on the shortage in surface re-evaluation were sales by the Veteran's Land Board in smaller blocks.
