
GAINES COUNTY PEACHES Acres, acres and acres of



In the 100 block of South Main set a landmark shown in this picture. It was a Roy Bean or Jersey Lilly type building. When Ross Moore bought into the insurance business it was with Mr. W.A. Cox. Their sign reads Cox-Moore, Fire, Auto, Casualty Insurance, Bonds - Real Estate, and on the front of the building - Land & Cattle. The present building site now has buildings that were formerly occupied by Roberts Studio and the Chamber of Commerce. Next to it was the old building H. B. Motor Co., selling Hudson automobiles, Telephone # 187. In 1946-48 were those years when you still called Central in Seminole (the old ring 'em down type). In the left hand corner was a cafe at one time where Jameson's Market was later located. The two story building in the far part of the picture was the old Masonic Lodge building which simply said Seminole Lodge #957.

peach trees. Thousands, thousands and thousands of bushels of peaches. The News last week erroneously reported that the early peaches in Gaines County were lost to the frost and late freeze. The Oliver Orchard, located 20 miles west and 5 miles north, has fifty acres of Dixie Red peach trees loaded and ready for your visit, probably the biggest crop that they've ever had. Between 10, 000 and 15,000 bushels are available today.

The Dixie Red variety are tree ripened and organic grown (no chemicals used whatsoever). Some of the trees are actually bent to the ground, trying to hold up their fruit. People were seen last Sunday in the orchard from New Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Alaska and Colorado. If you would like a real family outing, go to one of the Gaines County orchards (Oliver's, Freeman-Moore, and probably others) and gather a few bushels of peaches. There's nothing like the juice of a Gaines County peach dripping off your chin to get the ole' saliva moving. cont. on page 2

Ralph Cravens and others who have seen the board have insisted on making some additions, like a cur comb, a curling iron, also a pair of ignition wrenches - Model A or Model T, for me was when Grandma had I don't know which, a cavalry spur, a round cur comb, a clamp to put in a bull's nose, a cookie cutter with a heart in the middle of it - 1905 model, an Eversharp pencil - the kind the girls wore on a chain around their neck, a horseshoe, a stake to stake a trap with, another gismo that I don't know what is, and a wrench that I don't know what it's made for.

If all the things that's been mentioned could talk, I'd be writing books instead of a column. Let's get back to that well pulley. There's cisterns to draw water from and wells to draw from, but the one I like best was that machine-dug well on my grandma's place. It set right next to the mountain on the old home place, just east of Pecan Bayou, below Brownwood.

The well itself must have been about 60 feet deep. Now that well pulley would really go fast when you put that long bucket down in that well and turned it loose. Me and my cousins used to see who could get that bucket on the bottom the fastest and get a drink the quickest. We wasted a lot of water and you just couldn't have any fun if there were any adults around, especially Grandma. "Don't drop that bucket," she'd say, "let it go down easy," and you had to be awfully careful, 'cause if you let it go and somebody caught you and you tried to stop it real quick you could burn blisters on your hand. If we found a little grease to put on the pulley we was in business. It didn't make so much noise then. One of the great tricks of dropping the bucket was catching

on the rope. One poor cousin got the rope wrapped around his leg. Someone dropped the bucket back in the well almost full of water and someone had to retrieve him off the pulley. I had some mean cousins.

The time that was best of all warned us two or three times and she got her walking stick after one of my cousins. She made the mistake of stepping on that rope. If she'd had her feet

tied to the end of that rope, she'd have gone through that pulley.

Now I'll tell you, we all ran. If you'd ever been hit with Grandma's walking stick, you'd run, too.

Well, the well caved in. The grass rope is gone. Grandma

was buried in 1934 in Elkins Cemetery, but the screaking #10 pulley, like some of the other .items, remains to remind us of an era that's past and gone

Last week in the Woodenfoote the News mentioned Art Mangus and the oil tanks being moved. Much more needs to be added to the story, as attested by the two photographs brought in by Mrs. Tom L. Masters of Seminole. The tanks are much, much larger than a high 500. In the picture Mr. Moser can be seen sitting on the forward part of the crawling tractor track. Sitting next to him is thought to be Tom Elliott, then Paul, his son-in-law. The tank was evidently thirty to forty feet high. (If you know other men in the picture, please call. When Mrs. J.B. Moser writes from Navasota she will probably tell us more men in the crew.) Mr. Moser moved his trucking and house moving business to Seminole from Borger, Texas. Note when the picture was made the daylight under the tank where it had been raised.

Christmas 1919 or 1920. The above residence at 312 S. W. 2nd Street is the home of the A. L. Duffs. The Duffs moved to Seminole in 1918 and bought the house in 1923 from Andy Williams, a Gaines County rancher, the father of Monte and Jiggs Williams. The home was built in 1919 by Williams, the lumber being freighted in from Stanton, Texas. "I don't remember how much we paid for the house. I thought maybe as much as \$7000 but Son Duff (Arthur L., Albuquerque, New Mexico) and Joe Dennis (our foster son) said it was more like \$3000. Mr. Duff and I taught school in Benjamin for several years, then Paducah and then to Seminole in 1918. I taught the third and fourth grade. Mr. Duff taught in high school." Courtesy of -

Elsewhere in the paper can be seen a kitchen scene in this hotel. Upstairs were twelve overnight guest rooms, downstairs were other guest rooms, the kitchen, and the lobby. The hotel was built in Shafter Lake, Texas in 1905 or 1906. The material was hauled from Midland, Texas, before there was an Andrews. Shafter Lake was located approximately 25 miles southwest of Seminole in Andrews County.

Before identifying the people, take note of the restroom in the right hand lower portion of the picture. Two such structures sat behind the hotel. Between the outhouse and the hotel can be seen the clothes line. Those are bushes with clothes over them.

No doubt many antelope were killed from the porch upstairs and the porch downstairs.

Five to six hundred people lived in Shafter Lake at one time. Babe Howell said, 'At least a thousand.' The hotel was built by L. B. Elam and carried his name. When dismounted, a portion was used on the Barney Elam ranch and still more of it in hie original home place on 11th Street. Barney was one of eight boys and five girls.


The man on the extreme left was a peddler coming through the country. He also had the greyhounds, the tent and the rig shown on the left side of the hotel. Dr. Williamson is shown with his dog by his side and sitting on the extreme right of the porch. Next to the doctor was the editor of the local newspaper. Upstairs was John Elam, brother to Barney, and Annie Williamson, one of the doctors daughters. The woman in the middle of the three women was Myrtle Elam and the woman on her right, Erie Williamson, is another of the doctor's daughters. Charlie Elam is the man with the dark shirt on and the suspenders. The only other person identified was the painter, Jim Denoval. Notice the used paint cars sitting on the front porch.

It is reported the only reason Shafter Lake was not the county seat was that interested people from Midland worked to have it in Andrews.

Barney Elam said, "Yes that's a picture of my sister, Myrtle." The picture was made at Shafter Lake, Texas and was made in the kitchen of the hotel. This picture was furnished by Mrs. Lucille Richards of Ft. Sumner, New Mexico and was sent to Mrs. R. M. E. Hughes. The young man with her was named Parker Randolf and was a photographer. He had a room reserved in the hotel for a year or two.

Shafter Lake sat approximately twenty-five miles southwest of Seminole.

There are so many interesting things in the photograph. (1) Notice each of their aprons; (2) the big cuff studs on his shirt; (3) Arm bands holding up the sleeve; (4) the lamps--top right; (5) the platters, Mrs. Barney Elam still has one of the lamps and the platter with the flowers in it; (6) the neck peice she is wearing; (7) her stacked hairdo; (8) the wood cook stove on the left was the kind that had a big warmer on the back side; (9) The food box over his left sholder says, 'Dr. Price's Food'. (10) Why the saw in her hand? Probably to help cut the meat with. (Hams and beef did not come cut up from the stores in those days.) and (11) Note also the big mixing bowls, the cups and saucers, the lard cans on the floor, the one foot width boards behing the cabinet, the wide boards for flooring, and the cain bottom chair.

Myrtle, a sister to Barney Elam, died in 1908 at the age of 20 and is buried among the 15-20 graves in the graveyard at Shafter Lake.

The Jim Hughes family moved to Gaines County from New Boston, Texas in 1916. The above picture was made in 1918, 7 miles east of Seminole and 7 or 8 miles south of the present Fairview Church. The family was made up of left to right, Robert Hughes (R. M. E.), Mr. and Mrs. Jim Hughes, Jr. and their son, Jack; Sam Isler, a grandson of the elder Hughes, riding aboard 'Shamrock'; Karl Hughes, Bill Isler, in short pants standing in front of his grandfather, Jim Hughes (Dad) and beside his grandmother in the wheelchair; the oldest boy standing next to his mother - Walter Hughes; Miss I eon Hughes and Harry Hughes. Also in the background on horseback was Rennie Hughes, riding 'Little Bill'.

Other interesting things about the picture are the some 300 to 400 head of sheep in the background. They were kept penned in behind a net wire fence except when herded. One of the three Model T's belonged to the photographer, one to the Sr. Hughes and it is supposed that one of the boys owned the other car. There's a nursing bottle in the foreground on the left. (There's always multiple births among sheep and orphan lambs to feed.) The eclipse mill in the background pumped from a waterwell between 120 and 140 feet deep. Near the house was a water tank for drinking water. The fence was used for the clothes line and looks like one cultivator and one planter by the fence. The family farmed approximately 100 acres for livestock feed. Those must be salt blocks behind the sheep and near the cars. The lambs are getting nearly grown in size and are hard to tell from the ewes.

Note the high top button shoes on the women and the barefeet on part of the boys. All the men either had caps or hats on. The larger boy on horseback has a real weapon in his hand - loaded (what's commonly referred to today as a slingshot). Rennie Hughes evidently was some kind of a cowboy and "Little Bill' some kind of herding animal and cow horse --- no bridle.



It continues to rain over the county. The area surrounding the Pioneer Gin, west and north, received upwards of 2 inches.





TOKYO, JAPAN--Gaines Countians have a right to be proud of some 40, more or less, of their fellow citizens who are taking part in the "Japan Crusade" in Baptist churches in this country.

The First Baptist Church of Seminole, headed by pastor Gene Com Hawkins, is one of the strongest involve Texas Baptist congregations represented in the series of religious meetings immediately before and after the Baptist World Alliance lines) H here, July 12-18.

The World Evangelism Center of New Orleans Baptist Seminary, is coordinating the meetings which will last throughout June and July, according to Dr. W. H. 



The above home was built in Seminole sometime after the turn of the century (1904-1909). It was the first of its kind built here. It is located on the corner of N.W. 2nd Street and Ave. C. It was built by W.H. Brennand who was a merchant located where the present bank building is. In 1921 the Jess Rankin family moved to Seminole. Mr. Rankin bought the house from the Mitchell family who had acquired it from the Brennand family. "It's a big house with nine bedrooms. My father bought the house in 1920 with about one block of land with it. The Brennands also owned the old Sherman Ranch at one time, " said Mrs. Rex Long.

Some of the many outstanding features about the house are (1) it was hauled from Stanton on wagens, (2) the board walk going to the corner, (3) the 8 foot eclipse windmill, (4) the fancy wood fanwork in the gables and on the column posts along the porch. "What I remember about the house," said Nuel Mitchell, "was the wonderful bannisters to slide down." Drive by and see a carpenter's work of art --- located behind McAdoo Chevrolet.

The horse ridden by Pollard was a fovorite cutting horse, named 'Doodle Bug'. Just this side of the hotel a man is pulling a buggy. A wagon loaded with coal can be seen on the right and another indication of the time of the year would be the coats all the cowboys are wearing. A house can be seen in the distance behind the #1 horse and immediately in front of the team. Another house can be seen over the top of the team. The windmill represented the town's waterworks. The continuous tracks on the ground shows they had two different kinds of wagon wheels; a narrow wheel called a 'butcher knife' and then the wider tires.




EDITORIAL

This newspaper has probably enjoyed working on the history of Seminole and Gaines County more than any other thing that it's done. My generation can't help but appreciate so many things that the generation of 1900-1930 accomplished. When some of the older happenings are reviewed I can't help but think of the terrible hard work that went into the freighting business of the early 1900's. How difficult it was to build the early buildings in our town. How hard it was to build a nice home during those years and how much harder it was for people to have a get together. No wonder they had such a good time when they did get together. They worked hard and they played hard.

There's a picture of the first oil well. They didn't drill it in ten days, nor two weeks, nor three weeks. Year 1923, Mac lindsey #1. There's Hackberry Grove - u-um, the good times that's been enjoyed there. There's Seminole 1923. The road grader 1910; you couldn't kick that rig off and get it started in five minutes and be on the job Branding time in Gaines County - no shoots in that corral. Cutting horses and ropers were discussed around every campfire at this time of the year. Captured - one whiskey still, by Sheriff Newt McCleskey - now that would make a story for any newspaper. First deep breaking rig -1927. There's the Gaines County Hotel - oh, if you could only talk, a newspaper man could get rich writing your stories. Seminole had a new school in 1931 and four school buses. Approximately \$65,000 was spent to build the new building that still stands as the Junior High School building. Times have changed and thanks to some planners in early years, the building is not only usable, but still a fine building.

There's the Gaines County officials in 1922 or '23. There's work being done in 1917 on the railroad dump. Hog killing time. The first irrigation plant - on the Eubank farm - 1910. School faculty - 1933 - 11 teachers. Graduating class of 1929 - 10 members. Wright School, 11 miles east of Seminole, in 1929 - 10 students.

I don't know of anyone that lived in that generation that's wanting to live the same way, but I'm here to testify that they made contracts that were binding. They built schools that stood, courthouses that endured and raised another generation of people that were not ashamed of the establishment but tried to build to it instead of tearing it down. I'm here to tell you that I never was mad at the way our forefathers did things and I trust the generation following will be proud of all the hard work of the people in the 1900's, 1930's and the 1960's.

The "Cancer-Fighter" is coming to Town, W. E. Cox, Jr., President of the Gaines County Unit of the American Cancer Society announced today. The Cancer Mobile exhibit van will arrive Friday to display the relationship of cigarette smoking to cancer.

The truck will be located in the center of the Christmas in July booths. The exhibit is one of a fleet now on Texas roads, being displayed at shopping centers, fair grounds, near schools, conventions and factories. Each truck contains a two minute slide presentation called "TO SMOKE OR NOT TO SMOKE", which is particularly addressed to non-smokers.

The truck also features a series of color reproductions of photomicrographs made by a pathologist, showing cancer cells in various stages of growth. A continuous tape transcription explains the photos, comparing cancerous tissue to normal tissue and pointing out the relationship of cancer's warning signals to growths in various parts of the body.

This unique American Cancer Society exhibit is an attempt to better inform the people of our area about the hazards of smoking and the importance of the annual health check-up.

Other routine matters were also discussed. Joe Smith attended his first board meeting after being appointed by the board to fill the


unexpired term of Dan Martin. at least ten years, made outstanding contributions to agriculture and improved rural living.




