There was one set of ten cousins that were near the age of my mother and they had from five to ten kids each. You didn't dare run around a corner without looking 'cause you could get run over by a whole herd of kids.

They were my country cousins—one set, anyway. But the story I want to tell is about my town cousin. He's the one that taught me how to ride a bicycle. He's the one that taught me how to catch a ride holding onto the back of a truck, going up Bangs Hill. He's also the one that threw his chain coming down the same hill and waited too long to get off his bicycle. He must have been making 100 miles an hour, but he rode 'er out.

His last name was Goats and why they named him William I'll never know. They did, just plain ol' Billy Goats. But he was good natured. He never had any trouble like his older brother did, with people bleating at him.

Now Bill (William) knew where all the orchards were. He was a member of one of those clubs where you smoked cigarettes. He sold papers and Saturday Evening Post. He was a wheel! He owned his own bicycle and when he had to fight he did it in a hurry and got it over with. He could show you the best place to sit to look over the fence to watch the ballgame and tell you how many could get in free if so many jumped over the fence.

But the best part of the story was how he finally figured out how to get in the ball park and never get caught. "Bill," I told him, "you and your friends can go in that-a way, but I'm not gonna do it." "Why," he said, "we've got papers spread throughout the bottom of it. The City comes by and limes 'em real good and we've got the door locked from inside so can't anybody use them and before game time one of the boys comes and gets in it so he can tell would-be users to go to the next one."

If there's one thing I'm proud of about my past life it's that I never did use that outdoor john to come into the ballgame. Oh, they were pretty sly about it. Three or four of the boys would saunter over to this restroom and five or six would come walking back. Then after awhile the door would open and another boy would come into the ballgame. It worked pretty good. I never did see one of them get caught. After all, who but my cousin

Approximately 200 people were fed at the Old Timers' Reunion last Saturday. Thirty guests from out of town and 96 local people registered.

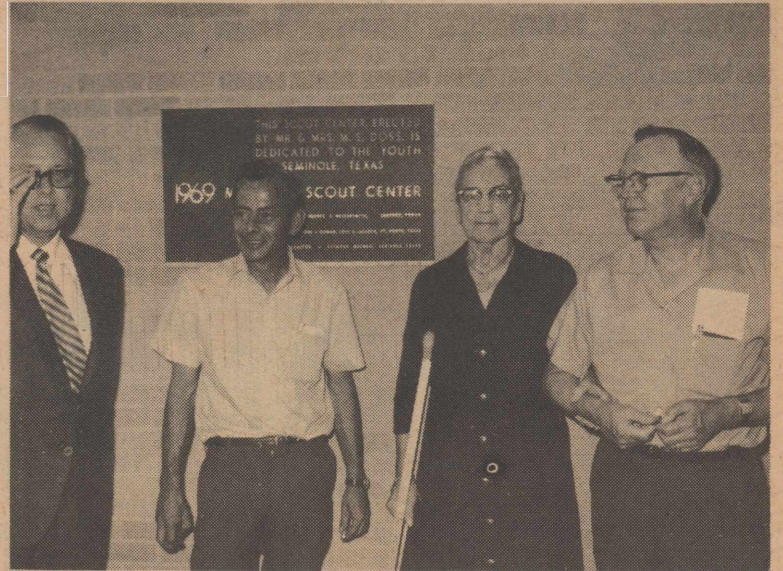

This Scout Center, erected by Mr. and Mrs. M. S. Doss, is dedicated to the youth of Seminole, Texas. On the left is Evans Roberts, architect of the Stiles, Roberts and Messersmith firm, Raymond Buhman of Buhman Construction Co., the builder; Mrs. M. S. Doss and Bud Smith. "The completion of the Scout Center is a dream come true for Mr. Doss."

The Scout Center will serve both boys and girls, the boys on the west and the girls on the east. The building has a fine assembly room. There are 200 chairs available plus 30 tables that will seat from 6 to 8 each. The kitchen, in the center and adjacent to the assembly room, is equipped with the very finest so that banquets might be served or other Scouting needs. On the boys' side accordion doors can be pulled from north and south and east and west to accommodate four groups. The girls' side has two meeting rooms. From the landing in the streets to the sidewalks is outstanding architectural work. Pebble rock inserted into the cement takes the visitor past the sign that reads M. S. Doss Scout Center and into a building that would make much larger cities proud to own. It is a building that cost \$118,533.00. The furniture cost \$4997.34. This did not include a patio or the refrigerator for the kitchen.

Added to the Scout building were two new Scout buses plus a bus garage and storage room at a cost of \$48,978.00. In addition to funds already mentioned Mrs. Doss contributed \$2,000 to an expense and upkeep fund so that Scouting would take on a new meaning for parents and youngsters alike. The Noonday Lions Club which sponsors Scouting in the community will have the supervision of the building.

If one would care to drive down Ave. B, S. W. and stop at the stop sign at 4th St., one could observe from that corner some three buildings that have added so much to the enjoyment of people in Seminole. Besides the Scout Center seen in the distance and the bus barn there's the Mr. and Mrs. M. S. Doss Youth Center and immediately to the right is the M. S. Doss Chapel at the First Methodist Church, between half a million and a million dollars donated by Mr. and Mrs. Doss. When you think of the nice things done for this community by the Dosses how would you liked to have made a trip with Mr. Doss from the west ranch in years gone by?

"Usually I rode a young horse or a bronc when I went to the east place. It was 28 miles. I left at 3 to 4 o'clock in the morning, arrived at the other ranch around 7 to 8 o'clock, caught up another horse, rode till dinner or all day, caught up another fresh horse in the late evening and rode the 28 miles back. The next day I got up a little later to ride the home place. Mrs. Doss looked after the ranch the day I was gone and usually stayed in the day I rode the home place. The next day I was up again to ride to the east place," said the late Mr. Doss.

Young people, when you enjoy the facilities given by Mr. and Mrs. Doss, remember that a lot of hard work went into their gift.



School Dress Policy

In view of the problem of buying clothes for school, the school administration thinks that it would be good to remind parents of the school policies concerning dress of students. It is hoped that this information will be beneficial to parents as they purchase school clothing for their children.

The following is the school dress policy as approved by the Board of Education:

For Boys:

1. Wear shoes or boots that do not attract undue attention because of heavy taps. (Shower shoes or thong shoes are not appropriate footwear.)

10 TRACTORS AT WORK --- In Gaines County various kinds of farming operations can be seen. If tractors are bought that are big enough to pull six, eight and ten row rigs, then the tractors are too big to do the cultivating. This group of five smaller tractors have a smaller tractor out in front helping them pull, or a double header. After the planting is over then the tractors can be used for cultivation and other smaller jobs. These ten tractors plant thirty rows per through, or sixty rows per round, on forty inch centers.

The ten operators of the tractors can be seen together. They are Lynn Whitaker, Frank Cruz, Charles Johnson, Gary Cartwright, Adam Almager, Shorty Hollingsworth, Delbert Shipp, Roy Dickerson, Kenneth Whitaker and Eldon Whitaker. In the past three weeks these rigs have planted approximately 7500 acres of land. The day the pictures were made they were planting on the Carroll Cobb farm, 7 miles south of Seminole. Mrs. Roy Britt cooked dinner for the hands. Her daughter, Mrs. Delbert Shipp, can be seen in the background.

2. Wear trousers at waist level and with a belt. Slacks, blue jeans, or any other type of trousers are acceptable.
3. Wear shirts tucked into trousers. Sport shirts designed to be worn on the outside of the trousers are appropriate.
4. Wear shirts buttoned, except top button, at all times.
5. Wear neat and trim conventional haircuts only.
6. Be clean shaven at all times.
7. Hair should be a natural color.

For Girls:

1. Wear appropriate shoes that do not attract undue attention.
2. Wear dresses or skirts and blouses, or sweaters, to class. Dresses and skirts shall not be shorter than four inches above the top of the kneecap. (Exception: Physical Education classes.)
3. Extreme hair styles and excessive makeup are not appropriate for school dress.
4. A ladylike appearance is expected of all girls at all times.

July 8, 1835 the Liberty Bell cracked while tolling for Chief Justice John Marshall.



SAPPORO, JAPAN---The Governor of the Hokkaido Prefecture and Mayor of the City of Sapporo are among the newest "Honorary Citizens" of the State of Texas in the United States.

In informal ceremonies Tuesday, June 30, representatives from Baptist churches in Seminole Lubbock, and O'Donnell, Texas, made the presentation of Honorary Citizenship to Sapporo Mayor Yosaku Harada in City Hall.

The Rev. Gene Hawkins, Pastor of First Baptist Church, Seminole, Texas, acted as spokesman in presenting the certificate on behalf of Texas Governor Preston Smith.

He is one of about 165 Baptists from Texas and neighboring states in Japan to take part in a series of religious meetings in Japanese Baptist churches before and after the Baptist World Alliance sessions July 12-18.

Special greetings were also extended on behalf of individual cities to the Mayor and will be duplicated with the Governor Wednesday, July 1.

Musical groups from Grand Canyon College of Phoenix, Arizona and Hardin-Simmons University of Abilene, Texas, have made appearances in churches and parks here.

About 600 persons are expected to take part in religious meetings under coordination efforts of the World Evangelism Center of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, New Orleans, Louisiana, before the end of July.

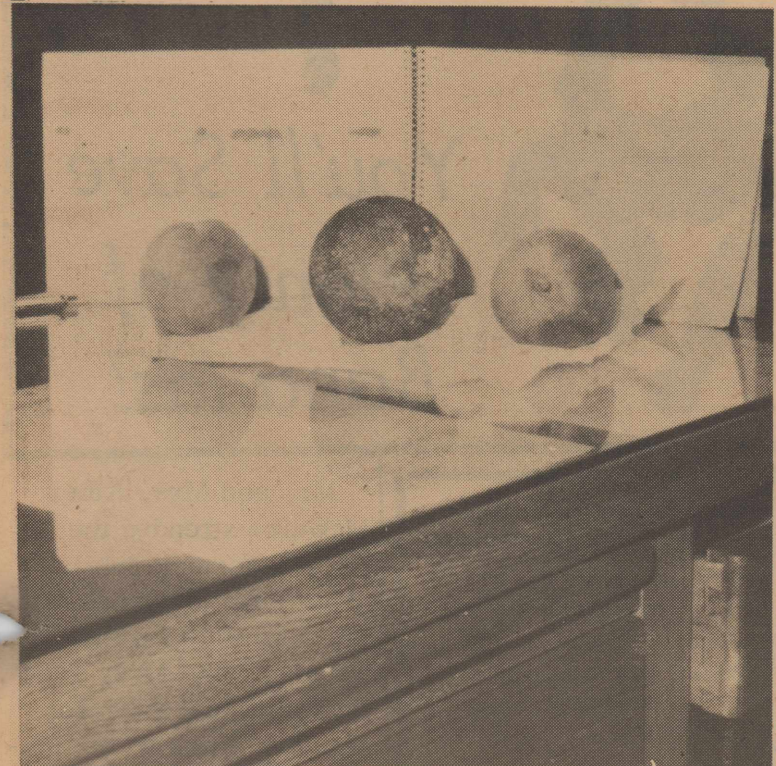

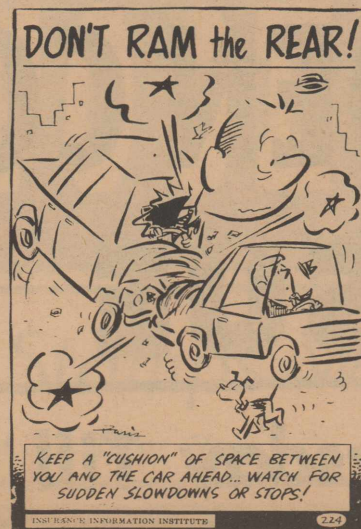

NEWS FROM SOUTHWESTERN PUBLIC SERVICE COMPANY

"Don't hold back. Use all the electric power you want whenever and wherever you want in the 45,000 square mile area that we serve. There is no electric power shortage in this part of the country," Roy Tolk, president of the Southwestern Public Service Company, said today.

The statement of the electric company president was made as a result of frequent articles in national magazines and other media which leave the implication that the whole nation faces a power shortage not only this year but "in the decade ahead," as one publication put it.

"At the end of last year, when we announced our plans to invest \$25,000,000 in new plant and equipment this year, I said, 'there'll be no blackouts in our service area in 1970.' That still goes. I'll add at this time that there won't be any in the future, either, as long as we have the right to plan our own future without outside interference. We have a responsibility to meet the electric service needs of this area and we have done the planning required to carry out that responsibility," Tolk continued.

Southwestern Public Service Company has generating capability reserves that are 18% greater than the peak load which has been predicted for 1970.

"That's like saying you have \$118 put aside to pay a \$100 bill that you owe," Tolk pointed out.

Adequate reserves are normally considered to be generating capability that is equal to the largest single generating unit on your system. Southwestern's reserve capability for 1970 exceeds that margin of safety by nearly 100,000 kilowatts.

Southwestern is already looking down the line at its next 500,000 kilowatts of electric generating capability. At the present time, a 210,000 kilowatt unit, the first in a new facility southeast of Lubbock, is under construction and is scheduled to go into service in mid-1971. Projected units of 289,000 kilowatts of capability are in the planning stage for 1973 and beyond.

"With the help of our area development department and in cooperation with other local industrial development groups, I have started to write to presidents of some companies and to telephone others whose organizations are interested in expansion to tell them of the availability of electric power and other resources in this area. We have outstanding people, lots of space for expansion, a superb climate and energy reserves. Not many areas can say that these days and all of us should work to benefit from these advantages," Tolk concluded.

In Texas alone, there are over 200 catfish farmers, so the U.S. Bureau of Sport, Fisheries and Wildlife says. In the U.S., 18 out of the 50 states have catfish farms. A large number of them are operated on the same principle that a feedlot is operated for cattle. Texas ran 3rd in catfish total acreage farms behind Mississippi and Arkansas.

Sometime in the future, so Purina says, the production may catch up with the demand. It is estimated that 5 to 10 times as many catfish could be sold as are being grown.

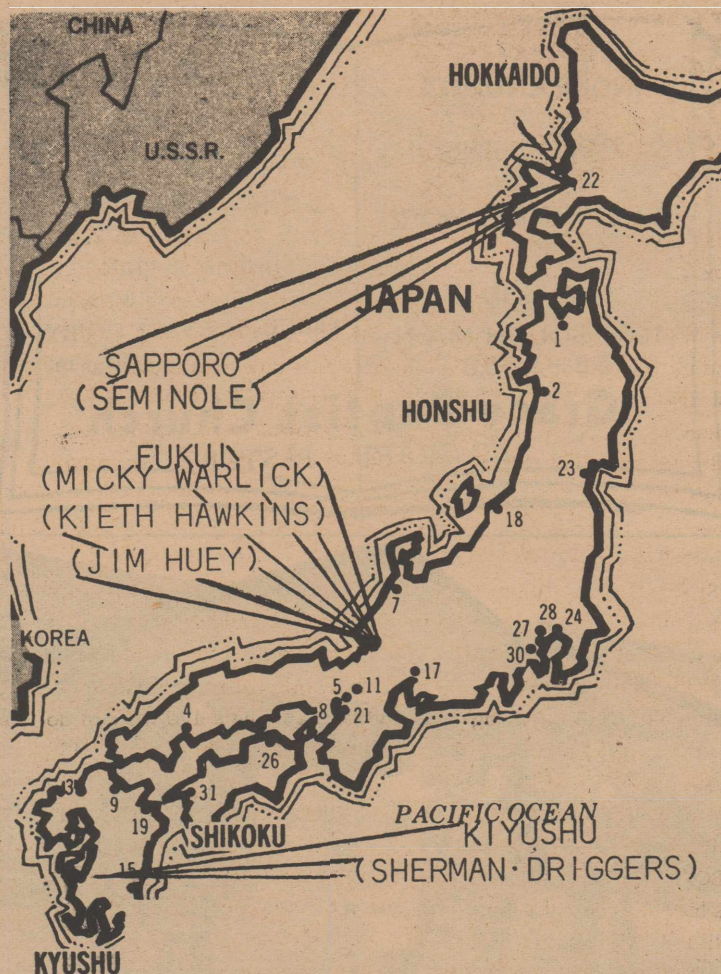
Since catfish are warm water fish, it is economically necessary that they be grown where the water temperature can be expected to remain above 70° F. for approximately 200 days in the year. The longer the growing season, the better. Catfish eat very little when the temperature dips, hence, gain very little.

Water level for catfish can run from 2½ to 6-10 feet deep. Ponds may be harvested by draining and a sloping bottom on a pond is much easier to drain and harvest. The artificially built pond must 'hold water'. Catfish grow better in slow moving or in a static water level pond.

The quality and quantity of the water is most important. Water well or spring water are desirable because you do not have the worry of pesticides, fertilizer and industrial waste. Also, water can be deficient of oxygen and can be saturated with carbon dioxide or other minerals. Water from wells or springs can be airtied by running it through baffles or splashing it off of a flat surface. It takes a well yield of about 1000 gallons of water per minute to serve a 40 acre lake or smaller lakes amounting to 40 acres.

A grower can hatch his own fish eggs or purchase fingerlings and stock up to 1700 to 2000 per acre. (5 inch fingerlings weigh an average of about 32 pounds per 1000, 6 inches-60 pounds per 1000)

Fish are fed 3% of their body weight per day, 6 days a week. Their weight should be checked to determine feeding rate. If you're lucky, if you manage well, you could produce up to 2000 pounds of marketable fish per acre in a year to a year and a half.

Gay Foote wrote to her dad, Leon Foote the following letter from Japan where she had gone with the group from the First Baptist Church.

Sunday afternoon

Dear Daddy,

I sure wish you were here. I love it over here. The people are all so nice and considerate. I only wish I could speak Japanese fluently so I could converse with them.

I decided to come to Fukui and I'm so glad. I love it here. The people at the church here are just great. The pastor speaks a little English but he is the only one. One good thing is that the church here invited a missionary (Calvin Parker) to come and interpret. Last night we had a planning meeting with the pastor, his wife and the church officers. They served us apple pie and hot tea. It was delicious. This morning Jenna Maynard, Keith Hawkins and I went to Sunday School. They only have Sunday School for the little children. After Sunday School the children go home and the adults come for church. Jenna taught the Sunday School lesson this morning.

After church this morning we had a fellowship dinner. You would have loved it. It consisted of tomatoes, cucumbers, deviled eggs, little slices of ham and cheese rolled together, tuna salad sandwiches, milk, hot tea and water. It was real good. In a few minutes we are going by train to Ono City where we will have evening worship. It is the only other Baptist church in this district or area.

Well here it is Monday. We had to leave before I finished this letter. This is the only chance I've had since I was dead tired last night. We had a real good service last night. The church at Ono City is a mission of the Fukui Church. There were about twelve saved and about twenty-four more who said they were interested in seeking Christ. So the membership of that church was more than doubled.

Yesterday morning there were about twelve present at the Fukui Church and an elderly couple was saved. So it was a good day.

I tried calling you last night. I was almost 11:30 p.m. here so it would have been about 9:30 a.m. Sunday there. You didn't answer at home so I tried the church and no one answered.

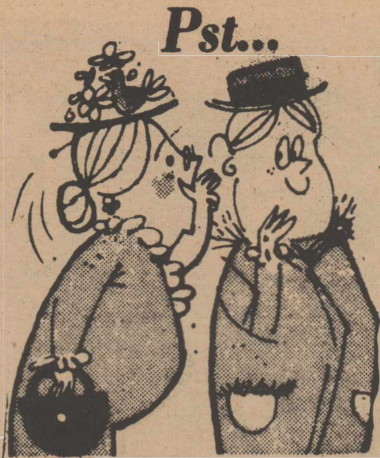
This morning we went and visited from house to house in the area around the church. In about thirty minutes we are going to hand out tracts on the streets near the hotel. I love giving people some tracts because they are so receptive.

Tell them at the News that our schedule is so busy I don't know if I can find time to write. I wouldn't take anything for the train ride over here. We really got to see lots of land. I never dreamed it would be so beautiful.

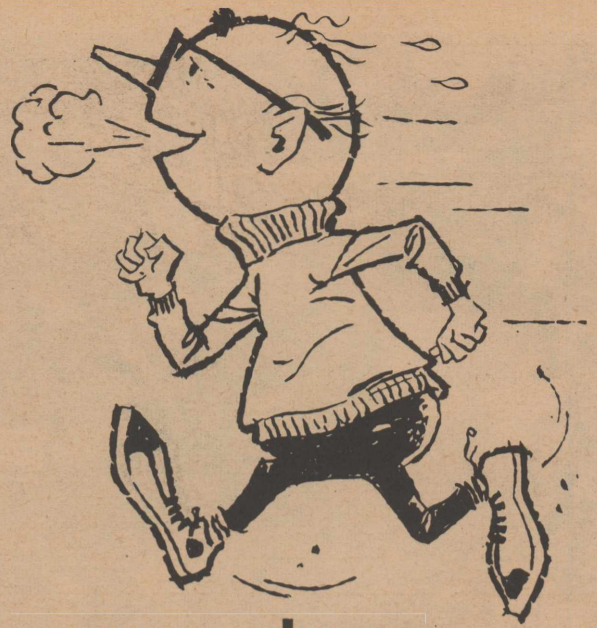

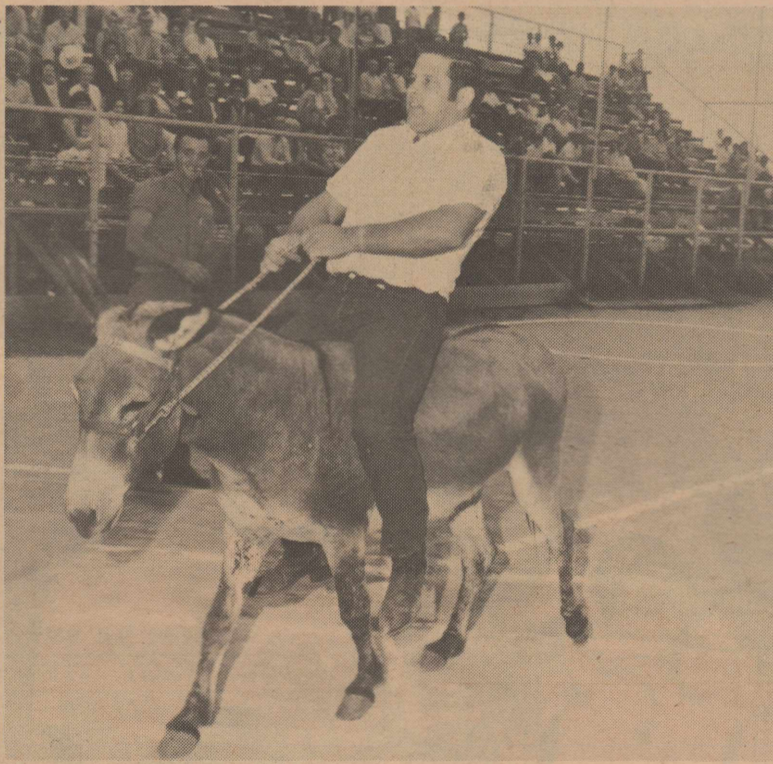

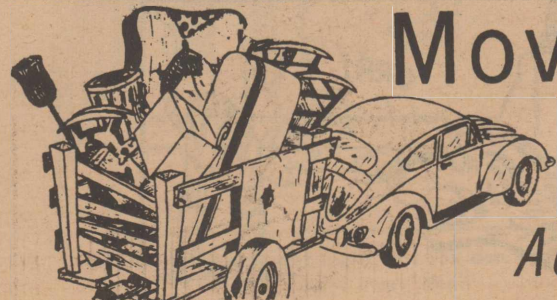
