THE MINIMUM NUMBER OF STUDENTS PER TEACHER IS FIVE, AND THE MAXIMUM IS EIGHT. THE PRE-SCHOOL AGE, FOR THESE CHILDREN IS THREE YEARS TO NINE YEARS OF AGE. THE PURPOSE OF THIS SCHOOL IS TO PREPARE THESE STUDENTS TO ATTEND SPECIAL EDUCATION CLASSES IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS, TO EDUCATE THEM TO THE EXTENT OF THEIR ABILITY TO LEARN AND THUS PRE-VENT AS MANY AS POSSIBLE OF THESE CHILDREN ENTERING STATE INSTITUTIONS, ALSO TO TEACH THEM TO BE A PART OF OUR COMMUNITY AND HAVE A PLACE IN SOCIETY.



SCHOOL BOARD

The tax rate was set by the School Board in last Monday night's meeting. A rate of 28¢ was set on the interest and sinking fund and \$1.68 on local maintenance state and county, for a total of \$1.96 per hundred. It is estimated by business manager, George Cristy, that the rate will being in approximately \$1,595,880.00.

2. The following resignations were accepted: Mr. Jake Harrell - head football coach and athletic director, Mr. Edard Love - high school speech, English and forensics coach, Miss Elizabeth Grubb - junior high school librarian, Mrs. Jewel Hutchins - fourth grade teacher at F. J. Young School, and Mrs. Edard Love - third grade teacher at F. J. Young School.

3. Ronald Henderson's request to attend the NCAA tournament instead of the state basketball tournament was granted.

4. The following policy for kindergarten eligibility was accepted. A pupil will be eligible to participate in the kindergarten program if he meets the age qualifications as prescribed by law and comes from a family with an annual income of three thousand dollars or less, or who is educationally handicapped by inability to speak and understand the English language to the extent that he is not familiar with the common English words that are necessary for normal progress in the first grade.

The extent of a pupil's ability to speak and understand the English language will be determined by personal interview and by tests. Tests will be administered by the school counselor, or counselors, and will include all or portions of the Stanford-Binet, the Weschler Intelligence Scale for Children, and other tests as may seem appropriate.

5. The board voted to contact their representatives and follow the recommendation of Mr. R.G. Burton, a school board member from Andrews, concerning the tax on school properties in Gaines County.

6. On the recommendation of school superintendent, Mr. Tommy Joe Woodard was hired. He is qualified as a history teacher or an English teacher.

7. Mildred Geneva Nelson was selected as secretary for F.J. Young Elementary School.

8. Mrs. O. L. Young was employed on a temporary basis to teach for Mr. Don Ashley, who will be serving in the National Guard for thirteen weeks.

9. Miss Sherry LaRue Goucher was elected for music teacher at F. J. Young Elementary School.

Other vacancies that need to be filled are speech, English and forensics coach in high school.

10. Miss Judy Bugher and Miss Sandra Ward were granted funds to attend the State Volleyball Clinic in Temple.

ll. The budget was amended to take care of a past due milk bill, so that it might be paid.

Chamber Of Commerce

The Seminole Area Chamber of Commerce met for a breakfast meeting at Jo's Restaurant Tuesday morning. Reports were made on the success of the Old Settlers Reunion and Christmas in July. The Chamber reported \$435. 49 was received from the Friday night celebration. The balance of \$305.00 was sent on the lighting bill owed an Odessa firm. The fireworks display cost \$289.00 this year. Area service clubs have donated \$175.00 toward this expense.

Chamber president Glen Cavitt reported that the county could not, because of a law forbidding them, participate in the expense of the Chamber. The City has not given a final word as of this date. The Chamber voted to form a board of city development at some future date so that a portion of the Chamber's expense might be defrayed in asking for a percent of the city tax dollar.

George Cristy, a director, pointed out that the tennis meet was a big success, that Seminole has been invited as a member of the Hiway 180 tennis tour to take San Angelo's place, who has dropped out. He pointed out further the need for some help in operating the track meet Saturday - beginning time 9 a.m.


