I'm convinced that Lions Club members spend more money in support of the Little League program than the rest of the town put together. This is okay, I guess; this is what we're there





Doctors Still Needed

Seminole is still looking for doctors. Many places are. (2) Dr. Dow wants to go into semi-retirement within the next few weeks. (3) It would be most difficult to be reinstated for Medicare if it becomes necessary to close down the hospital. (4) The hospital board, Dr. Dow, the commissioners' court, Ed Rodgers - hospital administrator, and other officials and citizens have exerted themselves in the search. (5) The court is not in a position to buy the clinic that Dr. Dow and Mrs. Koberg, the widow of the late Dr. Frederick Koberg, own.

Please consider the five statements listed above. If we could obtain doctors by furnishing them a clinic facility, what in the world would be wrong with individuals of this community owning it themselves? Are we so small as to sit back and complain that the county will not do this or that, that the school will not do this or that, that the state will not do this or that or that the federal government will not do this or that? Where is the community pride that will let the right or the wrong of any governing board get in the way of our wants and needs when it's right?

Yes, we can have a fine clinic. We can have fine doctors. We can have a fine hospital to go with the other good things that we take for granted, if we want them. Where is the family that, when sudden tragedy strikes, would not give an extra \$100, \$200 or \$1000 to have a doctor available, rather than having to drive to Lubbock, Andrews, Hobbs or Lamesa? Don't tell anyone we can't afford it. The time may come. The time may be here when you cannot but help afford it.

(Editor's note: Not only will I help sell it, but I'll help buy it.) Whatever it takes (within reason) to secure doctors is what we must do. If it takes the price of a clinic, if it takes free rent for a year, let's do it. If it takes something else, let's obtain it.

DID YOU KNOW that August lst is the final date to certify your cotton, feed grain, and diverted acreages under the 1970 commodity programs? If you are receiving measuring service, of course, you want to wait until you receive your report of acreages to certify. This work is progressing on schedule and you will receive your notice in plenty of time to certify. If you are doing your own measuring, we again urge you to be careful and accurate in your measuring and computation of acreages.

REMEMBER the day you certify is the final day you can adjust cotton and feed grain acreages. Administrative control checks are being made as soon as certifications are received and we have found several errors in certifications. These errors are expensive. The penalty for overstatement of feed grain acreage for example is one-half (1/2) of the Price Support Payment.

DID YOU KNOW that having a beneficial interest in the feed grain crop on a farm anywhere in the United States that exceeds its feed grain base makes you ineligible for a feed grain payment on any other farm in the United States? Also that failure to report an interest in the farm at certification time could cause you to lose all payments on all your other farms.

Final date for certification --August 3, 1970.

Final date to redeem Cotton from the loan -- July 31, 1970.

Payments will continue to be made as rapidly as farmers continue to certify program compliance, and as fast as records can be processed through computers at the data processing center in New Orleans and checks returned to the county ASCS Office for distribution, Troy said. The bulk of payments should be made by mid-August if farmers who signed up complete the necessary certification indicating that they have complied with all of the program provisions, Martin stated. This is earlier than payments have been made in previous years. Martin pointed out that these payments to farmers have an impact on the entire community because most of the money remains in the local area where farmers pay for the things they need to buy. Participation by producers in farm programs helps even out the year-byyear flow of farm products to market, which also helps stabilize food and fiber prices, a benefit to consumers, he said.

"Farmers earn payments by diverting part of their cropland to conservation uses, " Troy explained. "This helps keep a balance between supply and demand for food and fiber, preserves the excess acres for future use when they are needed, and provides an orderly supply of farm products to consumers. '







I am Jimmie Dick Davis, and do not mind signing my name to this even though some of you may not agree with me. I am proud of who I am and what I am and I do not expect everyone of you to agree with me, but I do expect you to give me the same freedom of speech as I would allow you. I have lived in Seminole off and on all of my life, and have always loved it before now. I am so disappointed in this town.

This town is so concerned with petty hatreds and misconceptions of each other they will never be able to solve the problems we have. As far as a new doctor coming to our town, you might as well forget it. A doctor with ethics and love for humanity would never come here again. Not because we have no hospital, or that, as many of you have falsely stated, because of Dr. Dow. The reason is you and I. We have already drained one man completely of life and are trying our best to do another one the same way, all the while griping and complaining about every little thing we can find wrong with them. We set these men on pedestals and expect nothing less than perfection from them.

I was told one time that medicine is the 'Process of Elimination' As so many diseases have the very same symptoms, they must try one thing and then the next to decide what is actually wrong. Only God can make a human being, yet we expect our doctors to know every detail of what is wrong with these complex organs. I know that Dr. Dow and Dr. Koberg were not perfect and have probably made many mistakes, but I know of no doctors that will ever try as hard to make you well. If you have found doctors that you think are much better you check their record of hours on the job, and patients seen, and mistakes made. Every doctor will make mistakes because they are not God. The judgement should come from whether they were trying to get you well or whether they were after your money when the mistake was made.

I went to school with David Dow and Rick Koberg and when all of you were at the school, etc. with your children, their daddies were trying to deliver a baby or sew up someone else's child, or tend to someone who really didn't need a doctor at all. I have seen many of you let them treat you well for years and the minute they do something you, as a layman, consider not right, you turn on them quick as a wink. The same holds true for Bill Oswalt. I know that he carried many of you for many years and yet if he won't fill a prescription for you that is not supposed to be refilled, you turn on him.

I would publicly like to thank Dr. Dow and Mrs. Dow, Mrs. Koberg and Bill Oswalt for a wonderful childhood and now for helping me with my own children. There are so many so called Christians in our town, but I learned more about God and the love of Jesus Christ from you. While everyone else is out sitting piously in some church, talking about the person sitting next to them, you are out living and doing God's word.

Dr. Dow could be practicing medicine elsewhere right now, but because he loved you all so much, he wouldn't leave you, but you would do nothing for him. Let's all examine ourselves and see if we are not to blame for the doctor shortage.

We will never have any industry come in here with no doctors here, and no doctors will ever come here without better facilities and a change of attitude in our town. Let's stop talking about God's love and forgiveness, and start living it. If you don't believe in God, then you must believe in humanity as you are a part of it. s/ Jimmie Dick Davis

OIL COMPANY FILES SUIT

ATLANTIC RICHFIELD COMPANY, MOBIL OIL CORPORATION, AND AMERADA DIVISION OF AMERADA HESS CORPORATION HAS FILED SUIT AGAINST GAINES COUNTY, THE COUNTY JUDGE, COMMISSIONERS COURT, AND TAX ASSESSOR OF GAINES COUNTY. THIS IS CAUSE NO. 6127 IN THE DISTRICT COURT OF GAINES COUNTY AND THIS SUIT WAS FILED ON JULY 17TH.

Kelley, who is nine years old, is proving to be quite a fisherman. The following article appeared in the Amarillo Globe recently. He said his fish felt like a man eating shark.








