Tragedy Strikes Seminole Family

Many good things happen to towns. Seminole, in all probability, has received more than its fair share. Underlying the western part of the county is an estimated storage of seventy years of fresh water in the ogallala formation. Probably no other county has this great amount of water resources. As oil companies have completed a lot of the drilling, water to this community and this county becomes much more valuable.

What other county of 14,000 people has the great oil production such as Gaines County? The great wealth removed from under the top soil has been most important to the economy of Seminole and the area. The Texas Almanac reported Gaines County producing 37, 397, 226 barrels of oil in 1968.

Where can you find the schools (there are very few) that have the wealth to build the buildings, to pay the salaries, to afford extra curricular activities and enjoy the high level of education as young people attending the Seminole Independent School District?

Gaines County residents are fortunate today. When counties were measured out, they couldn't see the water and they couldn't see the BILLY JOE THOMPSON oil, so she was marked off 900, 000 acres which is more than twice the size of some Texas counties. Little did the dividers of counties know that in 1970 there would be 500, 000 acres in cultivated crop land, with thousands of acres of potatoes, alfalfa hay growing by the section, cotton supporting gins springing up in each section of the county, peach orchards reaching from hill to hill, going out of sight, plus peanuts, green beans, watermelons almost unbelievably good, and grain sorghum reaching near half of the cultivated acres, with an estimated gross income of \$20 to \$25 million.

> Besides the school buildings what other town has a county seat that matches the courthouse in Gaines County? What other town can boast a new field house, a new scout center (such as the M.S. Doss Scout Center) and a youth center (such as the M. S. Doss Youth Center) to equal the ones here?

> Seminole and Gaines County are more than fortunate to have a Commissioners Court that wants to get along with the City Council, with a City Council that has the common interest of the Chamber of Commerce and a Chamber of Commerce that supports the School Board, and all are generally working together for one another's good. (It has not always been like this and is not like this in some other towns.) It's good that Seminole and Gaines County has law enforcement officers that work. Only one traffic fatality (by motorcycle) has been charged against Gaines County outside the city limits. A great deal of this can be contributed to the hard work of the Texas Department of Public Safety, Kenneth Selman, Phil Upton and Clay-

It's a real pleasure for residents to see the Sheriff's Department aid the Police Department and local Police Department aiding the Sheriff's Department and both working hand in hand with state men. (This is a far cry from conditions existing in some other counties.)

Very few counties have as many paved roads and/or paved streets to service so few. Gaines County is lucky.

Seminole has the promise of a new doctor moving in by September 15, another in a two year period and still another hopeful in the

Let's get on with the important things. If Seminole has this type income, this type facilities, can expect and maintain doctors, a hospital should be forthcoming and in all probability will. If a hospital district is necessary, let's get on with it.

Yesterday morning Seminole residents awakened to a red glow in the east; the sun rose in all its glory. Residents and close neighbors were unaware that a family of three lay dead in their home at 601 S. W. 16th St. Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Thurman and their daughter, Sherry's lives had been snuffed out with a 30.06 rifle. Mrs. Bonnie Brown, a sister to Mr. Thurman, was called from Odessa by Mrs. Thurman's mother shortly before 8:00 a.m. and asked to check on the Thurmans since their telephone did not answer. It was Sherry's 17th birthday and they were supposed to have visited the grandmother in Odessa on Monday.

Mrs. Brown went by on her way to work, only to discover the terrible tragedy in her brother's home. She summoned help. Virginia Thurman was dead in the den on the rug approximately two feet from the open area of the kitchen with a single shot entering her chest. Sherry was dead in the adjoining room, her bedroom, having fallen in the floor after being grazed by one shot in the back and hit with another shot in the left chest. The bullet spent itself after going through the headboard, the inside wall and into the outside wall of the brick home. Mr. Thurman lay dead between his daughter and his wife with the bullet entering his lower rib cage on the left and coming out below the left shoulder in front. Ammunition used in the heavy rifle was silver point bullets that have a tendency to explode or separate after penetrating. Four to five shots, at least, were fired from the gun, one bullet evidently fired from the gun going through the ceiling and on out the roof in the bedroom where the daughter and the father were lying on the floor. The gun lay near the right shoulder of the fallen father.

Sixty-nine dolls from around the world in an enclosed case in the hallway were the only witnesses as to the exact time and other details of earlier hours in the home. The dolls had been collected by a little girl in a wheel chair to her 17th birthday.

Horses, horses! They were a scourge to drivers in the early hours of last Saturday morning. Otho H. Dryman, age 44, was dead on arrival at Seminole Memorial Hospital after striking a horse at 4:25 a.m. in a 1970 Pontiac. His wife, Doris, age 41, was treated


The wrecks started at 1:05 Saturday morning when Michael J. Anderson, 27 years old, driving a 1968 Oldsmobile, was traveling north, topped a hill and saw about eight horses on the highway. He applied his brakes, swerved and went into a broadside skid. He hit two marker posts on the side of the road, doing about \$600 damage to his car. He and his wife were uninjured.

Four minutes later James Alton Bradford and wife Charlotte had left Seminole and were on their way to Coyanosa to visit the Drymans (her mother and father) when three horses ran in front of them. He applied his brakes and went to the right, striking one horse. The 1964 Olds sustained \$125 damage, rupturing the radiator. They called home, asking for assistance, and the Drymans were on their way to Seminole to pick them up when they hit the lone horse at the same place that Anderson was hit in the first accident. The head of the horse came through the windshield, striking the driver, Dryman, in the face. He was dead on arrival.

Kenneth Selman, TDPS, stated that the horses were owned by four men from Seminole and one of Lamesa. Dryman was a retired Navy veteran, having moved to Coyanosa in May of last year from Houston. Anderson was an airman stationed in Altus, Oklahoma. Con't on page 2

Last Sunday night my telephone rang and a voice said, "This is Mrs. Allen. Do you remember me? I called Mrs. Shelton and I wanted to call you before I left Seminole." I asked, "Is this Mrs. T. L. Allen? Is this Mrs. Theodore L. Allen? Is this Mrs. 'Shonough'?" Things exploded on the other end as she began to laugh. She had one of the happiest laughs I've ever known.

The Allens moved to Seminole in 1951. Mrs. Allen was a cagen from Louisiana -- and outstanding. She called to thank me for treating her and her family so good when they lived in our town.

There are a few people in the world that I could never pay back if I live to be a Methuselah. The Allen family would be among that group. If they brought me 5 customers they must have brought a hundred. When bad days come I can think about the happiness that existed amoung them and the adrenalin begins pumping immediately. They were customers through 1956, but this never got in the way of our friendship.

In talking about her husband, she said, "Mr. Woods he's been so good to me and the children. He never raised his hand at me and you know he should have. Look at him, " she would say, "he's a smart man. He doesn't say much. He knows what you know. He knows what I know and he knows all he knows." And she told me over the telephone Sunday night, "Mr. Allen had cancer for 3 years and I had to go to work. He's always made me a good living and I told my boss man, 'You'll have to pay me good cause I have to make my husband a good living cause he's been so good to me. ' Mr. Woods, they pay me more than twice what I'm worth."

I kept up with the Allens when they lived in Aztec, New Mexico; Baton Rouge, Louisiana; Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; McCamey, Texas; Borger; Andrews; Odessa; Lubbock; Port Isabel; McAllen; Neodesh, Kansas; and Pampa, Texas.

Mr. Allen worked for Chicago Bridge and Iron and was a hard working man.

Over the years, they had five children and every arrival was a blessed event and each time the mother rejoyced that they were blond, blue-eyed and looked like their papa instead of their dark

"And Mr. Woods," she finally said, "the last little boy, who is now 12 years old, is dark and looks like his mama and ain't that a shame!"

Why aren't there more people in the world that have the exuberance for living, the love for their husbands, the great care for their children, the great capacity for friendship, the will to work with their hands and the good laugh of Mrs. Theodore L. Allen.





Elmer J. Adkins, manager of Southeastern Commonwealth Drilling Company in New Plymouth, New Zealand and formerly of Seminole, sends a copy of their rig working off shore. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Adkins. From the top of the rig to the bottom of the triangle where the anchors are measures 355 feet high. The building in the triangle to the left of the rig is a two story, housing up to 73 men with their living quarters. The ring on top of the building represents the landing for helicopters. The off shore drilling rig cost approximately \$12,000,000. The total weight 9841 long tons. The rig has 9 30,000 pound anchors. The 3 pontoons on which the complete structure rides measures 100 ft. x 60 ft. x 25 ft.

'It moves easy", so Mr. Adkins said. "No, we do not skid it; we simply tow it behind two tugs to a new location. Our deepest well has been 12, 500 feet."

The company has drilled seven wells and with the tremendous cost in their completion they have to be good wells. Generally the drilling is similar to West Texas, with the setting of a surface pipe, intermediate pipe and the long string. After completion there is a three acre platform built with a pipe line going directly from each well to shore. The men work two weeks on location and have two weeks






