

SCHOOL FOR

MENTALLY RETARDED

The Tri-Cities Satellite School for mentally retarded youngsters will open in Seminole November 2, according to Mrs. Tommy Montandon, chairman of the temporary supervisory board. Open to residents of the Seminole, Seagraves, and Denver City area, it will be for pre-school educable mentally retarded pupils, or trainable mentally retarded pupils of all ages.

Operated under the supervision of the Texas State Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, the school will offer special training and evaluation for mentally retarded children. Emphasis will placed on self-help training and emotional adjustment with a goal of helping these children find their place in and be a contributing part

The salary of the teacher will be paid by the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation. There will be no charge to the pupils as money for other expenses will be raised through contributions and special projects.

Day-to-day oversight of the school will be in the hands of a supervisory board chosen from residents of the Tri-Cities region.

Classes are scheduled to run n from 9:00 a.m. until 12:00 noon each Monday through Friday all twelve months of the year.

Mrs. Montandon said that applications are now being accepted for admittance to the school. Parents may contact Mrs. Montandon, Post Office Box 443, Seminole, or Mrs. Fred Koberg, 601 S. W. 14th Street, telephone number 758-3709, in Seminole relative to enrolling children. Application should be made immediately as class enrollment will be limited to eight pupils.

Applications are also being accepted for a teacher for the class. Salary will be approximately \$300 per month with the primary qualification being an interest in working with handicapped youngsters. A mature lady who has raised children is preferred, however. No previous experience is necessary as training will be furnished by the Lubbock State School staff.

Persons interested in this position should contact Mrs. Montanton or Mrs. Koberg before October 1, as interviews and screening procedure will commence on that date.

In addition to the salaried teacher, volunteer aides are also needed. Aides will work in assisting and encouraging students rather than a teaching. Persons willing to serve as aides should contact Mrs. Montandon or Mrs. Koberg. It will not be necessary for an aide to be able to devote full time, but the services of people who are able and willing to work even as much as three or four hours each week

Mrs. Montandon stressed that the Satellite school was in no wav a part of the public school program, but was rathe program for handicapped children not eligible for public schools.



Bubonic Plague

DURING THE PAST THREE OR FOUR WEEKS OFFICIALS HAVE BEEN AWARE THAT RABBITS, RATS, FIELD MICE, PRAIRIE DOGS AND COYOTES HAVE BEEN DYING IN THE CEDAR LAKE AREA AND SOUTH. IT IS THOUGHT AT THIS TIME THAT THEY ARE DYING FROM THE BUBONIC PLAGUE.

R.C. BARRON IS WITH THE PUBLIC HEALTH DEPARTMENT IN SEMINOLE SAID, "IT IS CONFIRMED THAT THERE ARE MANY DEAD ANIMALS IN THE CEDAR LAKE AREA, EVIDENTLY DEAD FROM THE PLAGUE." HE WARNED HUNTERS TO ESPECIALLY KEEP THEIR DOGS OUT OF THE AREA ALSO TO USE SULPHER ON LOWER CLOTHING AND BOOTS IF WORKING IN THAT PART OF THE COUNTY.

THE DREAD DISEASE IS CARRIED BY FLEAS ABOUT TWICE THE SIZE OF A REGULAR DOG FLEA. BUBONIC PLAGUE IN MAN USUALLY RESULTS FROM THE BITE OF A FLEA ALTHOUGH THE DISEASE MAY BE CONTRACTED BY THE DIRECT CONTACT OR THE BITE OF AN INFECTED RODENT. THE FLEA BECOMES INFECTED AFTER IT FEEDS ON THE BLOOD OF AN EFFECTED ANIMAL.

THE NEW MEXICO DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH REPORTED TWO CASES OF PLAGUE IN AIR FORCE PERSONNEL WHO HAD HUNTED RABBITS TOGETHER IN AN AREA NEAR ROSWELL, NEW MEXICO AND 30 MILES NORTH OF THIS COMMUNITY ON FEBRUARY 19 AND 20, 1960. THE FIRST CASE DEVELOPED SYMPTOMS ON FEBRUARY 23. THE ILLNESS WAS QUITE SEVERE, THE SECOND CASE DEVELOPED SYMTOMS ON FEBRUARY 25 AND WAS MUCH MILDER. 361 TWO DEATHS WERE REPORTED -- A SAWMILL WORKER AT COWLES, NEW MEXICO AND A HARVARD GEOLOGY PROFESSOR WHO HAD BEEN DOING FIELD WORK IN THE PECOS, NEW MEXICO AREA AND DIED IN MASSACHUSETTS. A THIRD CASE WITH RECOVERY FOLLOWING TREATMENT, WAS REPORTED DURING AUGUST 1961 IN A POWER COMPANY LINEMAN WORKING IN THE PECOS, NEW MEXICO AREA. IN DECEMBER 1963, AN INDIAN SHEEPHERDER FROM HOUCK, ARIZONA DIED OF PLAGUE AFTER ADMISSION TO THE INDIAN HEALTH HOSPITAL IN GALLUP, NEW MEXICO.

SINCE 1900-1964 THERE HAVE BEEN 951 CASES REPORTED IN THE U.S. OF THESE 723 DIED.

D. W. FOLMAR, THE GAINES COUNTY RAT AND RODENT EXTERMINATER SAID THAT HE HAD BEEN WORKING WITH THE PROGRAM FOR 27 YEARS AND HAD SENT IN 55 RECENT CAUGHT DISEASE CARRYING FLEAS TO A DENVER LAB. HE FELT LIKE HE WOULD HAVE CONFIRMATION WITHIN A FEW

DAYS. "YES, HE SAID, I TAKE SHOTS EACH YEAR SO I WILL NOT TAKE THE DISEASE."

SEMINOLE RESIDENTS ARE ASKED TO TAKE PARTICULAR CARE TO KEEP DOGS AND OTHER PETS UP SO THEY WILL NOT COME IN CONTACT WITH OTHER ANIMALS TRANSFERRING THE FLEAS TO THEM.

Seminole EDITORIAL

My father-in-law Ross A. Smith (deceased) was some sort of philosopher in his own right. He used to say "Walter, don't ever tell anybody that you've got the biggest house, the biggest watermelon, the longest snake or the smartest child. Somebody will always come by that can outdo it."

I like that story my aunt tells about the old judge who was so proud of his hometown lake. In discussing his home lake he told my aunt how far it was around the water edge and she told him about Amistad. He in turn told her how deep his lake was and she told him how deep Amistad was. And then she asked him how much capacity his lake held and he immediately shot back "You tell me how much your lake holds first."

One of my lifetime ambitions was to go through the RCA Building in New York City because it was so tall. Finally I got to go through it and a year or two later through the Empire State Building, 1250 ft. It's always been nice to tell people I've been on top of the tallest building in the world. Now I'm in trouble again. The new World Trade Center Building in New York is to outstrip the Empire State Building by 100 feet and recently announced is a Sears Tower to be put up in Chicago, 1450 feet high. The building will have $4\frac{1}{2}$ million sq. ft. in it. It will house over 16,000 employees, 7,000 of them being Sears. The U.S. News and World Report says that it will be served by 102 high-speed elevator cabs, including 14 double-deck units – plus 16 escalators. An observation level is planned for the 103rd floor – 1,350 feet up.

And you think this is tall. Well, don't give up yet. None of these buildings even approaches the tallest skyscraper ever designed. Famed architect Frank Lloyd Wright in 1956 exhibited drawings for a milehigh structure for Chicago. The Wright building would have had 528 stories and would have been equipped with atomic-powered elevators for use by the 130, 000 tenants it was planned to accommodate.

As my father-in-law used to say - just don't tell people you've got the tallest building in the world. That works overtime on some folks and they'll start dreaming. I recall his carrying in a sunflower to the bank in Ballinger that was 12 feet 8 inches tall (they'd offered a reward for the tallest one) and they met him at the door and said "Don't bring it in unless it's over 13 feet."

This may not be the best plan, but it is a plan that will sustain a generation that will follow. I would like to think that my generation has not mined all of the oil, the gas and the water, Rather, I would like to believe that we left them with a source of fresh water that does not taste like the water in Odessa today and the taste of water in San Angelo. (It's sad when people passing through our town fill up jugs of water to take home to make coffee with.)
