One of the great problems for African young men is the brideprice (lobola) they are required to pay when they want to get married. This often amounts to half a years pay, or more, in some cases. They usually pay a about half of this on being married, and then pay on the remainder for years. Any time the wife's parents demand money, the husband has to come up with it. Even after many years of marriage, the parents can take the wife back home if payments are not made.

The customs are so rigid that sons-in-law dare not approach the wife's parents directly, but everything has to be negotiated through a 'go-between." This past month three of our preachers faced crises on this problem. We tried to get them to put off paying for a month, or manage some other way, but they were most persistent in appealing for loans, of \$30 or \$50.

Grenwell Machakwa, our blind preacher who spends most of his time translating and typing in the office, was most distressed. He had shown the "pfuma" (treasure) of four cows to the parents, and they had agreed, after long negotiation, to accept them as half of the lobola. Because in Tribal Trust Areas each person has to have a "Stock Card" with the number of the cows, it was a long time before the transfer of ownership was made.

In the meantime, Grenwell's cows got lost. They were, no doubt, stolen. The wife's parents sent an ultimatum that he should pay money by September 1. After much negotiation they agreed to \$50 instead of cattle). With this history, Grenwell felt he would be ruined if he didn't come up with the money. I finally dredged up the \$50 from personal funds. There are so many cases where it is impossible to say no, even when we really don't have the funds.

There will be no verdict on the death of Preston Shain, 50, until later in the week when the pathologist "finishes his study and advises W. E. Cox, coroner and Justice of the Peace". Also the sheriff's office is expecting later in the week a study by the crime lab in Austin, Texas, concerning items sent there.

The mysterious slaying took place at an early hour last Wednesday morning at his cleaning establishment on the east side of the square. The .32 caliber revolver was found under his body. Evidently, the second bullet to be fired into his forehead caused his death. An earlier bullet at the hairline went through the scalp but not the skull. This gash was first thought by authorities to be caused by a foot long pipe wrench found nearby. The bullet holes were approximately two inches apart.

Shain, who had operated the City Cleaners here for a number of years, was found by Mrs. Judy Stidham, an employee, after being called by Shain's wife. The businessman was dressed except for his shoes. The gun was one that was identified as having been in the establishment. Change from the previous day's receipts was scattered upon the floor. Masking tape covered the victim's mouth, also tape was left on his arms. A tubular kitchen chair still had tape on the

upright lower section where the victim had been taped to the chair. On a small table near the chair was a cigarette pack, also the remainder of three smoked cigarettes in an ashtray. Nearby was a spotting table with a blanket on it, used in the cleaning business.

The body was found in a kneeling or crawling position where Shain had crawled 12 to 16 feet. One shot had been fired from the gun while it was wrapped up in a white cloth. Credit cards and billfold lay on the floor near the body. The back door was open with the bolt dropped back in the hasp. There was no evidence of forced entry into the building.

Funeral services for Preston Shain were held at 10 a.m. in the Avenue B. Church of Christ, Joe Harber, minister of the West Side Church of Christ, officiating. Survivors include his wife, Naomi Ann; a son, Michael Don, a student at East Texas Baptist College in Marshall; a daughter, Gail, a student at Seminole High School; a brother, Garnett of Midland and one grandson.

Mr. Shain had been a resident of Seminole for 27 years. He was a veteran of World War II, a member of the West Side Church of Christ, a member of the Seminole Volunteer Fire Department and the Evening Lions Club of Seminole. All members of the fire dertment served as pall bearers for the funeral.

DIL PRODUCTION GAINES COUNTY

Texas oil fields have produced more than 32 billion barrels of oil during the past 80 years of recorded production, according to the latest compilation of the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

Last year's production of 1, 151, 775, 000 barrels produced an income of \$3.6 billion for Texas which was distributed widely as 198 of the state's 254 counties produce oil.

Gaines County, which has had recorded production since 1936 has had a total crude oil output of 608, 766, 862 barrels up to the beginning of 1970. Gaines County production in 1969 was 40, 181, 646 barrels at the rate of 110, 087 barrels a day.

Thirty-four counties in the state produced more than 25,000 barrels of oil. Top producers were Andrews with 203, 859 barrels daily, Ector with 184, 601 barrels daily, Scurry with 133, 035 barrels daily, Crane with 132, 719, Gregg with 124, 607 barrels daily and Gaines with 11,087 barrels daily.

Gregg County, the only county to produce more than two billion barrels of oil, remained the all-time champ with a cumulative production of 2, 195, 668, 052 followed by Ector with 1, 585, 815, 280, and Rusk with 1, 437, 128, 523.

If oil were worth \$3.00 a barrel and Gaines County produced in excess of 40 million barrels per year in 1969 this would mean \$120 million income on an investment of \$193 million. In the recent law suit brought against Gaines County officials Chester Browne, County Judge; Mary Baldwin, Tax Assessor-Collector; and the Commissioner's Court, they claimed that their oil properties, 100% market value, were worth less than \$200 million.





Nearly three out of four patients might be saved from this cancer with early diagnosis—and proper treatment. Safeguards: an annual "procto", especially for people over 40; knowledge of cancer's warning signals.

against administrators of the county when they mined and admitted Southland Center, Dallas, Texas 75201) on properties that they declared were worth \$193 million. No doubt, ranchers and farmers did have a great advantage at one time, but there's very little doubt in most people's minds that oil companies in general had the same advantage on properties they owned. No doubt lifting cost, labor and other items have gone up for oil companies, but the same thing has happened to farmers, ranchers and business people. It would be wonderful if the gross income from farms would much 62% of the total vestment each year. Add gasoline made in the county, carbon black, natural gas, butane, propane and sulphur sales and this pushes the percentage up still further. Ask any rancher with \$30.00 an acre ranch land, 20 cows to the section, \$200 cows, and this is an investment of \$24,000.00 per section. If every cow had a calf and if each calf brought half as much as its mother was worth it would bring in only $17\frac{1}{2}\%$ gross income. And this is what our Commissioner's Court and others were sued over.

Let's try it once more on farm land. It's irrigated; it's worth \$250.00 an acre. One fourth of a section \$40,000.00 plus irrigation equipment, tractors and other farm equipment. Oh, how happy a farmer would be to receive \$30,000.00 to \$32,000.00 a year gross income for 160 acres. I cannot blame oil companies for wanting ranch land raised in Gaines County but I think they made an Alaska size mistake when they accused Gaines County of not putting a fair re-evaluation on surface when they evidently had the great advantage of underlying wealth.

EDITORIAL

BEWARE OF TOWING VEHICLES - - - Summertime is here. Farmers are pulling farm trailers. Fertilizer is being moved to the farms in trailers. Vacationers are pulling camping trailers. Boats are being towed on trailers to the lakes. Thousands of people are moving in rental trailers. Very few have trailer towing experience.

If you are one that's going to take a trip and pull a trailer, Aetna Insurance would like to give some timely advice. You can start by having a "pro" choose the hitch you'll need and by letting him install it. This means the dealer who sells your make of car or some other well-established automotive expert who regularly handles this type of work. If you're doubtful, check with the dealer who sold you your trailer. In other words, resist the urge to save a couple of dollars by buying the least expensive hitch or installing it yourself.

Next, and failure to take this step is probably trailering's most common error, cross the safety chains under the tongue of the hitch. This forms a loop that will catch the trailer tongue before it can dig into the ground should your hitch fail. Also, leave only as much slack in the safety chains as you'll need for proper turning of the vehicles. On a recent weekend trip, an engineer found that 19 out of 20 people he saw pulling a trailer had their safety chains improperly installed.

Finally, read and believe in the instructions that come from the manufacturer of your trailer and trailer hitch. Don't pull a heavier load than your rig was built for, and don't pull it under adverse speed, weather or road conditions. If you'll just follow these few precautions, your summer travel plans should go off without a "hitch."

In passing a vehicle towing a trailer, be careful. If he's on the downhill side, he's difficult to pass sometimes. Also, be a good road neighbor. If he's developing a flat on the vehicle being towed, "thim know about it. It could save someone's life.

E.L. SHORT TO AUSTIN

State Representative E.L. Short of Tahoka was in the State Capitol for a Tuesday meeting of the House Interim Committee to study all matters pertaining to the taxation of farm, ranch and forest lands on the basis of their capability to support the raising of livestock and /or to produce farm and forest crops.

The District 73 House Member has been a farmer and rancher in lynn County for 24 years and will begin his second term in the House when the Legislature convenes in January.

During his stay in Austin, Rep. Short met with Speaker Gus F. Mutscher.

"Rep. Short joins me in my concern over the medical crisis facing Texas if recently enforced rules concerning Class 7C hospitals cause our rural hospitals to close down," Mutscher said. "We certainly appreciate Rep. Short's offer of his assistance in the work of the Texas Health Care Committee."

Mutscher said that Texas has 40 per cent of the nation's Class 7C hospitals because of the large areas in Texas with sparse population, particularly in West Texas. Hospitals who do no comply with the regulations, such as having registered nurses around the clock, are in danger of having Medicare payments terminted, which would in turn force their closure.
