Funeral services were held for Charles Panenka, 55, last Saturday morning after being found shot at his home at 612 S. W. 16th Street, last Thursday. He was pronounced dead by Justice of the Peace W.E. Cox, Jr. at 10:30 a.m., death from self inflicted gunshot wound. He was found by his step-daughter, Mrs. David Berry (Penny).

It was estimated that the shooting occurred at approximately 10:00 o'clock. The body was found in the garage near a work bench. An old 30-30 rifle that had been stored in the attic was nearby. One shot entered the heart area. Only one note was found - to feed someone's dog he was looking after. Several rolls of money were in his billfold, evidently picked up in different places and left on the kitchen cabinet.

Services were held in Singleton Funeral Home Chapel of the Chimes with Rev. James Daly, minister of St. James Catholic Church, officiating. Burial was in Gaines County Memorial Cemetery.

Panenka had worked for Mobil Pipeline Co. 20 years. Born in Palmer, Nebraska, he had been a resident of Seminole since 1966, moving from Casper, Wyoming. He was a World War II veteran.

Survivors include his wife, Margaret; two step-daughters, Mrs. David (Penny) Berry, Seminole, and Mrs. Clara Jean Jones, Anchorage, Alaska; and two sisters, Mrs. Mary Janata, Omaha, Nebraska and Mrs. Ann Thorn, Roseburg, Oregon.



Custom Feed Lot



The South Plains Feed and Seed feed lot has room for 900 head of feeder cattle with between 600 and 700 on feed at the present time. The area operation that is east and north of Seminole is owned by Jiggs and Monty Williams and managed by Kenneth Newcomb of Seagraves, who also operates the Purina store. Wayne Buzan of Seminole has currently stocked three pens. Other area businessmen and farmers have stocked other pens.

The company is announcing that molasses equipment has been added. Light cattle, weighing 400 to 500 pounds, are put in the feed lot and are carried to 800 to 900 pounds in from 100 to 145 days. Gaines County, Seminole and Seagraves are all in dire need of more feed lots so that area grain can be used to feed area cattle.

I am pleased to hand you a photo copy of a letter from Internal Revenue Service. The letter indicates, as you see, that Seminole Clinic Fund has been formally listed as a tax exempt corporation. This is the corporation which purchased the lease with option to buy on the clinic building. Persons who made contributions will probably appreciate knowledge with respect to this.


The news story should caution that Seminole Health and Humanities (the corporation making loans to a medical student planning to move to Seminole after graduation) has not yet been granted tax exempt status. I anticipate this grant will occur prior to January 1st. but have no way of knowing for certain. The I.R.S. is presently being furnished with additional requested information about it.





DEAD MANS The custom of that day was to use the saddle blanket to wrap the man up in and the horse carry the empty saddle into town.

The grave is fenced 10 feet long by $5\frac{1}{2}$ feet wide with three posts on each side, or a total of six. Each corner has a drag wire going into the ground with four double wires encircling the grave.

(Editor's note: A gravesite in a cattle pasture was near impossible to keep up, as the cattle and other animals would rub on the corners and push against the

wires to get every available bite of grass growing there. If you know the correct version and the name of the one buried, would you please share it with News readers.)

Breakfast was good, dinner was fine, but there's nothing better than a balogna sandwich when you're hungry, with a big cut of onion and a potato chip or two and Mama says, "would you care for a hot tart?" There's nothing better than food and a good visit with the Mrs. After all, she's afraid my diet's going to work better than hers and just one more hot tart's not going to hurt much.

With just a little effort I could hate some of these skinny people who can eat all they want to. Just

Letter To The Editor

Dear Daddy,

Life in Carrizo Springs is different from anything I've ever experienced. It's one of those towns you'd think should have existed 100 years ago because it's just old fashioned and I love it! Old ladies and old men rock every afternoon on their porches, retelling stories about the Carrizo bandits killing the deputy sheriff. And yes, Miss Woods also sits on the porch, rocking with the old timers and soaking up all the marvelous stories of the past. Usually a porch of the typical old timer contains at least six rockers, for all those who walk by and want to join in the big talk.

Carrizo's the type of town where you go with a grandmother and grandson for visiting purpose and end up eating beans and fried potatoes and tasting the best of anything. Then before I could leave this grand lady and her grand boy she just had to give me a jar of fig preserves, a jar of plum preserves, and a jar of bread and butter pickles. And all this time she was thinking it was her pleasure that

Another time an old timer showed me his twenty bee hives of nonfighting bees. My questions tumbled out for about thirty minutes and before I knew it, he'd knocked off the value of his twenty gallon, honey container and filled for me a quart jar full of honey. "This will do for a starter, " he said.

The plants and land were all so strange to me at first here. Palm trees with ripening dates vegetate this small community, being outnumbered only by the over loaded orange trees and tangerine trees. Here they grow egg plant, chili plants (hot peppers), onions, tomatoes, oranges, grapefruit, and lemons. Harvest time comes about November and many migrant families leave Chicago to come to the south for work in the fields. Since 75% of population is Mexican, this crop raising is the most important factor in Carrizo. In November all the classrooms increase at least five or six students.

Another old marker of the community is the school I teach in which was built in 1917 and stands firmly as a landmark for the old timers. My classroom has brown torn window shades, rickety old painted windows, birds' nests in the windows and no matching desks. But I love my room and my students because no pretense is made and no discrimination is shown. I think my room displays a colorful personality because of the creative children's works.

My 24 Latins and 2 Anglos fair fine together and the whole school system is set up this way. My room as well as the other rooms are well behaved and many children in my room want to come early and stay late to help the teacher finish her work. Most of my school kids have an average of 7 to 8 brothers and sisters. All understand the words SHARE and KINDNESS and none are lacking in love from home. Families are close to one another and many aunts, uncles and grandparents are considered to be a part of the immediate family. Some of my school boys attend early mass every morning at 6:30 a.m. and mass every evening at 7:00 p.m. Every morming the church bells peal out about 6:15 a.m. to wake those to come to

Right now the lady I'm living with is on her front porch, piecing a quilt by hand. The porch is where she makes all her Christmas gifts. She's a darling. She loaned me a quilt, bedspread and four pillows. She's a good friend and a good land lady! Most of the men of Carrizo like a "good chew" one time a day or a leisurely puff on the pipe while relaxing. "Rodeoing" is a big thing here, too. On every Friday and Saturday night the cowboys practice roping, bronc busting, and steer wrestling. Instead of paying to see a rodeo it's a community affair that everyone attends.

Since Carrizo is close to the border, it has the typical Mexican mainstuff for food - beans and peppers. I remember in Seminole we always had hamburgers on Thursday with chocolate milk. Well, in Carrizo we eat Mexican food every Wednesday very ritually.

One other strange, weird thing of Carrizo are the bats! Now, bats aren't really scarey unless you're walking up a dark stairway and two swoop two feet from your head like they did to me. I yelled for the janitor because they really spooked me. He came up with a baseball bat and killed two bats swinging as they swooped past his head Since it was still dark, the bats could move better than we could. When I walked into my room I couldn't raise my windows because a swarm of about 100 bats were outside my windows actually flying straight into the glass part of the window. When daylight came the bats left and my nerves were better.

This town being western really has some good points. The other night I visited a ranch home and after supper we sang good ole' Eddy Arnold songs for almost an hour. Now, that's living when you can hear a real cowboy yodel the "Cattle Call" while strumming on his guitar. Americans everywhere would be proud of Carrizo. The people still believe that God is number one and family is number two.

Other towns within fifteen miles of us have had marchings and general unrest in the school with pupils and teachers. Our pupils want no part in marching or minority bickering. I thank God there are still places like Carrizo left in this world. Seminole gave me so much that I thought I wouldn't ever find another town so friendly.



Information From Social Security Office

BY DOROTHY FEAZELL

EVERYONE who comes into the social security office to file a claim for social security benefits asks one common question "How long will it take to get my first check?"

This is a very proper question and we in the social security office like to be able to give the individual as accurate an answer as possible. Normally, a person can expect a check within six weeks after the claim is sent to one of the reviewing offices. Notice the emphasis on the word "Sent" because this is the key.

We are required to have certain information before we send a claim to the reviewing office and this information MUST be supplied by the person filling a claim with us. This information may be evidence of age, a tax return, a W-2 form or other documents depending upon the circumstances in each case. The sooner a person can supply us with the necessary information, the sooner he can expect a check.

I want to stress that the representatives of social security are eager to assist applicants and we can often make suggestions that will enable you to get the information quickly. The important thing to remember is that the person applying for payments can have a lot of effect on how




