My father had followed this practice for many years and the Johnson grass patches got farther and farther away from the house.

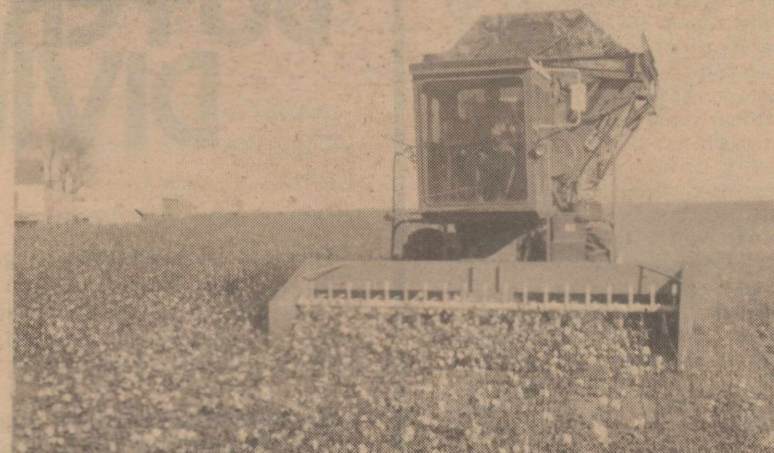
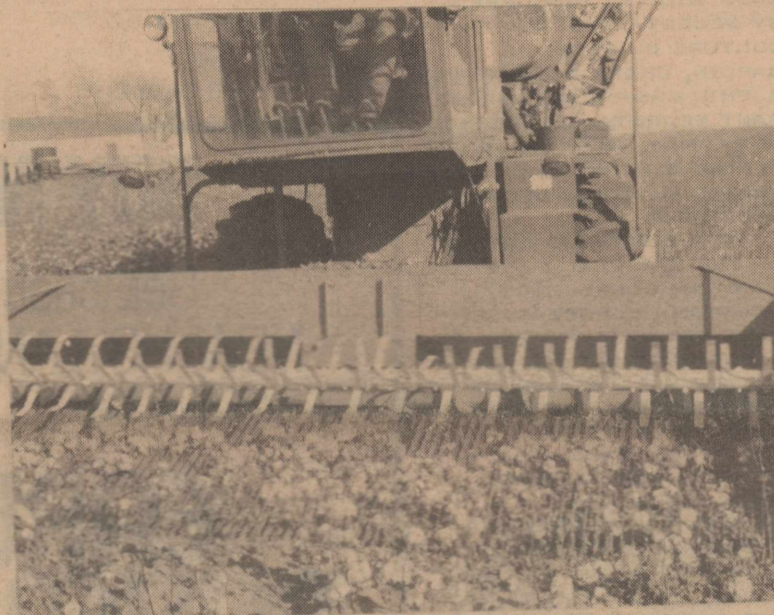

COTTON HARVEST CONTINUES

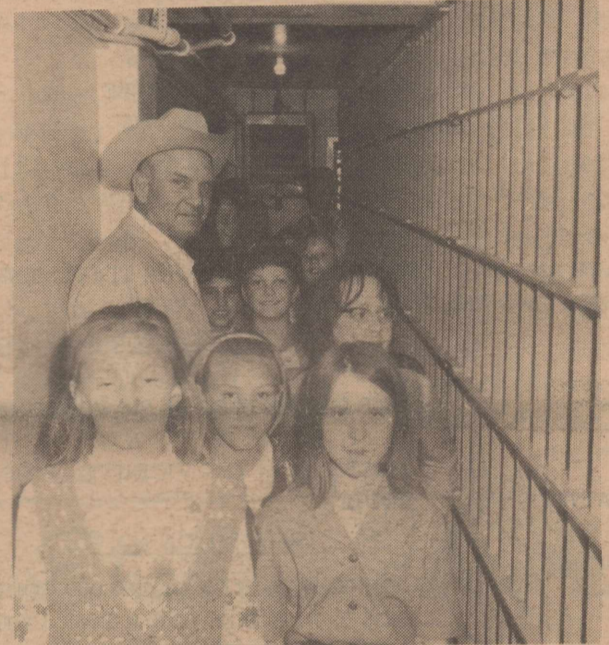

The machine also can harvest four forty inch rows at the same time. The early freeze affected the broadcast cotton and was a disappointment to its owner, making only a little over a bale per acre. This field of cotton was seen on the farm tour.

EDITORIAL

Seminole citizens would like to have a new hospital. By and far, Seminole citizens want a new 50 bed hospital. In this season of the year Santa is kinda hard to turn down. On the other hand, Seagraves wants a new hospital and they also believe in Santa Claus. It has been pointed out in this newspaper the advantage of a larger hospital of 50 beds in obtaining additional doctors and maintaining additional nurses and the other advantages it would have in services to the people in this area. On the other hand, Seagraves does not want to lose medical facilities. The election has been called for December 19 with two propositions. Proposition #1 - one 50 bed hospital in Seminole, the other - a 35 bed hospital in Seminole and a 20 bed hospital in Seagraves. This editorial is being run to encourage people to vote for Proposition #1 or Proposition #2, so that Gaines County will have medical facilities matching the economy of their schools, their wealth and their station. It is hoped that attitudes will not be such as "If I can't have my way, I don't want Gaines County to have anything."

A LIVESTOCK PRODUCER IS A MAN WHO MORTGAGES ANIMALS THAT ARE BRED AND RAISED IN THE STATE OF TEXAS TO KEEP THE PRODUCER BROKE AND THE BUYER CRAZY.

LIVESTOCK ARE BORN IN THE SPRING, MORTGAGED IN THE SUMMER, PASTURED IN THE FALL, AND GIVEN AWAY IN THE WINTER. THEY VARY IN SIZE, COLOR AND WEIGHT. THE MAN WHO CAN GUESS NEAREST TO THE WEIGHT AND MARKET GRADE IS CALLED A LIVESTOCK BUYER BY THE PUBLIC, A ROBBER BY THE RANCHER, AND A POOR BUSINESS MAN BY HIS BANKER.

THE PRICE OF LIVESTOCK IS DETERMINED IN CHICAGO AND GOES UP AFTER YOU HAVE SOLD AND DOWN AFTER YOU HAVE BOUGHT. WHEN YOU HAVE LIGHT CATTLE, THE BUYER WANTS HEAVY ONES; WHEN YOU FEED HEIFERS, YOU FIND THEY WANT STEERS, AND VICE VERSA. WHEN STEERS ARE THIN, THEY SHOULD BE FAT, AND WHEN THEY ARE FAT, THE BUYER TELLS YOU THE MARKET IS SHOT ALL TO HELL ON TALLOW.

DANKLEFS, CHAIRMAN, CHARLES L. CALHOUN, FRANK H. HINKSON, JOHN B. RUDD AND JOSE M. VILLARREAL, MEMBERS. ALSO ATTENDING WILL BE D.W. MCELWRATH, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE STATE ASCS OFFICE, W. M. HOTT, TIM MOORE, HAROLD J. BAKER, ROBERT R. LORENZ, KERMIT J. DECKER AND DONALD B. WATSON, PROGRAM SPECIALISTS, STATE OFFICE STAFF MEMBERS OF ASCS, WILL ALSO ATTEND.

HIGH-RANKING GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS WILL ADDRESS THE CONFERENCE ON A VARIETY OF CURRENT TOPICS, WITH INTEREST EXPECTED TO CENTER ON NEW FARM LEGISLATION WHICH NOW AWAITS THE SIGNATURE OF PRESIDENT NIXON.

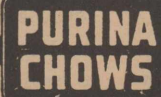

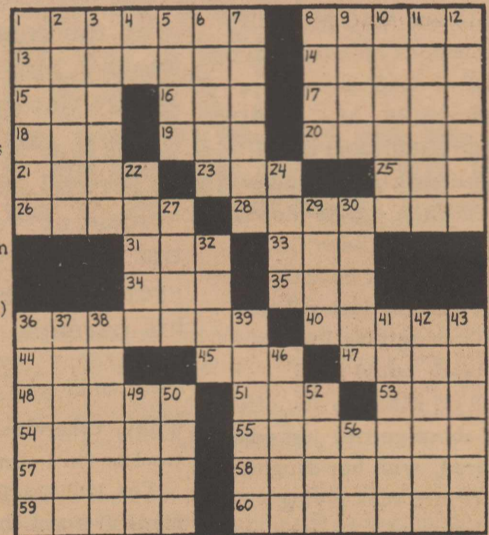
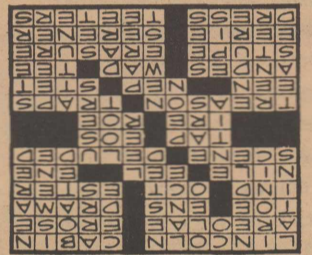

"Shall the Commissioners Court of Gaines County, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said County, in one or more series or issues, in the aggregate principal amount of \$2,195,000, with the bonds of each such series or issue, respectively, to mature serially within not to exceed forty years from their date, and to be sold at such prices and bear interest at such rates as shall be determined within the discretion of the Commissioners Court, for the purpose of providing funds for establishing a new County Hospital to consist of two units under a single Board of Managers, with one unit to be located in the vicinity of the City of Seminole, Gaines County, Texas, and the other unit to be located in the vicinity of the City of Seagraves, Gaines County, Texas, by erecting the necessary buildings, equipping said new County Hospital, and making all other necessary permanent improvements in connection therewith; and shall said Commissioners Court be authorized to levy and cause to be assessed and collected annual ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in said County, in an amount sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund to pay said bonds at maturity."

Information From Social Security Office

Q. I was born in Mexico but I don't have a birth or baptismal certificate. Will an Immigration record be sufficient proof of my age for social security purposes?

A. No, it will not. If there is a birth or baptismal record established before you were age 5, you must obtain a copy. Since these records are usually available in Mexico, you will need a certificate or a letter stating that no record exists. You can save weeks of delay when you retire by writing now to the "Oficial del Registro Civil" of the city or town where you were born. Persons born in the United States are also urged to obtain a copy of their birth or baptismal record (if recorded before the age of 5). This should be done several months before applying for monthly benefits to avoid a delay or possible loss of benefits.

Q. I received a check for reimbursement of medical expenses on my husband's Medicare account after his death. What should I do with the check?

A. It should be returned so that the check can be reissued in your name. Get in touch with the social security office to obtain a special form to be returned with the check.

Q. I will be 65 next July and want to receive my social security. I plan to turn my business over to my wife and then work for a small wage. Will I be eligible?

A. Don't count on it. The arrangement you describe sounds very questionable. Regardless of who is listed as the owner or operator, we will have to consider the economic value of your services to the business in order to determine if you are retired within the meanings of the social security law.

Q. I became entitled to Medicare in February of last year, and my retirement benefit rate was figured at that time, although I did not retire. My earnings for 1969 were high enough to raise my benefit rate. Do I need to make a report to social security to get my benefits raised?

A. No, your benefit will be automatically refigured by a computer operation after the additional earnings are credited to your account.

Q. I have a daughter who is mentally retarded. She is receiving social security based on my earnings before I retired, but she is almost 18. Will her benefits stop when she reaches that age?

A. Not if you file a claim to continue her benefits. They may continue for the rest of her life unless she should become able to work. If she is within six months of age 18, get in touch with your social security representative to present evidence of her disability. At that time, you will need to furnish the names and addresses of doctors and hospitals who have treated her.

THE SEMINOLE AREA CHAMBER OF COMMERCE HAS ENDORSED PROPOSITION NUMBER ONE IN THE SCHEDULED BOND ELECTION ON DECEMBER 19TH

These are some of the reasons why we endorse Proposition Number One.

1. The Gaines County Hospital Survey recommended that one 50 bed hospital be built in Gaines County and located in Seminole.
2. A 50 bed hospital would be large enough to attract and provide adequate facilities for doctors and nurses.
3. A 50 bed hospital would provide better patient care for our county.
4. Federal and State requirements for hospitals are increasing steadily.
5. An adequate 50 bed hospital would provide better patient care for the increasing number of Medicare patients.
6. We need to be able to provide continuing and better patient care for our citizens who are 65 and older.
7. There is a high mortality rate for small hospitals.
8. There is a growing trend toward area wide consolidation of hospitals.
9. No hospital in our area that has under 50 beds is approved by the Joint Commission on accreditation of hospitals.
10. To be able to bring State and Federal funds back to Seminole.
11. Reduce unnecessary loss of time and money spent in other counties because of the lack of doctors and services here.
12. If we have large enough facilities we can accomodate three or more doctors.
13. Industry and people will not locate in a town that does not have adequate medical facilities.

The following is a reproduction of the recommendation made to the Commissioners Court by the consulting firm of O'Connell and Probst who made an impartial and unbiased survey of the medical needs of Gaines County.

GAINES COUNTY HOSPITAL SURVEY

21 May 1970

Revised

27 July 1970

Recommendations

1. One Facility

We recommend to the Court that a single adequate hospital facility for serving the medical requirements of citizens of Gaines County be established. It is a well known fact that the supply of health career personnel is very limited. Combining the two small units into a single unit would allow the same number of personnel to care for a greater number of patients. Conversely, a smaller number of staff could care for the same number of patients presently being hospitalized. A single facility would eliminate a duplication of building, equipment, and supplies. It would provide a more efficient use of space. And finally, it should provide better patient care to the public by attracting the young and new health career professionals.

2. Location

We recommend that a new facility be constructed in Seminole and located on the highway leading to Seagraves. Seminole is near the geographic center of the county. The majority of the population is in Seminole and thence to the north and east. This we believe would be the most convenient location for the majority of the people of Gaines County. We have considered the suggestion of a location near the county park approximately half-way between Seagraves and Seminole and cannot find justification for locating the facility in an isolated area. If the remodeling and expansion program is considered by the Court to be the best solution to the problem, then the site should be Memorial Hospital in Seminole with the acquisition of additional land.

THE SEMINOLE INDIANS LOST TO THE LEVELLAND LOBOES LAST SATURDAY IN LEVELLAND, 56-51.


