

CHRISTMAS TIME BRACEBO

CHRISTMAS TIME, BRACERO STYLE --- Some of the finest men I've ever known were Mexican Nationals that came over on a Bracero program of a few years gone by. There was a school teacher I knew and another man that owned his own farm.

It was almost Christmas time. The weather was bad and about nine or ten Braceros had congregated and asked me to take them for the canajos (simply a rabbit hunt). They drew a diagram on the ground to help with their English and my Spanish and we each armed ourselves with two or three sticks approximately 2 feet long. (A piece of a hoe handle or a shovel handle is ideal.) I became more interested and agreed to take them.

You threw the stick like a boomerang, breaking the legs of the rabbit when it went under him. This was no idle hunt, this was to .lay up a food supply for the holiday season. Cotton tails or young jack rabbits were the specialty. After you located the rabbit, one or two men would ease around to flush him away from the brush and crowd him into the circle of men. To get away, the rabbit had to run between two of you. As he ran past you, you threw the stick side-arm, propelling its weight into the rabbit or under the rab-

I've been on many hunts but this got more and more exciting. Why, upon a successful kill, they rejoiced in Spanish and I rejoiced in English. The yells sounded international. These men went out for groceries, also to have a good time.

The first hunt we got eleven rabbits and as many as eighteen on later hunts. The rabbits were skinned, cleaned and dropped into a big container of salty water. It was really funnier to catch a young jack rabbit in the circle. He would dodge, he would play. He would dance back and forth, he would try to hide, only to be looking at another man and the two men that missed and let one get away were talked about in terms that probably couldn't be repeated.

'Big Ricardo' and 'Little Deanicio' were clean with their cooking and food handling and they were the ones who boiled the rabbits. They stripped the meat off, added a can of vegetable soup, added some pepper and salt, (not too much) and with a tortilla to push with and one to load with, it made good eating.

I've eaten pheasant, juicy turkeys, T-bone steaks and many other delicacies but there's nothing better than a rabbit when it's fixed right.

If some of these young folks don't brush up on their manners, maybe their folks ought to move the brush further down.

HE ADDED THAT IT IS MORE DIFFICULT TO REACH A SERVICEMAN IN SAIGON UNLESS THE CALLER KNOWS THE SERVICEMAN'S UNIT, APO AND TELEPHONE NUMBER WHERE HE CAN BE REACHED.

"ALTHOUGH SERVICEMEN PLACE CALLS FROM VIETNAM ON A FIRST-COME-FIRST-SERVED BASIS, IT USUALLY ONLY TAKES A FEW MINUTES TO REACH THE STATES ONCE HE GETS ACCESS TO A PHONE AT ONE OF THE VIETNAM TELEPHONE CENTERS," SAWYER SAID.

HE ALSO REMINDED RESIDENTS OF THE 14-HOUR TIME DIFFERENCE BETWEEN THE U.S. AND SAIGON. FOR EXAMPLE, WHEN IT IS 9 P.M. CHRISTMAS EVE IN TEXAS, IT IS II A.M. CHRISTMAS DAY IN SAIGON.






