



I lost my bed. My little brother just jumped off as it went in the water and said "If you're gonna do a fool thing like that, I'm not gonna be caught with you."

Now, don't get too excited, it was my wagon bed I lost. I've lost two in my lifetime, one to fire and one to water. I'll save the fire story till later.

One of the things that a wagon needs is to have the wheels soaked so it'll tighten up the rim and I decided I'd pull out to the big surface tank. The wagon was empty and Leonard and I were gonna haul a load of wood. I pulled out in a foot of water and he said, "This is far enough." I said, "It's not either," and I pulled out into two feet of water and that's when he quit me.

It got a little funnier to me and I went out into three feet of water. Now, I've got news for you that I didn't know then - a wagon bed'll float and it started floating right off of the running gear, but I was too smart to let that happen. I reached out and grabbed ol' Nig by the tail as I headed 'em back to shallow water. He didn't seem to mind and I thought that I had everything worked out just fine.

Ol' Nig was a black horse on the left and a finer horse never had a line pulled across him. That was ol' Bob on the right. He was a bay, weighed about 1200 to 1300 pounds, was mean, and he had plans for me that day.

The wagon bed had just settled back down on the running gear when ol' Bob decided that he'd gone far enough and he'd had about enough of my foolishness. He not only balked, he lay down. I can still hear my little brother laugh as he started toward the house, laughing at my predicament. There I was in 2½ or 3 feet of water with a balking horse.

I got so mad at him, lying there with that fine harness on with the brass knobs on it. If I I'd had my gun I'd have left him lying there, dead. What does a fourteen year old boy do when he's mad and being laughed at with a balky horse? Well, I was a good half mile away from the house and you wouldn't care to hear all I said to him. I jumped out into the water. I got me a hand full of mud and I filled the ear closest to me full of mud.

He didn't do a thing. I filled his left ear full of water and he didn't do a thing. I filled it full of mud, packed it in with a stick. Did you ever have a horse flop his head back and forth with his ears full of mud? He put a large portion of that right back in my face.

If you think I was mad to begin with, I got double mad. I jumped up on his head and I wrestled it under the water.

I'll never forget how he came up from there. He slung me for about ten feet, jumped to his feet, made a lunge or two and blowed water nine feet out of his nose. SEE PAGE TWO

100 YEARS OF GINNING



This picture was made in 1900, thirty years after the Locker's first gin was built. On the lower left was Arch Locker, standing next to the steam engine, and the blow-off can be seen. John L. Locker is seen next to the scales on the upper level. - Buchannon was the press man on the right. Jim Stoner is under the suction. Josh Cowan, a farmer, is in the foreground and the 8 year old young man sitting on the bale of cotton is W. G. Locker, father of Olan. The man with the beard on the right is a Mr. Plann. Notice the paintings on the end of the bale. Bale #218 with the initials CJF belonged to area farmer C. J. Foster. "We had a good year in 1900 - 961 bales ginned; 1906 - 1361 bales, 1908 - 1761 bales. We ginned from August till March." In describing the amount that cotton brought, Olan said, "In 1950 I saw it bring 47¢ per pound and in 1933, 6¢ per pound." The writing on the end of the gin is an advertisement which says "Coggins & Rogrs Will Under-sell Them All This Year." On the other side - C&R - Best Bargains, a firm in Brownwood, Texas. Bales of cotton weighed approximately 500 pounds then as they do today.

NEWS HIGHLIGHTS OF 1970

The New Year kicked off 1970 announcing the Chamber of Commerce banquet with Frank Pollard and Kenneth Wyatt on January 1. Billy Earl (Wig) Davis was hurt seriously in an automobile accident. On January 20 Seminole beat Andrews in basketball 24 BIG points, 77-53. Local police solved 20 thefts by the arrest of a mother and father, parents of nine children. The 4-H livestock animals brought \$18,300.00 on January 28.

JIMMY SNEED DIES FROM MOTORCYCLE ACCIDENT

The new field house was opened for inspection on February 8 with Open House. On February 17 Jimmy Sneed had a motorcycle which proved to be fatal. The first public meeting concerning hospital facilities was held February 20 with 126 present. The county's re-evaluation was discussed by Maburn L. Harris, president of Southwestern Appraisal Co., Inc., at the Noonday Lions Club.

EASTER BUNNY BRINGS SNOW

Carroll Haralson formed a partnership with Ross Moore on March 1. On March 6 Seminole received up to four inches of rain. Karla Davis was declared the Gaines County spelling bee winner March 18. Easter brought a snow of 1, 2 inches in March.

April 8 C.O. Wright, mayor; along with Bill Webb and J.B. Walden, all incumbents, were returned to city offices. On April 6 the Lions Club put on their play "Desperate Ambrose". Cindy Bramlett and Joneen Cummings won the finals in tennis in April and moved on to the state tournament and won there.

There was the peach queen pageant in May and Linda Aryain was crowned queen. Brenda Van Winkle won four events in track in Sea-graves and went on to place well in the state tournament in Abilene May 13, winning first in broad jump and third in triple jump. Seminole High School announced their largest graduating class on May 20 of 107. Iva Dumas was sworn in as the new county clerk May 27.

GAINES COUNTY DECLARED ELIGIBLE FHA LOANS

The following telegrams were received by the Seminole News. The Seminole News Seminole, Texas

Pleased to advise secretary of agriculture has today designated Gaines County as an area where Farmers Home Administration may make emergency loans to eligible farmers and ranchers, because of adverse weather which caused considerable damage to cotton and milo crops. Emergency loans are made to finance crop production and for other expenses involved in continuing operations.

Farmers in Gaines County who had crop damage will be eligible for FHA credit on emergency terms if they can secure no other source of credit to restore farm operations. Loans are repayable abilities. Loans are made through the loan offices of the FHA serving Gaines County.

The Locker and Sons Gins have successfully completed their centennial year, or 100 years in the gin business. Kenneth and Lan Locker's great-great-grandfather built the family's first gin in Bosque, County in 1870. The farmer took cotton out of his wagon in a basket, handed it to the ginner and the ginner ginned it. In 1898 it was dumped into a pit and elevated by a belt to a gin stand. In the year 1900 suction stands were installed. Original power was steam. In 1942 this changed to diesel, in 1949 to electricity.

James Monroe Locker had the town of Locker, Texas named after him when he built a gin there. The gin was followed by a post office and other business establishments. The first gin was powered by a 25 horse power wood burning steam engine, compared to approximately 350 HP needed by today's gin plant. The Lockers moved a gin from Clifton, Texas to San Saba in 1898 by yokes of oxen. Olan Locker's grandfather, John L. Locker, sold the gin to his father, W. G. Locker, in 1913. SEE PAGE TWO

Nig kept pulling, Bob kept trying to get up and I was trying to ride that wagon bed. I looked back and the back end must have been seven feet in the air. Finally, it fell back to the ground as Bob plopped back down to the earth as the rear went over him.

I stopped, chained the tongue on back of the wagon and started to the house. I hastened to get there before my little brother could tell on me, but not in time. My mother was out at the barn, the wagon was setting there, I'd put the tongue back in it, and she said, "Look at that horse coming" and she was serious, she hadn't seen my little brother. How can you explain to a dear mother about a muddy horse, about a wet horse, about a skinned up horse coming dragging in with his harness on? He was marked up real good where the wagon wheel went over him, also skinned places where he'd tried to get up. You can't.

Oh, the day I lost my bed. Ol' Bob met an untimely death and up until right now, I've always been glad. I was always taught to have patience, but there's no patience to be had with a balky horse or a balky mule. Ask anybody that's ever had one.

He got up in a foot of water and laid down again.

Ol' Nig was a good horse and how he ever put up with me and Bob both, I'll never know. I set to thinking, unhooked both of them, hooked ol' Nig to the wagon tongue and slid it out upon dry land. (It was a stiff tongue wagon.) Ol' Bob just lay there.

I backed ol' Nig out in the water again and hooked each trace chain to a singletree on one side and a singletree on the other side. I fixed my lines on one horse and I had a plan. I'd pull that wagon right over him. I got ready and I talked to ol' Nig and I said "Let's go," and he was ready. The right hand front wheel ran over ol' Bob and I was rejoicing. Now, I've lived through rough seas, I've lived through a California earthquake and through one wreck in my life, but did you ever consider how a wagon would bounce up and down when a horse got up under it?

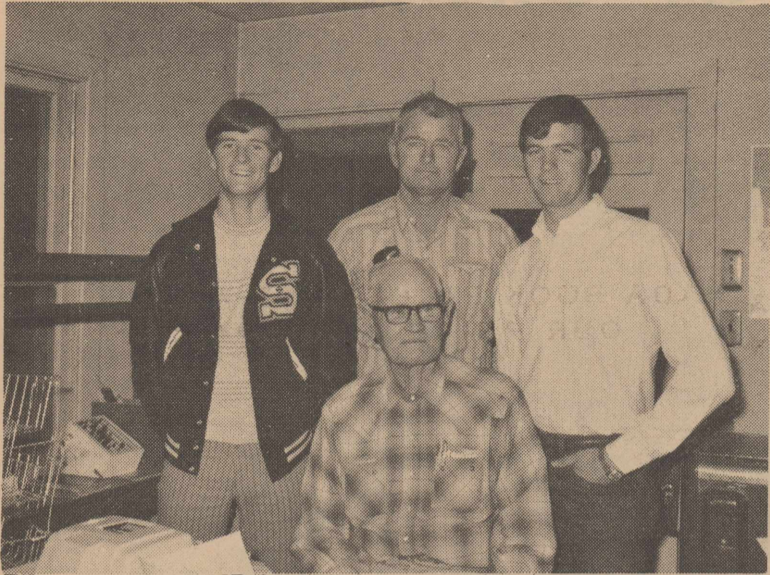
The location - Holt, Texas, 20 miles northwest of San Saba. The gin then could gin one bale per hour, compared to the fastest gin in California today of 35 to 37 bales per hour.

In 1918 W.G. Locker, the father of Olan, moved to Hall, Texas, a new farming area in San Saba County. In 1942 they moved to Richland Springs, Texas, then in 1948 moved one gin to Pecos, Texas, followed in 1949 by another gin to Pecos. In 1962 the Lockers traded for the Adams east gin, their present location in Seminole, just east of the city.

The five generations are James Monroe Locker, John L. Locker, W.G. Locker, Olan B. Locker and Kenneth and Lan Locker.

Ginning in the early days ran \$2.25 per bale, 75¢ for bagging and tying. Today's prices are 70¢ per hundred for ginning and \$7.50 for bagging, tying, insurance and dredge.

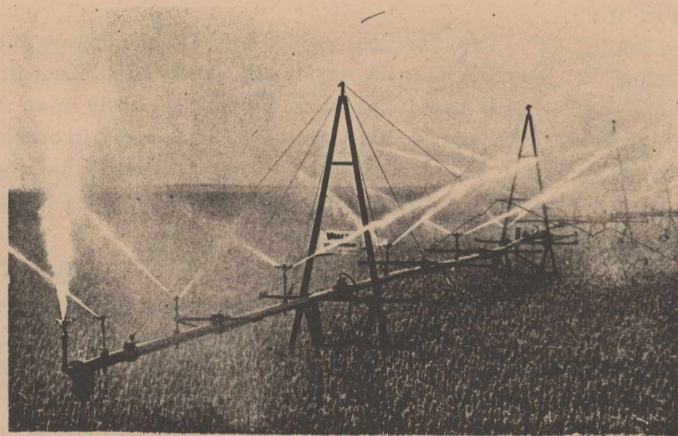

NEWS HIGHLIGHTS OF 1970 CONTINUED FROM P. 1
 BILL FAIRCLOTH NEW CHAMBER OF COMMERCE MANAGER

The J. E. Woodards celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary June 7. Beatrice Arrezola, two year old twin daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Arrezola, died June 2 when a barbecue grill fell on her. Bill Faircloth was announced as the new Chamber of Commerce manager June 10. The old settlers got together in June. Crazy Day was Friday, June 19. Joe Smith was appointed to the school board June 22 to fill the vacancy left when Dan Martin moved to Tahoka.

July was a happy time for people that were so hungry for fresh peaches. Old pictures -- M. S. Moser House Moving, A. L. Duff's home of 1920, the W. H. Brennand house, a jubilee picture of 1955, Seagraves of 1938, the Jim Hughes sheep and homestead, the old Elam Hotel at Shafter Lake, two street scenes of Seminole, the bank of yesteryear and the R. L. Turner family, another picture of 6 mules and a 2 row planter, Blake Reynolds, Forrest Lumber Co., 1939. There was the donkey ballgame July 4, Mrs. R. M. E. Hughes' birthday party July 15. Claude Chappell was hired as the new coach July 22 (a good choice). The Astros and Cardinals won July 29. Another public meeting concerning a new hospital, also new hospital estimates were announced. \$20,000.00 was pledged at the public meeting by interested citizens and the amount grew to \$22,000.00 before the year's end.

HUGHES GULF STATION ROBBED

On August 5 the Hughes Gulf Station was robbed at gun point and three oil companies declared to do battle over the re-evaluation through the district court. Judge Smith denied the three oil companies' restraining order in August. August was the month it was announced that Amerada Hess Co. employees would be moving back to Seminole. Lewis Strube died August 24.

NEW DOCTOR COMES TO SEMINOLE

It was announced September 1 that Dr. George Polivka was moving to Seminole. Tragedy struck a Seminole family when the three members, Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Thurman and their daughter, Sherry, were found dead September 8. The second highway tragedy happened September 5 when Otho H. Dryman was killed when he struck a horse south of Seminole. And Seminole whipped up on Denver City in the first football game, 13-6. Preston Shain was found dead in his cleaning establishment September 23. The third death on the highway occurred when Raul E. Vasquez was killed on a country road when his father struck a pile of caliche.

Andrews beat Seminole in October in football. Cleo Patton and Georgie Simpson caught the big 30 pound catfish at Oak Creek. The freshmen won their first ballgame of the year in October. Mr. L. G. Daugherty died October 17. Charles Panenka was found dead the last part of October, shot to death in his garage.

OIL COMPANIES CONTINUE SUIT

The three oil companies, Atlantic Richfield, Amerada and Mobil, continued their oil suit in a notice to the District Clerk, Mrs. Claudia Jordan, in early November. November would not have been complete without the rejoicing of the Seminole High School band having won a first division for the first time in eight years - Sammie Robertson director. On November 4 it was announced that Chester Browne was the newly elected county judge with 1956 votes, Claudia Jordan, district clerk, 1975 votes; Iva Duma county clerk, 1965 votes; Pauline Ansell, county treasurer, 1970 votes; Prec. #2 Robert Matthews, 747 votes; Prec. #4 A. C. Stanley, 125 votes; Justice of the Peace, Prec. #2, W. E. Cox, 1140 votes. What probably proved to be the most important story of the year to all Gaines Countians was when the 50 bed hospital was defeated by a vote of 1056 for and 825 against.

Jewell Griffin was killed Sunday, December 20, in a car wreck. Reese Upham remains in critical condition from the same accident.

REESE UPHAM STILL CRITICAL

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1971 COTTON PROGRAM

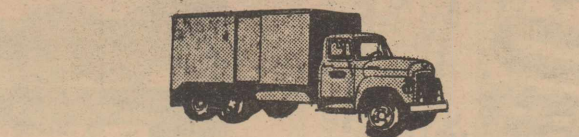
A national average 1971 crop price support loan of 19.50 cents per pound, net weight basis, and other features of the new Agricultural Act of 1970 Program for upland cotton were announced today by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Price support loans available to program cooperators for different individual qualities will be based on the middling 1 inch rate.

A preliminary set-aside program payment rate to cooperators has been established by the 1970 Act of 15.00 cents per pound. The final set aside program payment, together with the national average market price for middling 1 inch cotton, micronaire 3.5 through 4.9 in the designated spot markets during the August-December 1971 period must equal the higher of 35.00 cents or 65 percent of parity as of the beginning of the marketing year, August 1, 1971. The payment will not be reduced if the rate as finally determined is less than the rate of the preliminary payment. The payment is made on a quantity of upland cotton determined by multiplying the acreage planted within the farm base acreage allotment by the payment yield established for the farm. The farm payment yield is based on the actual yield per harvested acre for the immediately 3 preceding years, adjusted for abnormalities caused by drought, flood or other natural disaster. There are, however, two exceptions: (1) the 1970 farm projected yield must be substituted for farm actual yields for 1968 and 1969, and (2) the farm payment yield for 1971 cannot be less than the 1970 farm projected yield if the total production for the farm in 1970 was at least equal to the 1970 farm projected yield multiplied by the 1970 farm domestic allotment.

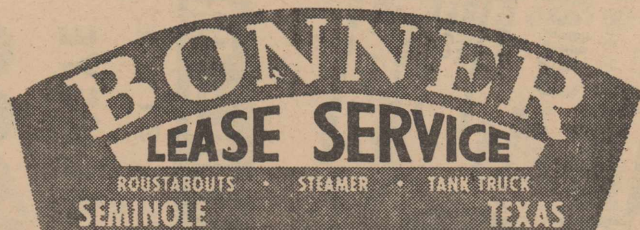
The Agricultural Act of 1970 limits cotton payments to any person to \$55,000. This limitation does not apply to loans.

Loans on 1971 crop upland cotton will be available to program cooperators for a term of 10 months from the first day of the month in which the loan is made upon presentation of warehouse receipts reflecting accrued storage charges of not more than 60 days. This will allow producers an extended period during which the loan program may be utilized to promote orderly marketing and price stabilization. In prior years, the loan maturity date was July 31, following the year in which the cotton was produced.

Release and reapportionment and sale of allotments are continued under the new program. The December 31 deadline for filing applications for sale and lease of allotments is eliminated so producers will have ample time to complete these transactions.
