Police have a great advantage on stolen cars. Within a few minutes they generally can find out the kind of car you drive, its make, model and license number. They're listed on public records.

The same women were asked "What kind of TV do you have?" Six of them knew. "Do you know the serial number?" Two out of ten said they could locate it. Next question, "What would you do if you went home and your color TV had been stolen?" "Call the police."

Have you ever thought what a great disadvantage it would be to try to find your TV when you were not sure of the color, the size, the model or the serial number?" Four houses have been broken into recently in this vicinity and police are being hindered in recoveries because of lack of identification. It seems that breaking and entering and the theft of TVs, radios, guns, vacuum cleaners, hair dryers and other small appliances will get worse before it gets better. Sheriff Ed Welch advised the News that if you would like to help, make a list in duplicate with one list in a safe place. List TVs, the size, model and serial number, also radios, guns, vacuum cleaners, hair dryers, toasters, all small appliances, along with refrigerators, sewing machines and stoves. You will not only be helping yourself, you'll be helping to keep the rates down, you'll be helping in case of a break in to catch the guilty party and you'll be helping to make the law enforcement men's job much easier. Please make two copies, putting them in separate places.

(Editor's note - Don't dare talk about what a poor job might be done by the police department unless you think enough of your own household goods to list them.)





# 1971 CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM ANNOUNCED BY SOUTHWESTERN PUBLIC SERVICE

A 14% addition to the area's electric generating capability in mid-1971 and plans for still another major power production unit in 1974 highlight a nearly 20-million dollar construction program for 1971, announce today by Roy Tolk, president of Southwestern Public Service Company.

The addition to electric generating capability in mid-year will come about when the first unit goes into service at Jones Station, located southeast of Lubbock. The 256,000 kilowatt generator will be the largest single unit on the company's system and will put the company's total power-producing capability at nearly 2,000,000 kilowatts. That's more than twice what it was 10 years ago.

Tolk also revealed plans for the second 256, 000 kilowatt machine at the new facility. A twin of the one which will go into 1971 service, the new unit has been ordered from Westinghouse Corporation. Ground will be broken for the second unit in 1972.

"We don't propose to get into any bind insofar as adequate power supply to serve our customers in concerned. It takes longer to get electric generating equipment these days, so we've put our order in to adequately meet our requirements. We are noting an increase in number of customers throughout our service area, an indication that we are returning to a growth pattern, and we want to have the electric power supply that will stimulate that growth, "Tolk said in making the plant expansion announcement.

Jones Station is named for Clifford B. Jones, president-emeritus of Texas Tech University, and a director of Southwestern Public Service Company since 1945.

When the two units are in service, Jones Station alone could serve a city three times as large as Lubbock or Amarillo and it is just one of eleven generating facilities on Southwestern's interconnected system.

There has been no power shortage problem in Southwestern's service area. In 1970, for example, when some sections of the area were plagued with brownouts and voltage reductions, Southwestern's customers were able to continue to use electric power without restriction and the company passed through its summer peak period with reserves that exceed the peak demand by more than 20%. The 1971 Jones Station addition is designed to provide adequate power reserves during the three year period until the 1974 unit is completed.

1971 will be Southwestern Public Service Company"s Golden Anniversary Year. The company was incorporated at Roswell, New Mexico in 1921 as the Roswell Public Service Company. Its service area now covers 45,000 square miles in parts of four states and it serves 225,000 customers. It has an investment in plant and equipment that is now approaching 500-million dollars and it has been adding to that investment at an annual average rate of 20-million dollars for the last ten years.






TOMMY SHULER AGINST ANDREWS LAST SATURDAY.






New directors are John Shepherd, Charles Squires, Carl Ford, Robert Jones and Joe Smith.
