

EDITORIAL

Let's look at the picture of the changing scene down on the farm. The light in which you look at it is what makes it either good or bad. When you review some of the government programs it's according to which side you're on as to how good or how bad it looks. As an example, Griffin, Inc., Box 7, Fresno County, Huron, California received a government payment in 1968 of \$2, 772, 187 as an ASCA payment and Great Plains Program payment. J. G. Boswell Co., Box 877, Corcoran, California received \$3, 010, 042. And you say that's good for them and bad for the tax payer. In Gaines County, Texas the top farm in the county received \$74,000 in government support payments with a total being paid out in 1968 of \$5,970,132 paid to 405 farmers. This only counts the ones that draw over \$5,000. But, I'd like to point out right here that Gaines County has very few allotments and the counties that draw the most money are the ones that have larger allotments. Dawson County received \$6, 959, 856, Terry County \$8, 629, 978, and Gaines County is twice as big.

Why aren't all farmers rich? It's quite a different story if you're looking at it from a standpoint of individual farmers trying to make a living off the land. The government has a new law that says no farmer can draw over \$55,000 price support, trying to slow down huge land barrons. One time a young man could start farming with a team of horses, a breaking plow, a walking planter and with a garden, a few chickens and a cow, could support a family. It's a different story today. A half section of land can easily cost from \$80,000 to \$100,000, farming equipment can easily cost \$25,000, irrigation \$35,000 and with interest running 8% to 10% the last year or two made it nearly impossible for a man to live on the farm, make payments on a farm and pay off his loan at the end of the year. right, pull off your clothes."

If you're thinking about farming from a standpoint of production, a near miracle has happened. As far back as 1930 it took one farm family in eleven to produce enough fiber and food to feed the eleven families. Today one farm family can supply 43 American households. In 1940 there were approximately 30, 000, 000 people on the farm. Today the figure has shrunk to less than 10, 000, 000. A man in years gone by could farm thirty, fifty or maybe eighty acres. A 12 row tractor in West Gaines County can plant out a half section a day on a good run. A 12 row planter and tractor could jump up to \$12,000 or \$14,000 in cost today. A team and a complete farming outfit in years gone by - \$60 to \$100 worth.

Some farms have become multi-million dollar operations. Why? The only way they can make it is big, big equipment and big, big government checks. What's going to happen when all the small farmers go out of business? Farming will be done by huge co-ops, cooperations and other multi-business office based operations. The farmer will no longer be at the mercy of having to sell his produce and products. He'll be big enough to stock pile and make his demands for so much profit on so much production and rightfully so.

More farmers have made their money on appreciable value of land than by farming. So many of your parents that owned farms made a simple living by farming but then after 25, 30 or 40 years of ownership have a sizable life savings, not with what the land cost but its market value at that time. We still have a lot of small farmers that are hanging on, mostly self-operated family units. If you're a farmer, it's been most difficult for you to live on the farm and pay your debts. If you're the middle man, you've done well in packaging and putting the food on the groceryman's shelves. If you're a consumer, you buy your food stuffs cheaper for what you make than any other people on the face of the earth. 
- 2 quarts cider

Letter to the Editor

Mr. Walter L. Woods, Editor Seminole News

On September 15, notification of publication was received by my office. The next day the Bill for the hospital district was given to the Legislative Council for drafting. I checked with them this date and they have assured me it was finalized and had not gone to printing. The Bill will be completed in plenty of time to be presented to the Legislature. The whole process could take as long as 6 weeks. The Bill is not without controversy and is contested. There will be no way to avoid a head-on collision with two hospital district Bills in the same county having over-lapping boundaries with one Bill going from the House to Senate and one Bill going from Senate to House.

Senator Blanchard and I have met with Seagraves and Seminole citizens here in Austin several times. The first visit was by Mr. Anderson and others who presented us with resolutions, a map and proposed copy of the Bill. It was decided the Hospital District Bill would start in the Senate. This was before publication was completed and before the Seminole Hospital Bill was contested. Under the automatic sub-committee rule of both Houses it would take e to four weeks for a tee review alone. So, now the contested Bill will wait for its counterpart, the Seagraves Hospital proposal and they will both be heard by a Senate Committee after due notice and ample time has been given to both sides to express their viewpoints on their respective Bills. The next step will be presentation of the Bills by Senator Blanchard and referral to committees by the Lieutenant Governor. I will be in touch with your newspapers, the Chamber of Commerce and other officials as to all future developments.







PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 5)

Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-a, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 51-a The Legisla-uthority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to co-operate with the Government of the United States in pro-

"Section 51-a. The Legisla-ture shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, sub-ject to limitations herein con-tained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regula-tions as may by the Legisla-ture be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for re-habilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amend-ed, providing matching funds to help such families and indi-viduals attain or retain capa-bility for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for re-habilitation and other services to or on behalf of: "(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundthey may hereafter be amend-

have resided within the bound-aries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years;

"(2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;

"(3) Needy blind persons; "(4) Needy dependent chil-dren and the caretakers of such children.

"The Legislature may pre-scribe such other eligibility requirements for participation then and in that event the such children."

Legislature is specifically au-thorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal match-ing money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons.

"Nothing in this section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Con-stitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employ-ment of objective or subjeclegislation which will enable the State of Texas to co-operate with the Government of the United States in pro-viding assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing re-habilitation and any other services included in the fed-eral laws making matching shall also include the employ-ment of objective or subjec-tive means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or showred conany defect or abnormal con-dition of vision. Nothing here-in shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this State." for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of State funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matched out of fed

Sec. 2. The foregoing con-stitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which elec-tion the ballots shall be shall not exceed Fifty-Five Million Dollars (\$55,000,000) during any fiscal year. 

Information From Social Security Office BY DOROTHY FEAZELL

A frequent question put to local social security representatives is "Why can't I receive checks for the first six months after I become disabled."

This is usually asked because workers qualifying for disability benefits can receive checks no earlier than the seventh full month after the disability began, and no back payment is made for the first six months.

There are two basic reasons behind the six-months "waitingperiod", as it is called. To. meet the definition of the term "disability" under the social security law a condition must have lasted or be expected to last at least 12 months. The six months waiting period helps


BAND STUDENTS ATTEND REGION XVI U.I.L.

to establish that the condition is, in fact, going to prevent the individual from working for a year or more and is not just a temporary impairment.

The cost of paying benefits during the first six months period, or to temporarily or partially disabled persons, would have to be met by a substantial increase in the social security tax rate. Although many workers might benefit from such additional disability benefits, the extra taxes they would have to pay in order to have the protection available has not to date seemed justified.

If you have any questions pertaining to social security be sure and drop by the courthouse in Seminole to see me when I'm there on one of my regular trips. Will be happy to talk with you!


