SENATE BILL 443 GOES TO SUB— COMMITTEE

John Shepherd called in the following report from Austin.

A joint hearing of Senate Bill #443 - Seminole Hospital District, and Senate Bill #444-Seagraves Hospital District, was held in Austin tonight. Senator H.J. "Doc" Blanchard gave the introductory remarks. He told the committee he wanted them to hear the bills and he would accept their decision. Blanchard said he felt he could not recommend one over the other but there definitely is a need for medical facilities in Gaines County. Senator Ralph Hall, Rockwall, chairman, presided over most of the hearing.

The re were eleven witnesses from Seminole that testified and eight others that registered their attendance for Senate Bill #443. Neither Seminole nor Seagrave. spoke in direct opposition to the other's bill. Three witnesses were present from Seagraves - Harry Cayce, Sonny Willingham and Travis Bagley. Mr. Willingham made the presentation for the Seagraves group.

I was up in the Lubbock area some time ago and saw a new windmill. I wouldn't have been a bit surprised to have seen a wind charger running nearby. Windmills were a way of life not many years ago, not only on the ranches, but in small towns. I've always liked that story about Johnny Heath. He used to be the windmill greaser and he was paid as much as a dime to grease the windmill on the square. Have you ever heard a dry windmill run? Now, there's nothing that will get on your nerves much worse than a windmill going wh--rr-rr, wh-r--rr, wh-rr, and it makes that noise every little while. Now, if the wind's high it's really not too much of a problem, but if the mill's pumping on little gusts of wind and makes that wh--rr, r, wh-rr, wh-r--rr-r, it'll nearly drive you crazy.

They said when Johnny greased the windmills that he put only enough grease to last 24 to 36 hours. There was an eye for business - the job never played out.

Water, Inc. elected officers for Gaines County last Thursday at the Seminole Bank Building. Marion Bowers was elected president, Delbert Warren vice president and Bob Whippo secretary-treasurer. If the county can get as many as 100 members it will entitle them to a director in the organization. Tom Williams and Duncan Ellison from the Water, Inc. office in Lubbock were present.

Water, Inc. is a unique organization, a membership supported non-profit entity concerning itself with finding solutions to the long-range water supply problems. Water, Inc. is concerned with the future water needs of all, agriculture, municipalities and industry.

Water, Inc. was formally organized on May 24, 1967 at a meeting in Lubbock. The organization was the result of concerted effort of the twelve incorporators who had chartered the non-profit corporation the week previously. Both the charter and the organization's by-laws set out its goals, principal among them the creation of public interest in and development of public support for water resources development and conservation projects, and to promote, conduct, and participate in studies, surveys, and research programs for the importation, distribution, reclamation, re-use, utilization, and the storage of water and to make such programs available to the public.

Water, Inc. officials are well aware that its aims include all sources of supplemental water, however, emphasis has been on import of water from the Mississippi River, principally because development of the Texas Water Plan was reaching full stride during Water, Inc.'s brief history. The organization was instrumental in seeing that all of Texas was included in the state plan, and gave it strong backing. An indication of the effectiveness of the organization is evidenced in the fact that the area served by Water, Inc., generally the western half of the state, gave strong backing to a constitutional amendment which would have provided the state's share of financing to launch the Texas Water Plan. Unfortunately, the amendment was defeated statewide by the slimmest of margins.

Even before the constitutional amendment balloting was official, Water, Inc. officials were initiating steps to see that voters would get a second chance as soon as possible. see page two

Water, Inc. is truly representative of the area it serves. It is governed by a board of directors. The area is divided into 32 districts. A director is elected from each of the districts. In addition, directors are elected "at-large," however, the list of at-large directors must also be representative of the overall area, thus preventing a concentration of directors from a single area.

The board also includes "advisory directors," among them the leading water planners in the Southwest. An executive committee named by the board conducts the detailed business of Water, Inc. under policies and guidelines set down by the directors.

The day to day operation is carried out by a professional staff headed by the executive director. The staff includes an attorney, an associate director for membership and organization, and an associate director for public relations. Necessary secretarial and accounting personnel round out the staff.

Realizing a need for a closer relationship with individual members, Water, Inc. has embarked on a program of county unit organizations, each unit with its own slate of officers and directors. It is through the county units that Water, Inc. keeps abreast of specific needs and wants of local geographical areas, and it is through the local unit that Water, Inc. is most effective in educational phases

The organization is financed entirely through membership dues. Dues have been set on a formula basis by the directors with a \$25.00 minimum per member. The formula guidelines take into consideration the size of the business or farming operation.

In early 1970, the current paid-up membership exceeded 2,000 and plans are underway for doubling the membership by the end of the year.

I've tried to count the windmills in Seminole and there's five or six left, some of them still pumping water. Old timers will tell you to this good day that when the windmills went out there was an uneasy feeling because they couldn't tell when the wind was blowing or when it was still outside. Ranchers discussed the depth of wells, the size of the pump, what made the best leathers and sucker rods.

Some cowboys were known as Sucker Rod because their job was to keep the mills pumping. I remember working on one well that only had two joints of pipe in the well and two joints of sucker rod and when it got something wrong with it or sanded down, it just lifted the whole pipe up and down. A lot of windmills didn't have too big a supply and when driving herds through the country some ranchers were very unhappy because they just drank the stock tanks dry. Now, if water was in short supply on that ranch, you could see why as it would

This is the second reduction of the interest rate in the past seventy days for the association.





Seagraves also sent a delegation-their main purpose to block the hospital district covering the Seminole School District.





WOMEN AT WORK... A PROFILE STUDY In 1940, one out of four persons in the work force was a woman. At the peak of World War II, when women entered the war effort, females accounted for 30% of the total work force or a little less than 1 in 3. By 1960, one of every three were women. Now the figure is 38%... creeping steadily toward the 50% or 1 in 2 mark. Striking changes have marked the female work force over the past years. In 1920, the typical wo rking girl was 28 years old, single, and worked in a factory. Only 1 in 5 finished high school. Today, the typical female worker is 40 years old, married, and most likely holds down a clerical, service, or sales job. She has a high school diploma and some college.

Since 1947 the number of women in the civilian labor force increased 75% while the number of men rose only 16%. Women give economic necessity as their major reason for taking a job. Other reasons include need to supplement inadequate family income; to help pay for a home; medical treatment; or children's education; or to raise the family's standard of living in general.

A significant difference between women workers and men workers is the intermittent nature of women's lifetime work pattern. Nearly all women workers interrupt their employment at some time for marriage and for bearing and rearing children. When they return to the labor force many can work only part time or part of the year because of continued home responsibilities. Thus...whether clerical workers, operatives, or professional workers, they will have lost ground in terms of job seniority and work experience to qualify for promotion at the same rate as men.

In addition, females generally retire at an earlier age than men, yet because of their shortened number of working years, their retirement income is sadly deficient.

The foregoing facts, presented by the U.S. Department of Labor, are significant to us. Women's need for money... of which life insurance is a basic part... is no small matter.

EDITORIAL

Gaines County with no doubt grows the best peaches, the best watermelons, potatoes, and green beans of any area in Texas.

One of the complaints continuously is quote, "why can't we buy Gaines County pecans, potatoes, peaches, etc.

Mainly the problem that exist is this, local stores that sell similar merchandise has to have a supplier that can furnish them these items 12 months out of the year. So it is a problem to local merchants to sell in-season vegetables and fruits when maybe the local supply will last only a few weeks.

Friends in Odessa, San Angelo, and Carrizo Springs delight in telling me about buying Indian potatoes in their hometowns.

Texas has the 3rd largest fruit and vegetable harvest in the nation, with a total value of more than 140 million dollars.

Texas ranks first in production of carrots, onions, watermelons and cabbage. Production totals for Texas grapefruit and cantaloupes are second largest among all states, while oranges rank fourth and peaches 12th.

Other major fruits and vegetables produced in Texas are honeydew melons, lettuce, cucumbers, tomatoes, spinach, sweet corn, potatoes, sweet potatoes, green peppers, cauliflower, broccoli and snap beans.

Altogether there are more than 200 different varieties of fruits and vegetables grown in Texas. Commercial production is concentrated in 13 separate areas, with the largest output located in the Rio Grande Valley and the High Plains.

A number of Texas vegetables are available all year, but in general the shipping season hits a peak in the Spring, and again during the Winter months. Citrus shipments are confined to the period from October to June.





NEWS RELEASE FROM SOIL CONSERVATION SERVICE

LANDOWNERS AND OPERATORS ARE BEING URGED TO
"THINK TWICE" BEFORE DOING ANY UNNECESSARY TILLAGE
OPERATIONS WHICH MIGHT TEND TO INDUCE WIND EROSION,
ACCORDING TO CHARLES MICKELSON, DISTRICT CONSERVATIONIST WITH THE SOIL CONSERVATION SERVICE IN SEMINOLE.

"WITH THE LACK OF SOIL MOISTURE, THE MOST DESIRABLE METHOD OF KEEPING LAND FROM BLOWING IS BY A PROTECTIVE COVER," MICKELSON STATED. IF CROP RESIDUES ARE PRESENTLY DOING A GOOD JOB OF HOLDING DOWN EROSION, ESPECIALLY ON DRYLAND, THE CONSERVATIONIST RECOMMENDS THEY BE KEPT ON THE SOIL SURFACE AS LONG AS POSSIBLE. CROPS SHOULD BE PLANTED WITH A MINIMUM AMOUNT OF TILLAGE BEING PERFORMED TO STIR THE SOIL AND START IT TO BLOWING.

MICKELSON WENT ON TO STATE THAT FARMERS WITH IRRIGATED LAND SHOULD PREWATER AS MUCH AS POSSIBLE BEFORE PLOWING UNDER ANY PROTECTIVE COVER. ONCE THE SOIL MOISTURE HAS BEEN REPLACED, THEN TILLAGE OPERATIONS CAN BE EFFECTIVE TO CONTROL THE BLOWING.

ON DRYLAND, MINIMUM TILLAGE CAN KEEP THE COST OF PRODUCING A CROP DOWN WHILE ALSO PROVIDING EROSION PROTECTION. MANY FARMERS IN THE PLAINS AREA ARE GOING TO A MINIMUM TILLAGE TYPE OPERATION TO HELP ACCOMPLISH THIS. EQUIPMENT COMPANIES AND CHEMICAL COMPANIES HAVE BEEN WORKING ON TECHNIQUES AND EQUIPMENT NEEDED TO CARRY OUT SUCH A SYSTEM OF FARMING WITH LITTLE OR NO TILLAGE OPERATIONS EXCEPT FOR THE PLANTING OPERATION, MICKELSON ADDED THAT IF THIS TYPE FARMING CAN BE ADAPTED, IT WILL BE VERY BENEFICIAL TO CONTROLLING EROSION AND AT THE SAME TIME, INSURE GETTING A CROP STARTED WITHOUT GETTING "BLOWN OUT".

MICKELSON COMMENTED THAT WIND EROSION CAUSES UNTOLD MISERIES TO THE PEOPLE OF THIS AREA AND UNCOUNTED DOLLARS IN DAMAGE TO PROPERTY. HE ADDED THAT WE ALL KNOW THAT DRY WEATHER IS GOING TO OCCUR FROM TIME TO TIME AND BEING PREPARED FOR IT AND THE WINDS WHICH ACCOMPANY IT IS WHAT NEEDS TO BE ACCOM-
