
SEMINOLE MAIDENS WIN DISTRICT

It was removed yesterday at the request of the Texas Highway Department, Austin, Texas. Various counts had been made concerning east and west traffic and it was moved on a mandatory basis as the highway department is in the process of taking over traffic lights through Seminole. In the city election 493 voted for three men of the six hopefuls running on the City Council. Incumbent Karl Don Hughes led he voting with 336 votes. Running second was W. Earl Denton with 271 votes and Bob Clark with 253, winning the three open places.

Raymond Patton, an incumbent, trailed by only 21 votes. Ed Pullam had 195 and Dick Kephart 144. Denton and Clark will be sworn in next Monday night at the regular meeting in the city hall.

GAINES COUNTY FARM BUREAU DELEGATES

GAINES COUNTY FARM BUREAU WAS REPRESENTED BY 5 VOTING DELEGATES AT THE SPECIAL CALLED MEETING OF THE TEXAS FARM BUREAU MARCH 22 AT THE BAKER HOTEL IN DALLAS. PURPOSE OF THE MEETING WAS TO CONSIDER RECOMMENDATIONS FOR EXPANDING PROGRAMS OF THE ORGANIZATION "TO MEET CURRENT AND FUTURE NEEDSUL OF FARMERS AND RANCHERS IN TEXAS.

ATTENDING FROM THIS COUNTY WERE, ALTON BILLINGS-SEAGRAVES, VESTER SMITH, PRESIDENT-LOOP, M.M. HAND AGENCY MGR. IN LOOP, TOMMY LACY- SEAGRAVES, ROBERT SCOTT-LOOP AND DAYTON ELAM-SEMINOLE.

THE SPECIAL MEETING WAS THE FIRST OF ITS KIND EVER HELD BY THE TFB AND CULMINATED ALMOST A YEAR OF STUDY AND PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT ACTIVITY INVOLVING HUNDREDS OF COUNTY FARM BUREAU LEADERS. THE 13-MEMBER STATE PROGRAM EXPANSION COMMITTEE CONSUL TED COUNTY FARM BUREAUS IN THE DRAFTING OF THE RECOMMENDATIONS WHICH WERE SUBMITTED TO THE VOTING DELEGATES.

HERE, IN BRIEF, ARE THE MAJOR PROGRAMS APPROVED BY THE DELEGATES.

(1) THE 771 VOTING DELEGATES FROM 148 COUNTIES AP-PROVED RECOMMENDATIONS ON AN AMMENDMENT TO A BY-LAW TO PROVIDE FULL FINANCING WHEN PAST BY A SIMPLE MAJORITY INSTEAD OF A TWO THIRDS VOTE.

(2) DEBATED AT LENGTH WAS, BUYING PRIME TIME ON TELEVISION AND RADIO STATIONS TO TELL THE FARMERS AND RANCHERS STORY.

(3) GUIDELINES WERE SET-UP TO ESTABLISH MARKET-ING PROGRAMS.

(4) A TRAINING PROGRAM WILL BE INSTITUTED FOR LEADERS, EMPLOYEES AND AGENTS ON THE OBJECTIVES AND PURPOSES OF FARM BUREAUS.

THE PROPOSALS VOTED ON AT THE DALLAS MEETING WERE rain since we have been here. BASED ON THE DESIRES EXPRESSED IN COUNTY FARM BUREAU BOARD MEETINGS LAST SUMMER. PRIORITIES WERE ESTABLISHED AT A STATEWIDE MEETING OF COUNTY PRESIDENTS IN AUGUST. THE STATE PROGRAM EXPANSION COMMITTEE, IN COOPERATION WITH SIMILAR COMMITTEES ON THE COUNTY LEVEL, HAS BEEN STUDING AND EVAL-UATING PROPOSED EXPANSION NEEDS FOR THE PAST SEVERAL MONTHS.




To the Editor:

MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

Memorial Hospital had 6756 "in patient" days for the year 1970. This is 453 more days than were used in 1969. The average length of stay for patients in 1969 was 6.4 days. The average length of stay in 1970 fell to 4.8 days. Medicare patient days in 1970 amounted to 2007, in 1969 it was 2220. For Medicade in 1970 it was 238 and in 1969 it was 98. The difference be tween Medicare and Medicade patient days is that the state participates in Medicade where Medicare is an all federal program.

Ed Rodgers, manager of the local hospital, gave these further_figures for 1970. The length of stay for Medicare patients was 10 days. The average stay for Medicade was 9.2. Total emergency and "out patients" visits amounted to 2999 for the year. The average daily census for the local hospital had a daily average of 18.51. The local hospital has good R. N. (Registered Nurse) coverage at the present time.





The mother was probably 35 to 36 years old. She looked like from her eyes that she'd been out in a sandstorm all day, driving a tractor, maybe she had a bad case of hay fever, her eyes were swelled almost shut. No, that was not her trouble. It was 10:15 a. m. on a Monday morning. She had been notified the night before, along with her husband and four other parents, that her 15 year old son had been picked up, was in the Seminole jail charged with the use of and the possession of marijuana. I could not help but observe the parents, the fathers looked very little better, no doubt having shed a few tears themselves.

I hope and pray that you never receive such a call, I hope and pray that I never receive such a call. If I do I have no doubt that a bed would be a hard place to spend a night of anxiety, anxiousness and reproach, thinking "where did I fail?" Is it the times? Is it the general attitude of children toward parents and authority? Is it us parents? The parents were all well dressed. The two or three cars that I saw were late models. These were not poor people, all were middle class or above in the financial bracket. These are the children that evidently can afford pills, pot and drugs. Heard were such statements as "We had no idea, " "How did they get started?" and "We don't even know what it looks like. "And then I observed four of the sons meeting their parents. The eight parents were tired, were troubled and probably received very few hours of sleep among them. The sons had received a good night's rest. They were smiling and seemingly were kinda proud of their night out on the town. Mothers were crying, fathers trying to give their sons a stern look and two of the boys' first questions were "You got a cigarette?" and "I want a Coke." Mothers bounced to wait on their little boys. One of the parents said "Son, come on, let's go home." "No," he said, "I'm gonna ride home with Sammy, I rode down here with him." Three 15 year old boys, two 16 year old boys admitting possession. Five sons, five tearful mothers, five frightened fathers, five sons with long hair belligerent, unashamed and a little sorry to see their mothers suffer.

> What would you do? What are you going to do? Shed tears? Give yourself a mental beating? Fifteen or twenty years ago I could have told you all the answers but having seen three children pass this age I'm not sure anymore. But, I'll tell you this, it takes a whole bunch of living, a gob of praying, a lot of work and a world of loving to get it done.
