During the past year Big Tree sleuths have recorded almost a hundred species of trees, a third of which are recognized in the national register as the largest in the nation.
American Forestry Assn. keeps the register.
Within the past year, the sleuths have discovered a record breaking Long Leaf Pine in Texas. It is in Sabine County in East Texas and measures $1111 / 2$ inches in circumference at $41 / 2$ feet above the ground. That's nine feet, three and one-half inches around!
