




INDIANS WIN





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

_etters to the Editor

One of the better letters that the Seminole News receives each month is the Texas Good Roads Association from Austin. Its purpose is to inform the public about where new highways are being built, the cost and up-keep. It's interesting to note and probably most of you know that Interstate Highways (example #20 and #66) are 90% Federally Financed, others are financed 50% state and 50% city or county. Farm to Market roads are 100% county financed. Prices on building highways have increased as much as 33.5% in the past 12 months.

"Increased pressures, especially from the cities, for more aid at a faster pace." (Examples: The four major-city counties have asked for over \$1 billion in highway projects during the last 26 months, and these did not include requests for ROW and similar state aid. Even with a 2-cent increase as proposed, the Highway Department says it would be able to finance "only two-thirds of needed maintenance, operation and construction programs during fiscal 1971-72.")



Do your part, join the Clean Up Campaign, whether it is a lot, a street, an old car, an old house or behind you back fence.


People are being warned again not to dump fresh cut grass for a compost, it tends to breed mosquitos, "in the wet weather we are having", old car bodies do the same thing.



Items in front of him are what smokers of dope use. The large one is for opium but used also by marijuana smokers. By filtering the smoke through the water base they use the dope over and over. The two pliable leads have mouthpieces so that more than one can smoke. Others on the left are for individual smokers. On the right is incense and an incense burner. The incense burner is used to hide the smell created by the burning of the dope filled material. Louis Birdwell, a recent college graduate, said, "Mr. Woods, be sure and tell parents if their children are in the habit of burning incense, to be sure and be certain that they're not also users of dope."

In telling about carriers of dope, Mr. Selman went on to say "I can stop 20 cars on the weekend and almost without fail find one carrying dope." To make out a case on a doper takes eight hours of paper work. One carrier was found to have \$300,000 worth in the drive shaft of his car.

WE SHALL POKE OUR NOSE IN THE OFFICE AND EXPECT A CUP OF GOOD TEXAS COFFEE SOMETIME TOWARD THE END OF MAY. OUR VERY BEST TO EACH OF
