## EDITORIALS

Following are quotes concerming the Texas Tech School of Medicine from articles by John A. Buesseier, M. D.
"On Dec. 4, 1970, an affiliation agreement between the medical school and the Lubbock County Hospital District was signed. The agreement provides that the hospital district will construct and maintain a primary teaching hospital for the medical school.
"Plans are also under development for effecting affiliation agreements between the medical school and the many community hospitals in the West Texas region that possess the desire and the capabilities to function as affiliated teaching hospitals.
"The use of 'challenge' examinations will be basic to the operational effectiveness of the curriculum flexibility being designed for Texas Tech University School of Medicine. Such examinations are being designed to allow the student who has accumulated knowledge and skill in a given course, regardless of the time he has devoted to the course, to request an examination for competence in the subject. Successfully passing the examination will constitute completion of the course. $\qquad$ . Plans have been developed to admit the first and third - year classes with a total of 36 students in the fall of 1972, using temporary and affiliated quarters. In the fall of 1973, additional first and third-year classes comprising 48 students will be admitted, making a total of 84 medical students enrolled in the state's newest medical school. Thus, Texas Tech University School of Medicine is being programmed to graduate its first-year class of physicians in the spring of 1974. An enrollment of 200 students in the first-year class is scheduled for the fall of 1975 when the completion of the first phase of medical school construction is anticipated to be realized.
"Texas Tech University School of Medicine is the only medical school in the state located on a major university campus. . . . It is intended that the administrative staff, faculty, medical students, allied health sturents, interns, resident physicians in training, and practicing physicians will be involved in the education, patient care, and research programs to be established not only on the campus but also in the many communities of the West Texas region and the State. . . . It is the purpose of this innovative curriculum to facilitate the medical educational integration of students with a wide variety of pre-baccalaureate courses of education. Thus the student with an undergraduate major in history, for example, will be be enabled to enter medical school, and through the appropriate use of elective and required course work be graduated as a physician with the same core of competence and skills required of all other graduates. This departure from a rigid premedical undergraduate course requirement will provide the opportunity for medical education to a larger body of intelle ctually capable students. In addition the flexibility of the curriculum will allow for students to proceed from high school graduation to medical school graduation in six years without a reduction of educational quality.
"It must be pointed out that medical students are the minority students in any medical school-medical center complex. They are far outnumbered by the many non-baccalaureate, pre-baccalaureate, pre-doctoral, post-doctoral, and continuing education students who obtain some or all of their education in the same facilities and from many of the same faculty members. Frequently there are three to four times as many of these students on a medical center campus as there are medical students. Many are training for careers in the large variety of allied health fields, some are interms, others are postdoctoral personnel acquiring training and experience in specialty work, and still others are practicing physicians and practicing allied health personnel taking refresher training in order to keep up with the new developments occurring in their fields. It is economically wasteful not to use medical school-medical center facilities to train these essential health personnel.
"If the necessary support is forthcoming, we intend to admit the first small classes of freshman and junior medical students into temporary teaching facilities in the fall of 1972 and to admit a full enrollment class of 200 freshman medical students into the newly constructed medical school in the fall of 1975."
The foregoing statements were used in this editorial so that people in this area will know the importance of the medical school in Lubbock and the necessity of additional cost in the new planned hospital in Seminole, so we might participate in their program and they in turn can participate in ours. It is further estimated that over half of the doctors graduated from the medical school in Lubbock will remain in a 100 to 150 mile radius of Lubbock. Attention is called to medical facilities in Dallas and Galveston.
