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EDITORIALS

When the U. S. House of Representatives limited government payments to farmers in the amount of \$20,000 limit per year there was only one direction for farm prices to go and that was UP. Certainly, the American people are tired of taxes, we do not like them. But in all fairness to farmers some of the following items should be pointed

1. Prices must go up if the portion paid the farmer amounts to consumer subsidies. If it is a consumer subsidy, the American people should know about it. It is no longer possible for farmers and small farm operations to make a profit.

This editor, owner of farm land, testifies that it is near impossible to show profit with consumer subsidies paid.

2. Let's review a quarter section of land. The cost of land in Gaines County is \$100 per acre and the cost of irrigation and water wells is \$100 per acre - investment is \$32,000. Cost of farming it for one year is approximately \$8,000. Interest at 6% is \$2,400. If a grain crop was grown on the 160 acres and if it made 3,000 pounds per acre and if it brought a real good price of \$2.00 per hundred pounds, there is no way that a farmer can farm it, feed his family and pay for the land. If, however, the quarter section was part of an operation of two sections, three, four or five sections and if the cost was kept down on the operation, a farmer could stay in business.

ONE OF THESE DAYS the only farmer left will be the combine, huge co-ops or farms owned by multi-business corporations. Then they can sit back and make their demands for prices and Mr. Consumer will pay through the nose.

3. From the year 1959-1969, farms have shrunk from four million in the United States to less than three million. The acreage had not been taken out, the farms got larger so a profit could be shown. In 1959, 20, 000 farmers took in more than \$100, 000. per year. Today that figure has doubled in the amount of farms and account for more than one-third of food and fiber grown.

At the very top are vast farming operations that take in over one million dollars per year. This has increased from 400 in 1959 to between 900 and 1,000 today. In 1930, it took one farm worker to feed ten Americans. Today one farm worker can supply himself and fifty

I am not against cutting the farm payments if it will save the consumer money. But if a big operation is wrong-THINK on our government, THINK on our transportation, THINK on our post office department, THINK on our army. I am one of those Americans that believe if a farmer can't make it, he need to quit farming. If the post office system can't make it - it needs to be sold. If a railroad can't make it, take up the tracks. If the U. S. Mint has to sell silver dollars for \$5.00 each, lets get somebody else to print them. Also, if the government is not going to pay the farmer, let the government quit telling him what he can plant, how much of it he can plant and what the price will be.



OUR COUNTRY'S HISTORY

The history of our country is told in many many ways. One big chapter is written on barb wire. Wallace Powers has one of the best collections in the area. Would you believe 200 different kinds, maybe more. Bill Faircloth brought in a piece of wire a few days ago, wanting it identified, and Wallace Powers gave the following information on it."It's a U.S. military World War #1 Concerntina, 1917-1918 wire." He pointed out that this is steel wire and would wreck or tear up wire cutters. It is a steel one strand with a double wrap of wire on it, making four barbs, one sticking each direction. He went on to say that the wire originally was a double strand, but had been taken apart and sold to farmers and ranchers. Without referring to notes or book, Mr. Powers identified the seven different kinds hanging on the bulletin board in the News office - Burnell, Improved S, Arrow Plate, Reverse Spread Scott, Glidden Railroad, Merrill -Buffalo and Snail Bar. Evidently Powers is some kind of an expert because a previous wire man had told me about this Glidden Railroad wire. "How can you identify that?" he was asked. "See, one of the two twisted strands," he said, "is square. Glidden built this for the railroads so when farmers or ranchers stole it they could identify the culprit. " The Merrill buffalo wire, they both said, was not to fence the buffalo in but to fence the buffalo out.





Dear Walter Woods,


I am writing to let you know about Ben's transplant. You know, I am sure that he rejected the kidney and it was removed Thursday the 24th.


His sister is doing fine.






