CITY COUNCIL MEETING

The City Council met Monday night for their regular meeting. In attendance were Mayor Clarence Wright, City Secretary Ruby Frost, City Attorney Alton Freeman and Councilmen Karl Don Hughes, Bart Walden, Earl Denton and Bob Clark.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. Other matters to come before the council were:

1. An ordinance, No. 126, prohibiting within the corporate limits of the City of Seminole, the dispensing of any flamable liquid used as motor fuel, as an act of retail sale, from any mobile service unit, vehicle, tank truck, or other motor vehicle parked on any public street; and providing for a fine not exceeding \$200 for each violation thereof was adopted and approved.

2. The plat for Town and Country Ranchettes, a subdivision of the N/2 of Tract 51 and all of Tract 60 out of the N/2 of section 131, Block G in the W.T.R.R. Co. Survey, Gaines County was approved as submitted.

4. Bids were submitted for a truck for the sanitation department. Councilmen elected to buy the Ford for \$4,624,00 from Bennett Motor Co. They also accepted bids for a pickup for the water department. An International pickup for \$1,970.00 was to be purchased from LMH.

5. They elected to create a City Board of Development consisting of five members.

7. The budget of 1971-1972 was approved.

Seminole News - July 28, 1971 - Page 2 E.L. SHORT APPOINTED TO COMMITTEE ON VENEZUELAN EQUINE ENCEPHALOMYELITIS

E. L. Short, State Representative, was appointed on a legislative committee to assist and study in any way possible the problems and solutions of Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis (VEE). This 7 man committee met in Austin July 20 and heard testimonies from the Animal Health Commission, doctors from the School of Veterinary Medicine of Texas A&M and the Texas Agricultural Department.

The following information came from testimonies: (1) The vaccine and the services are free to the horse owner. The federal government if paying the cost. (2) The county agents of each county are the designated official person for you to contact. (3) The animal health commission believes we need to vaccinate 90 percent of all horses to put a check and balance on (VEE). It is important that all of us cooperate with this program. There is over 10,000 horses dead in Mexico and over 700 dead in Texas. (4) Seventeen people in Texas are infected and 69 others are suspected of having (VEE).

The committee is making recommendations to the federal government that they spray the cities because the vaccination program is only a part of a solution. The mosquito is the carrier and any mosquito can transmit this disease by biting an infected horse then in turn infect a person or another animal. In south Texas counties that have received rain is where the great problem lies. Unless the drought breaks in this area and a new cycle of mosquitoes takes place, Mr. Short believes that we will not have very many problems. Vaccinated horses are known to be fully protected after 14 days. It is important that we protect ourselves from mosquito bites until this outbreak of (VEE) is checked.

The symptoms to a human is like having a mild flu virus. The vaccine is in the experimental stages and is not available to humans. The disease is not known to affect humans as seriously as it does horses. There is no doubt that the vaccine is effective on horses. There is a number of cases similar to the following that has proved this point. A herd of 30 horses -- 27 were vaccinated and 3 were not. The owner considered the 3 animals the best he had and was afraid to give them an experimental type vaccine. They contacted (VEE). The 27 were saved.

You should contact your physician if you have unusual mosquito contact and or a summer flu. If you have a horse that needs vaccinating, call your veterinatian or county agent. Mr. Short expects the quarantine to be lifted on the movement of horses very soon.

Fish can't forget about our old ballgames. He was the pitcher on the Shafter Lake team and he had to tell Thomas Burrows what a thief I was back in those days. I would steal second every time and sometimes home plate. I was lead off man at bat and would tell the batter to not strike at the first ball, that I would steal second, then it would not be a force run and they had to put the ball on you. I could make it standing most of the time or slide underhead first and put my hand on the base. I was fast and did not fan out. I would knock the ball down instead of up and it would roll off down the third base line or the first base and I would out run it to first. It was the catcher that always got mad when you stole bases on him. I was 38 when I played my last ballgame in 1919 with Seagraves. We had always been jealous of each other. Seminole's team did not have a short stop and I just had to go and help them. I went to first the first thing and stole second, then went to home plate and squatted down to rest and here came the hind catcher with muzzle on, weighing about two uhundred pounds. He was a R. R. fireman and he called me little shrimp. I sprung at him and got him by his Adam's apple and shut all his air off and he threw up his hands and was turning black in the face when they pulled us apart. It was either run or fight and you can't tell what you can do until you try. He was told so many times that a little shrimp whipped him that he transferred to the Slaton line.

The cowboys would always enjoy putting me on a pitching horse, get me to put on a pair of long shank spurs for they knew that I would spur him and make him pitch even if he was a gentle horse. So I was in demand on weekends to go out and help brand or dip and dehorn, but I was very fortunate, I never was pitched off but I pulled everything and if the horn had not been well leathered it would have pulled off. I would hold to that horn a-straddle of my arm looking for a soft place to fall but it was rock or a cactus bed or a steer's back as the horse always had his head right between the steer's hind legs.

I bought an interest in the Williams Brothers & Sims store in 1912 on the corner facing north on the Eddy Jameson corner in a tall two story building. The high winds would make it lean over east and many days I would have to go to lunch without locking my doors. It would be leaning so badly my doors would not shut. The day the bank was robbed in 1912 by two men I went to the Lone Star Hotel for lunch and did not shut my doors. It was robbed by Fuguay from Oklahoma and Bert Humphery from down on the border. Fuquay was killed in the sand hills near Monument that night which ended his bank robbing.

I always enjoy reading your paper and the many old pictures bring back many pleasant memories of the past and some were not so pleasant for there were times that we would wonder where our next meal would come from and something unforseen would happen.






